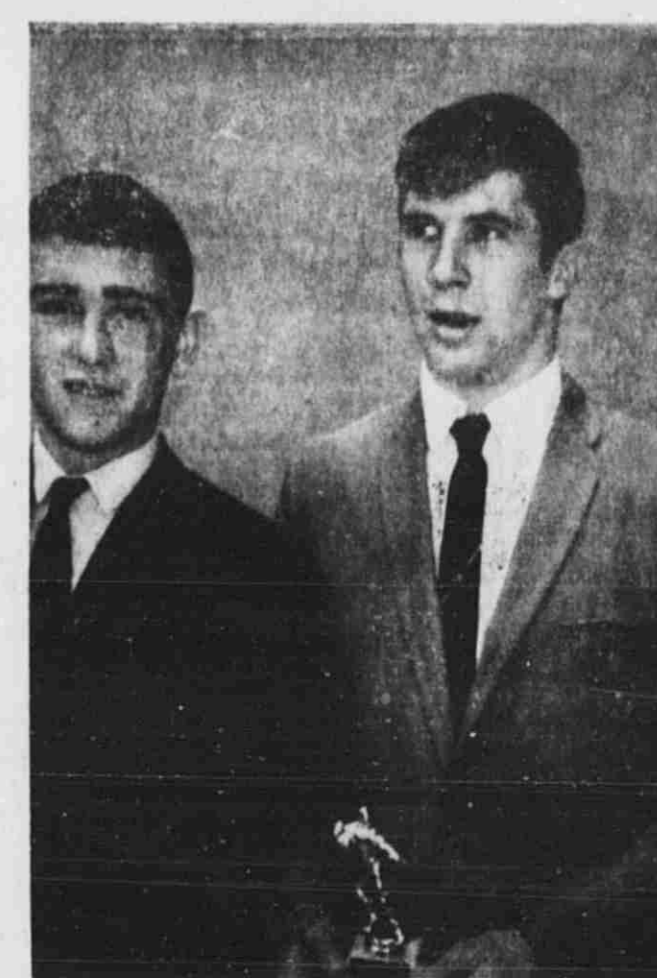

Royce Story seeks Band members easement to land start fruit cake sale; order now

Royce Story appeared at the City Council meeting on Monday evening to seek authority to use a road he built across property to reach two land-locked lots he purchased.

Story has a basement for a new home constructed on Reservoir Hill near the intersection of Shepard and Grindie Drive intersection. His trip to the council, was to ask the members if he could use a road he bulldozed 140 feet across city property without permission.

There was a heated discussion between council members and City Manager Bernard Olson, who pointed out that city property cannot be given away or sold under the charter, without following certain rules.

Some members of the council appeared to feel the manager was standing in the way of progress; others realized he was merely protecting all the citizen's property rights.

Under the charter any sale, lease or gift of city property must be tabled for 30 days before final action. This was done in this case in giving Story an easement 51x140 ft.

Any citizen who objects to the action of the council may protest to the manager or appear at the next meeting on December 6.

Letter to Editor

Pastor protests parent's disinterest

Dear Mr. Jefferies: I wish to thank you and your paper for bringing front page attention to the matter of teenage drinking and the concern which a number of the community have felt regarding this situation. The motivation which prompted a recent meeting of some forty Lowell Methodists and Congregationalists was a desire to attempt to better understand this problem and to determine what we as individuals might do to help curb the apparent increase of teens involved in illicit drinking.

I wish to clarify my thinking on the matter of penalties which your article correctly reported was discussed at the meeting. Although this matter of whether or not stronger penalties ought to be a part of school policies relating to drinking violations was discussed at length, the primary concern and intent was not that any degree of ruthlessness and insensitivity should enter into school discipline. It is clear that a cold, legalistic and heartless application of punishments is both unchristian and damaging to personal growth.

The fact that the discussion was as spirited and involved as it was clearly indicates that the primary concern was the attempt to determine what is a just and workable framework in which the highest levels of education and personal integrity might be encouraged.

Since the November 6 church meeting on this matter, I have attended the most recent meeting of the School Board & have continued to seek the views of a number of persons most directly involved in this problem.

I might say that at this point that the whole issue appears to have become highly complicated by a number of misunderstandings and breakdowns in communication regarding the interpretation of the present policy on training rules, by the fact that many concerned parents & citizens are discussing this issue without having fully investigated many of the major facets of the problem, and because in some instances personality clashes have clouded an objective approach.

Most difficult of all the complicating factors to deal with appears to be a lack of concern "in-the-home" among too many parents of the community. When too many parents appear too busy or disinterested in what their youth are doing or not doing, then the community has a problem.

Here is where the real responsibility lies so far as youth morality is concerned. The teachers, coaches, and School Board have had to attempt to deal with a most difficult situation because too many parents have apparently abdicated their responsibilities.

OPPOSE PEOPLE'S "RIGHT TO KNOW" BILL
Rep. Donald Rumsfeld (Ill.)... A freedom of information bill (S. 1180) has passed the Senate. Yet here in the House, the bill, H. R. 9012, introduced months ago, is still rattling around in committee. The only conceivable reason for lack of progress of this measure is the well-known and well-publicized White House opposition...

"It is significant to note that despite the unusually heavy legislative output, the House has failed once again to come to grips with the question of the public's right to know... This is a serious defeat for the people of this Nation and for our system of government that depends so fundamentally on an informed electorate..."

"The Freedom of Information Sub-committee began hearings on November 7, 1965, and since then has documented case after case of unauthorized withholding of information by Government agencies and Federal officials—from the press, the public and Congress..."

"The purpose of the proposed public records law is to require every agency of the Federal Government to 'make all records promptly available to any person' and to provide for court action to guarantee the right of access, with the exception of certain specified categories of sensitive Government information which would be exempted from the disclosure requirement..."

"Almost without exception, non-Government witnesses who testified were in support of the bill, and witnesses who testified on behalf of the executive branch were in opposition to the bill..."

"From the hearings it appears that the fact of the matter is that the executive agencies do not intend to settle for anything short of unlimited discretion if they can help it... Appropriately, and in their credit, the Senate, on October 13, 1965, passed unanimously a bill clarifying and protecting the right of the public to information. The other body has done its work well in this regard, as it did in the last Congress. Only House action remains..."

"My remarks today are intended simply to inform the House and the American people of the fact that while the first session of the 89th Congress has passed a great deal of legislation, it has failed to secure freedom of information..."

1,730,000 diabetics in United States

Almost everyone knows something about diabetes. And a lot of what we think we know isn't so.

The experts have estimated that there are more than 1,730,000 known diabetics in the United States, and that there are about 1,400,000 more Americans who have diabetes and don't know it. These figures are plus untold hundreds of thousands more who may develop diabetes if they don't follow a balanced diet, keep their weight down and have periodic physical examinations by their doctors to detect early changes in how their bodies use sugar.

What is diabetes?
It is a disorder in which the body cannot make full use of some of the foods we eat—mainly the carbohydrates, or sugars and starches.

Diabetes can be controlled by planned diet, exercises and, in many cases, insulin or oral medication. Well-controlled diabetes can lead active and useful lives.

Most likely candidates for diabetes are overweight persons past the age of 40, particularly those who are related to diabetes, and especially older women. But diabetes can hit anyone at any age.

Symptoms in advance cases include increase in thirst, constant hunger, frequent urination, loss of weight, itching, easy tiring, changes in vision and slow healing of cuts and scratches.

To encourage Americans to find out whether they have diabetes, the week of November 14-21 has been named Diabetes Week. To find out whether you have diabetes, visit your doctor and ask to be given a test. Many communities will have special detection programs during the week. Call your county medical society or diabetes organization for information.

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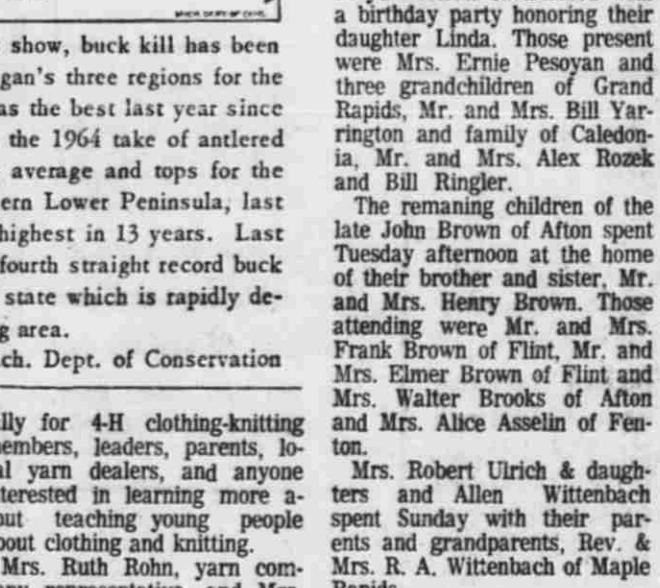
