Teachers and bus drivers organize to bargain with school board

Members of the Lowell Area trial change in the junior high School faculty were present at the School board meeting on Monday to ask recognition by the board of their bargaining unit, Lowell Education Assoc-

The teachers, Wayne Spaeth, spokesman, announced to the board, have met and voted to bargain collectively on wages, hours, and working conditions. Also present at the meeting was a delegation from the school bus drivers who have also banded together to bargain with the school board on driving fees on a collective basis. Speaking for the drivers was George Dey, jr., who presented the request for changes in pay scales and recognition of the professional status of school bus drivers.

The board took action under the new state law allowing municipal and school employees to form bargaining groups and granted recognition to the teacher's group. They will meet with the superintendent to present their demands and a report will be made to the board.

The board gave their approval for the experiment and authorized a trial period in the junior high. A meeting s being called of parents of students who will receive the new marks next week, when the first report cards come out, to explain the marking system.

Enrollment Up 99

Superintendent Nisbet reported to the board that school enrollment was up to 99 students over last year; total enrollment 2,199; 40 in the high school, 37 in the junior high, and 22 in the elementary schools.

Elementary teachers presented a request to the board to relieve them from playground duty during the lunch hour. The superintendent suggested that a non-teacher may be employed for this duty on each of the three playgrounds, estimated to cost \$1,000 a year.

The board authorized the superintendent to investigate and to take steps to provide this supervision.

Insurance Bids

Bids for insurance for school vehicles were taken and identical bids of \$1,536.71 were submitted by Johnson-Carrington & Speerstra Insurance companies. High loss experience last year and increased insurance rates have boosted the cost of the insurance from \$980.49 last year to the new figure.
