City budget approved with small increase in taxes for 1965

Lowell Council approved the budget presented by City Manager Bernard C. Olson at the meeting Monday night. It provides for expenditures of \$160,555 for the next year beginning July 1. Taxes will be increased about 60¢ per thousand for city residents.

There were several citizens present at the meeting who discussed the city needs; some wanted to spend less money and others wanted the city to increase expenditures.

Delay Sewer Plant

Bids which were received last week for a new sewage treatment plant all exceed engineer's estimates and on the recommendation of Williams and Works Engineers, they were rejected.

Lowell did not receive the government allocation of \$93,000 for construction of the plant as they were led to expect and no new allocations will be made until next October.

Bonds voted by the City last August will be sold before June 30 to give the City more points to qualify for next year's grants.

Dispose of Park

The City Council voted to take bids on the area of Recreation Park containing the baseball diamond, football field, track and tennis court so this area could be sold to the school.

The area west of this portion of the park was turned over to Kent County 4-H Fair Association and will be maintained and operated by this group. The City will have use of the round roof building and the exhibition building.

Cemetery Rules Checked

Oakwood Cemetery which the City took over from the Town-

ship of Lowell, last spring, was part of a long discussion by the council. City Manager Olson predicts in his budget that it will cost some \$2,000 more to operate the cemetery then fees and perpetual care funds will earn.

The council discussed the fees charged for operating the cemetery which are some what below the average for the state and the cost of lots and perpetual care in the cemetery. Other discussions were on rules and regulations needed to lower the operation costs.

Dok Builders requested an addition to Valley Vista Plat with two large lots for four family apartments and eight additional small residential lots.

Bids were taken for a pickup truck for the water department, no action was taken until the manager checks the bids. The bids were Wittenbach, International, \$1,498; Story, GMC, \$1,266; and Jackson, Dodge, \$1,477.

Arie Leman appeared at the Council meeting and requested participation by the City in a culvert under a road he was building on his property at the east end of High Street.

Claude Vestal has been given authority to operate the city dump. He has paid \$125 for the privilege and will keep the dump cleaned up and open seven days a week from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m., April 1, to October 1, and from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. during the winter months.

LHS scholarship winners named

The 1965-66 state scholarship winners were announced recently by Dr. Lynn M. Bartlett, state superintendent of public instruction and chairman of the Michigan Higher Education Assistant Authority.

Lowell High School winners numbered six with awards ranging from \$80 to \$800 depending on determined financial need.

The local winners were Michael Bergin, Bradford Harris, Rick Maloney, Paul Rogers, Kathleen Tapley and Suzanne Thaler. These six winners won a total of \$2,484 which over a 4-year period could total nearly \$10,000.00.

Lowell seniors fared well when compared with other Tri-River schools: Lowell and Belding each had six winners, Rockford 4, Sparta 3, Cedar Springs 2, and Comstock Park 1.

Each award is based on the cost of tuition and fees for an academic year at the institution which the applicant chooses to attend, and all awards are renewable upon annual application and maintenance of a "C" average.

It is through such awards and honors that many more Michigan students will be able to better insure themselves of higher education in future years.

CMU Scholarships

The Office of Scholarships and Loan of Central Michigan University has named four Lowell high school seniors-as winners of tuition scholarship grants for the school year of 1965-66.

Each scholarship award is worth \$200 yearly or \$800 over a 4-year period if satisfactory grades are maintained. Central normally grants a total of 350 scholarships to winners named out of nearly 2,000 entering freshmen.

Lowell high school winners named are Susan Doyle, Robert Elzinga, Jane Bennett and Thomas Wilcox.

MSU Recipients

Three Lowell High school seniors stood in the spotlight of recently announced Michigan State University scholarship winners. Rick Maloney, Kathy Tapley and Susan Thaler were among the winners named released from the scholarship office in East Lansing.

Scholarships were named in the amount of tuition of a sum somewhat less depending upon other scholarships won by these students.

Sue Thaler's was a special scholarship award issued as an award for a piece of creative writing that has been submitted in a very competitive contest.

Wins Financial Award

In the list of scholarship winners released by Alma College recently, Brad Harris's name appeared as the winner of a \$900 tuition scholarship based upon academic excellence and need.

Bradford plans to attend Alma in September as a pre-engineering or science student.

Paul Kellogg Vinegar Corporation takes over mince meat operation

Announcement was made this week by Edward Kiel, president, and Gerald Kellogg, vice-president, of the Paul Kellogg Vinegar Corporation, that they have purchased the L. W. Rutherford property, just north of their plant, and the recipe and rights to manufacture the famous Dining Car Mince Meat.

Work is in progress to modernize the plant and get production underway on this nationally known mince meat. The outstanding recipe was first developed over 50 years ago by Edwin Fallas and continued by his son-in-law, the late L. W. Rutherford, and his son, John, who was killed last fall in an auto-

mobile accident.

Mr. Kiel revealed that his company plans to process the same fine quality mince meat distributed all over the middle west, as soon as remodeling of the plant is completed.

The Paul Kellogg Vinegar Corporation which produces vinegar and apple juice, will move their bottling and processing operations to the Rutherford plant. A pipe line will be installed to bring the vinegar and apple juice from the Kellogg plant to the new facilities.

The Paul Kellogg Vinegar Corporation is owned equally by Mr. Kiel and Mr. Kellogg, son of the late Paul Kellogg, founder of the business.

Spring clean-up week May 10-15

Spring clean-up week will begin Monday, May 10, according to City Manager Bernard C. Olson. All city crews and equipment will be used to help local residents with the cleaning of their properties.

The clean-up project calls for concerted action on the part of everyone in the community to make our town spic and span. Start your clean-up job in the attic and work downward. If you have a collection of old newspapers and magazines you will never look at or discarded clothing, broken furniture, trash and other combustibles, throw them away.

All types of household discards that residents desire to dispose of will be picked up if placed at the edge of the road or at the curb. Small items should be placed in containers to facilitate handling.

Discarded or obsolete furniture, clothing, magazines and newspapers are potential fire hazards and residents are urged to get rid of them at this time with city cooperation.

Junk cars, pianos, lumber from demolished buildings and other items too large to handle will not be picked up. Don't forget to check the basement and garage. Make sure that all combustibles are not stored near the heating units. Throw away all empty paint cans and worn out brushes.

Heed, your yard may need cleaning too. Many unlicensed automobiles, some partially dismantled, are being stored in backyards in residential neighborhoods, to the detriment of the community appearance and citizens are urged to dispose of them at this time.

Repairs to buildings, fences, and lawns and paint applied where needed would also help beautify and protect buildings. We trust that the community will accept these suggestions as ways the City may help in encouraging citizen participation in this clean up campaign.

Tax relief for senior citizens

Lowell area taxpayers who are over 65 and meet other requirements will be given tax relief in a bill signed by Governor George Romney on Monday.

There will be several hundred in the area to qualify for relief tax assessors predict.

Homeowners 65 and older who have been residents of Michigan for seven years, have incomes of less than \$5,000 a year, with a homestead assessed value of not more than \$10,000, qualify for tax relief.

The state will pay the taxes on the 1st \$2,500 assessed valuation on their homestead. The taxes will be paid by the state government to local units of government. Average estimated benefit is \$93. for homes in this area.

Grass fire season is here

Warning!

Along with thousands of towns and cities from coast to coast our town next week, will be making a concerted effort to brighten up homes and the community in general.

The local Spring Clean-up committee urges you to help us in a drive to make the home town more beautiful.

You can help by beginning at home. Get rid of unneeded trash and eliminate potential fire hazards. Spring Clean-up should be carried on outside as well as inside the home. Rake up dead leaves and small branches that may have accumulated in your yard during the winter months.

And don't forget to place your rubbish on the curb on the day designated for pick up in your neighborhood.

The Lowell Fire Department has been plagued with fire calls this past week.

Why? Because of the carelessness of local residents who simply burn their trash on days when there is a strong wind. Other people touch off a blaze then go away and leave it unattended.

Still other citizens feel they are free of the danger of a fire because they are burning trash in a barrel. Many times they forget to place a screen on top of the barrel to keep burning debris inside.

Fire Chief Frank Baker again urges local residents to use caution in burning fires. He reminds them that they should obtain a burning permit before starting any blaze.

The local fire department was called to extinguish seven grass fires in the past five days.

On Wednesday they joined several other department attempting to put out a fire started by a passing train which burned over 100 acres of land between Spaulding and Alta Dale Avenues, near Ada.

With the wind velocity registering between 20 and 25 miles per hour, the fire siren blew almost continuously Thursday afternoon. The first call was at 3:45. It was a grass fire near the Fred West residence on M-21.

Fifteen minutes later at four p. m. a second siren alerted the firemen of a grass fire raging out of control near the city, damp. They were still fighting the first fire.

Immediately after that at 4:25, another grass fire was reported on McPherson Avenue, hence. The fire department were just reaching the scene of the second fire.

The fifth siren blew nearly 20 hours later when a fire was sighted in the grass across from the Clarence Speakers on M-91 at 1:25 Friday afternoon.

At 2:51 a grass fire was reported at the Vernon Strouse residence on Grand River Dr. Monday evening and the local department was sent to the scene of a grass fire along the railroad tracks near Foxes Corners.

Please take heed, and exert the utmost caution when starting a fire. Regardless of how small it is, one gust of wind over an unattended fire can cause a vast amount of destruction.
