The old Forrest Mill on the east bank of the Flat River was set afire Thursday morning, Fire Chief Frank Baker revealed, in an arson's attempt. The old mill had been leased for 10 years to the city by the King Milling Co. Bids were being tak-en to remove the old building.

Someone evidently thought they could hasten the removal of the 100-year-old building, so they piled up wood and trash and set it afire. Workmen in the flour mill, across the river, observed the fire at 2:45 Thursday morning and called the fire department.

Baker said the fire had only been burning a few minutes when it was discovered. The fire did not burn through the

Most townships in Kent County are not participating in this voluntary assistance to keep the library going. All the small cities where there are branches of the library are paying their contri-bution to keep this service go-


