Sansevieria blossoms

Sylvia McCaul of Route 1, Lowell, stopped by the Ledger office the other day to tell us about the strange blossoming of a foliage plant she has on her porch. Commonly called "Adder-Tongue". "Leopard's Tongue" or "Mother-inlaws Tongue" from the shape of its long, sharp-edged, sword shaped leaves, Sansevieria is a foliage plant used primarily to add shape and texture in a

Some varieties have a stripe or bar of white on the leave which adds color to the arrangement. However, upon quizzing Mrs. Godfrey, Birchwood Gardens, we have discovered that this plant is not notably a blossoming type.

Mrs. McCaul reports that her plant has large long-stemmed white blossoms, with a little drop of nectar dripping down the petals of each flower. The perfume, which seems to be much more intense in the evening, has the spicy scent of carnations.

She keeps it on the porch in full sunlight and heavily watered, which perhaps accounts for the unusual size of the blooms.
