City accepts garden club landscape offer

The City Council on Monday evening accepted the offer of the Lowell Garden Club to provide landscaping at the library building at no cost to the city; if it would be properly maintained

The council volunteered to do an adequate job of maintaining the shrubbery if it was planted

Present from the Garden Club was Mrs. Edward Kiel, Mrs. Ron Holst and Mrs. Jake Callier, along with Frank Godfrey, who provided plans for the planting. This includes evergreens and other shrubs estimated to cost \$350.

Objects to Ordinance

A. B. Howard, who operates a teen-age spot was present at the meeting to object to the city ordinance, which does not allow youths under 17 to play pool

He told the council that pool is a family recreation and is not objectionable.

The council examined the 1933 ordinance and were told by the City Manager that the city law follows a state prohibition. If there are local objections to young people playing pool, the police must follow the city and state laws.

Approve Zoning Ordinance

The city council approved a new city zoning law that covers many new phases of build-ing and area use in the city. The new ordinance will replace the old city zoning laws which were not so restrictive.

The manager discussed the problems in getting the last new well into operation and said that the well was being pumped to waste because of caving which was making cloudy wat-A report on the total cost of the new water wells and installation revealed that the city had spent \$41,262.40 to date. Plans were made to provide new street signs throughout the city in the next year. The old signs on untreated wood posts are starting to rot and fall ov-
