

THE COVERED BRIDGE AT ADA

Completed on July 7, 1867, the covered bridge at Ada stands as symbol of the Heritage given us by the pioneers of Michigan. Fourteen feet wide, fifteen feet high, and one hundred and twenty feet long, it has withstood floods and

Constructed by Will Holms, the Ada covered bridge, one of the three remaining in their present locations in Michigan, originally was held together by wooden pegs, until they were replaced by iron bolts, during one of the countless renovations over the nine decades it has provided

Known for years as the "Gradford Bridge," named after the owner of a nearby grist-mill, the Ada Covered Bridge provides a perfect starting point for a tour around the unsported village of Ada, during Ada-Michigan Week, from 1-5 P. M. on Saturday, May 22, 1965.
