Charles R. Doyle, 523 Lincoln Lake Avenue, Lowell, received official word this week of his appointment as acting postmaster in Lowell on September 1st. He will succeed George Hale who has served as postmaster since 1949.

Doyle is a native of Lowell, graduating from Lowell High School and Hillsdale College, and he served in the U. S. Ma-rine Corps. Mr. Doyle operated a Lowell automobile agency until 1961; for the past several years, he has been on the rightof-way buying staff of the Wolverine Cooperative Electric,

Mr. Doyle was a Democratic candidate from this district for candidate from this district for the State Constitutional conven-tion in 1961 and for a State Representative in 1962. He is now serving his second time on the City Council, having been elected this spring for a two year term. He has been active in local civic groups and Counin local civic groups, and Coun-ty and State Democratic organ-

According to recent rulings, his civil service position as postmaster will not be in conflict with his office in city government, as city elections are on a non-partisan basis

Install truck dumping equipment

New equipment installed at King Milling Company makes it possible to unload as much as 53,000 bushels of wheat in a single day. This scale will accommodate trucks up to fifty feet in length, unloading a thousand bushels of wheat in ten minutes. The quality of the wheat crop is excellent this year, with a moisture content of approximately 11%, but the yield per acre is one of the lowest in the past ten years. It has been a short crop season in this area this year. King Doyle reported that the 400,000 bushel storage silos of the company are near capacity

THE STORY OF THE PENNY

The one cent piece, or penny, has suffered the abuses of the public and enjoyed the praise of poets. The time has long passed when it would buy a stein of beer or a ferry ride but, nonetheless, the penny is still part of our coinage today.

The true penny, an English coin, has been known by that name for over a thousand years. The first penny of Britain was the Anglo-Saxon silver penny in 750 A.D. The first penny was made similar in size and weight, to the denier, a central European coin which had earlier replaced the Roman denarius. This storied coin spans twenty centuries, racing its ancestry to a small silver piece first issued by the Romans in the second century before Christ.

PAPER MONEY OF THE AMERICAN WAR OF INDEPENDENCE

In order to finance the citizen army led by General George Wash ington, the Continental Congress in 1776 authorized the issuance of \$242 million in paper money. It circulated among the notes currently being printed by each of the thirteen colonies. Although both Continental and colonial currency notes were issued in good faith, the fiancial strain the young American government faced soon caused paper money to lose almost all of its value. To further upset the economy the British circulated counterfeit \$5 notes (one on display).

1863 A CENTURY OF UNITED STATES COINS 1963

The first United States Mint was established in Philadelphia in 1792. A quarter of a century passed before coins from this mint replaced the older coins of the colonies and the Spanish, French, Italian and English coins which had reached America in trade.

Until the mid-Nineteenth Century the United States Mint operated coin machinery with horse or steam power. These old-fashioned machines were unable to produce coins with the precise accuracy found in modern coins. The display shows coins issued by the United States since the Civil

War. Included is an Indian-head penny, Lincoln cent, 2- and 3-cent pieces, Liberty-head and buffalo nickel, Roosevelt dime, Franklin half-dollar, United States trade dollar and the Peace dollar. A marked change in design can be seen between 1909 and 1933.

Prior to 1909 all United States coins bore allegorical and artistic designs denoting liberty, peace, and strength. More modern designs include the likeness of famed Americans, the Lincoln Memorial, the Liberty Bell, and other typically American

symbols.


