Council decides to accept single bid on water-sewer bond issue

of the \$267,000 in City of Lowell-general obligation bond at the council meeting on Monday hight, First of Michigan Corporation offered to buy the bonds at an average interest rate of 3.9989, percent. This is higher than other similar bond issues have sold for previously and the City Council after much discussion voted to reject the bid.

The concil members asked if they could have 24 hours to consider the single bid. When after several phone calls by the com-pany representative here, Monday night, to higher officials in the organization, failed to get the OK for an extension, the council voted to reject.

Tuesday morning, Bernard Olson received word that the bid would be held open until noon and after several calls to municipal finance advisors and bankers it was decided to accept the bid.

This is the highest interest rate ever paid by the City of Lowell to borrow. One reason given for the high rate was that the city did not owe over a million dollars and so was not rated.
