### **Hagen named** semi-finalist

Director of Guidance at Lowell high school, Hans A. Andrews announced this week that named a semi-finalist in the 1965-66 Merit Scholarship com-

petition The student cited for high achievement is Tom Hagen, son

of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Hagen. He is among the highest-scoring students in the state of Michigan on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, administered last March in over 17,600 schools nation-wide. More than 14,000 semi-finalists were appointed across the country.

To become finalists, the students must substantiate their qualifying test performance on second examination, submit recommendations by their schools, and fulfill routine requirements. All Merit Scholars for 1966 will then be selected from the finalist group

At least 97 percent of past semi-finalists have become finalists. Each finalist receives a Certificate of Merit in recognition of his outstanding performance in the program. Finalists are eligible for the scholarships sponsored by NMSC and over corporations, foundations, colleges, unions, trusts, profes sional associations, other organ-

izations and individuals Names of the Merit Scholars chosen from among the finalists will be announced about April 27, 1966. The exact number will depend on the extent of sponsor support. In 1965, over 2,000 Mer-Scholarships were awarded.

School grades, creative accomplishments, leadership qualities, extra-curricular activites, and school citizenship of the students are evaluated, along with test scores, in selecting Merit Scholars. Winners of sponsored awards also meet sponsor crit-

Precision makes molds for all kinds of parts, from braces for aluminum storm windows, refrigera-tors, gold clubs, ashtray housfor automobiles and all kinds of interesting parts.

He bids on the jobs that he does, and when he gets the contract the company sends him a part print. From this Bill draws a pattern and builds the

Bill has had about fifteen or sixteen years experience in this field. He served his apprenticein Detroit. There were no trade schools as such for this type of work, when he was benning his career, but now there are many. Previously he had been in partnership his father in Detroit.

Bill said that it is a neve ending process of learning all the time to keep abreast of the constantly changing methods & the techniques being developed. Dow Chemical, for instance, releases a steady stream of new plastics that can be utilized in many new ways not possible perhaps even six months before. Precision Mfg. recently made a poured plastic magnifying glass that doesn't require grinding, it is ready for use as it comes

from the mold. Precision Mfg. keeps a man in school all the time, one apprentice is in his fourth year, and Bill will start another apprentice this year. He employs between two and four men beside himself all the time and part-time office help, and he has been kept extremely busy



Chief Block said, few accidents Chief Block said, few accidents involving bicycles have occurred in Lowell this year, but reminded riders that extreme caution and safety should be stressed at all times.

Although few bicycle accidents have taken place in Lowell, it is reported some 500 to 700 deaths and 30,000 to 40,000 injuries are attributed to collisions between bicycles and motor vehicles throughout the nation.

By far the greater number of these deaths and injuries were suffered by children from five to 14 years of age.






