#### Joel Thurtell serves internship overlooking heartland of Democracy

Lowell High School graduate Joel Thurtell, a sophomore at Kalamazoo College, has a new "classroom" with a spectacular view overlooking the heartland of our Democracy. Serving an internship on the staff of Congressman Gerald R. Ford, Minor-ity Leader of the House of Representatives, the local college man is working virtually under the dome of the Capitol.

A history major, Thurtell daienjoys the rich experience being where history is made, seeing the men and women who make it, and watching thousands of Americans making visits to the shrine of the Republic.

Meanwhile, he is learning how Congress works its will and how the federal government operates. Thurtell has a front row seat to a political drama in one of history's most turbulent and exciting times. As a member of Ford's staff and working in the Capitol just a few steps from the House and the Senate, Thurtell is in the center of legislative and political action.

He is witness to an almost constant parade of nationallyknown figures, including former Vice-President Richard M Nixon and members of the Washington press corps, who visit Ford. Thurtell sees folks from home and shows them the view from the offices which overlook the Mall, Washington Monument and downtown Wash-

The three months Thurtell is spending on a job related to his major field of study are "speeding by all too rapidly,"

The 1963 Lowell High School graduate says he has "a unique vantage point from which to view the working of Congress and politics." He is "learning lessons I could never learn in a college classroom."

Thurtell describes his work in Ford's office as giving 'more purpose and direction to my role as a citizen-participant in our Democracy. This rich experience has made me more acutely aware of my responsibilities as a young American in a demanding and changing world." After completing his tour of

special study in Washington. Thurtell will return to classes at Kalamazoo. He will come back to Michigan with many memories of having been in the center of activity under the Capital Dome

And, he will miss the "classroom", the view, the experience of witnessing history being made, and the busy activity in the office of the Republican Leader of the House.
