Lowell receives \$132,00 grant

According to information published last week the City of Lowell will receive up to \$132,-000 federal aid to build a sewage treatment plant, estimated to cost \$440,000. A bond issue of \$217,000 was

passed over a year ago; the bonds were sold this spring to provide the city's share of the cost. Bids taken in the spring for the project were far above the \$300,000 estimated costs, when the project was approved

by the voters in 1964 Plans are now to take bids for the project this winter, construction must be underway by

May 1st, to qualify for the fed-eral funds. Additional money may have to be provided from general funds if new bids for the project exceed the early engineer-ing estimates

Rate Increase

Approval of the federal grant has made it necessary for the council to take immediate steps to increase water and sewer rates to provide the funds to begin paying off the bond is-

Preliminary discussion of the council and manager indicates that water-sewer rates will be increased in January. Minimum water sewer charges are being discussed at about \$2 a quarter higher then the present \$6.25 a

The actual increase will be more than this with minimum gallonage being dropped from 10,000 per quarter to 6,000.

The manager told the council on Monday that at least \$38,-000 a year was needed to operate the water department and this same amount was necessary for the sewer plant.

In this proposed stabilization of millage, the boost from a 15 to an 18-mill limit is not considered significant since in many cases it would mean little actual tax increase Most of the school districts of the county now have extra voted operating millage and the boost in allocation would mean merely that the district could levy less of the voted millage. As a matter of reality, most districts already are over the 18mill figure, the Jaycees em-

While the situation in Lowell s complicated somewhat by a bonding issue, Supt. Nisbet notes that most schoolmen are much in favor of stabilizing the millage allocation, thus avoiding the annual hassle over allocation before the Kent County Aflocation Board. A permanent 'locked up" tax base would eliminate a great deal of bickering, suspicion and distrust that accompanies the annual millage battle. I stead there could be a spirit of cooperation among the various units, Nisbet

Sound financial planning is difficult when the millage allocation shifts every year, notes Leonard Andrus, county controller, who has had to contend with shifts amounting to as much as \$800,000 in county revenues in the last few years. School leaders throughout the county have indorsed the idea of stabilizing the millage, with full indorsement from school boards in Grand Rapids, East Grand Rapids, Sparta, Rock-ford, Comstock Park, Kentwood, Wyoming, Kenowa, Godwin and other districts.



American cars are highly gard the modern American car, prized abroad "because they run and run and run," says John R. Bond, publisher of the authoritative Road and Track and Car Life, and an automotive expert for 22 years.

"A well-used American car with 100,000 miles on the odometer can bring a fantastic price—in other lands," Bond writes in a September Reader's Digest article, "How Good Are American Cars?"

The secret of the superiority of American cars, he says, is the exhaustive pre-introduction testing techniques, often the equivalent of a million miles or more on the road.

An example, writes Bond is Rambler's all-new six-cylinder engine, announced in mid-1964. American Motors Corp. built ten experimental test engines (very expensive) and logged two million miles on these and pilot production-line samples. One test car with the new engine racked up 107,000 miles with only routine maintenance. Tests were run at such diverse

places as Phoenix, Arizona, and Bemidji, Minnesota In 1938 Chevrolet had 13,000 in sewing and fashions. There square feet devoted to lab tests; today more than 100,000 square feet are devoted to this purpose. A grueling test for the front suspension involves dupplication of driving over railroad ties for 1,000 miles.

Chrysler gives it optional fourspeed manual transmission accelerated laboratory tests equivalent to more than 100,000 miles of driving by the average owner. No part of the car is too insignificant to escape the laboratory. At the Ford Motor Company sample outside rearview mirrors are given a 96hour salt spray bath to test for plating quality.
