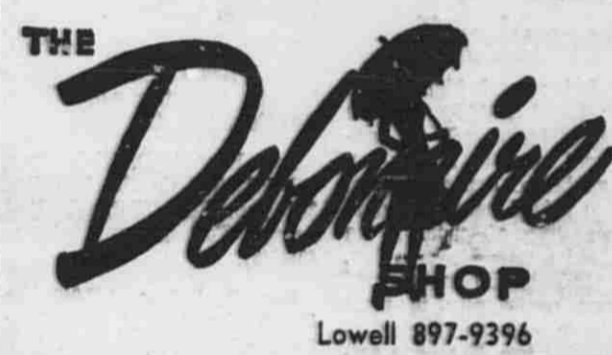

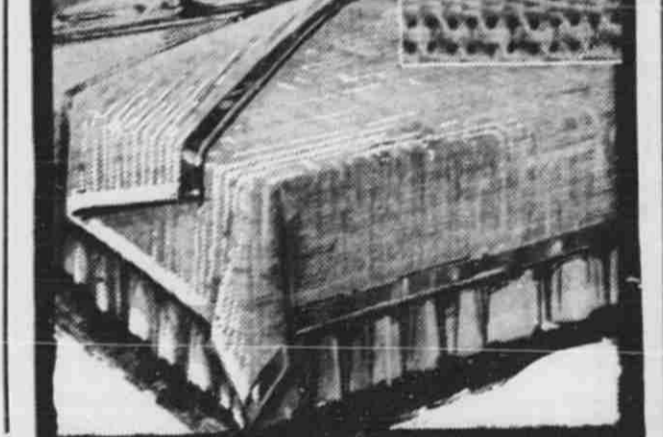
Camp Fire Girls
