# Farm Bureau president calls for "No" vote

its recent annual meeting the Kent County Farm Bureau, largest farm organization he County, went on record against the proposed millage increase from 15 to 18 mills and the freezing of the allocations for each unit of government. This proposal will be voted on by the voters of the County November 16. The following reasons were

given for taking this stand:
1. Property and personal tax is not a fair method of raiding revenue to operate our various forms of government and schools. Taxes should be levied on the ability to pay. We believe complete tax reform must take place and the longer we attempt to patch our present system the more unfair it be-

2. The area that needs most increase in funds, our school system, still will not have sufficient money to operate. The amount allocated to the schools in the new proposal is only 1.98 mills. Many school districts now levy from 3 mill to 5 mill extra for school operation. If the proposed millage limit is raised it will be much more difficult to pass proposals for extra operational and construction needs.

3. We believe it is only right and proper that the various governmental units give an accounting of the money they have spent and to show the need for any additional monies. These then can be voted on by the people as needed.

4. It is not necessary to raise the 15 mill limitation to 18 mills to freeze the allocations to the various segements of government. This can be done by the vote of the people at the 15 mill limitation level also as provided in our new con-

5. The 3 mill increase is on state equalized valuation not on assessed valuation. In some townships this will mean as much as 9 mills in state equalized. This is excessive.

-6. The cost of this special election will cost you and I as taxpayers in the area of \$30,-If funds are so short, could not our governmental units not use this money for a

We urge all citizens to study the proposed millage increase voice your vote November




