# City report reveals fine record of **Light and Power Plant earnings**

The annual report of the verine Cooperative. city, just released with figures from July 1, 1964 to June 30, 1965, reveals that the operating income of the Lowell Light & Power Company increased nearly \$30,000 in the past year. The income for the same period of 1963-64 was \$34,997 and for the period just report-

ed. \$64,114. Manager of the Light & Pow-er, Jake Callier attributed the increase in earnings to fewer employees, decreased maintenance expense and more efficient operation, by being tied into the Wolverine Cooperative system and buying a large percentage

of the power needs. He reported that this report only reflects a few months of operation of the new gas engine, which will also help the earnings of the plant with much cheaper cost of generation.

Gross earnings of the Light & Power increased \$18,062 over the previous year's report with the 1964-65 total earnings of \$303,558, which is approaching the highest figures reported in 1962 of \$311,534, which was recorded before selling the rural lines. This sale of rural lines to Consumers Power took about one-third of the customers of the Lowell plant.

#### Operating Expense Down

While gross earnings are up \$18,000 the operating expenses of the plant decreased \$11,000 in the past year. Over this year, the plant has purchased \$80,000 in fuel, both gas & oil, to run the diesel generating units and has purchased \$56, 000 worth of power from Wol-

The new gas diesel engine installed less than a year ago has already operated 5,000 hours. This is as much on one engine as the two engines purchased for stand-by produced in the preceeding 10 years and at an average cost of slightly less than buying power from Wolverine.

#### Reduce Debt \$150,000

The report also revealed that the Light & Power plant has reduced its debt to \$40,000 as of June 30, 1965. This has been further reduced in the past five months so that as of now the utility owed only \$25,000 with the final payment of \$10,000 next September.

This means in the period from 1960 to 1965 the plant has reduced its indebtedness \$150, 000 and the entire \$190,000 owed in 1960 will be liquidated in September 1966.

Along with this fine showing the plant has put in a new gas diesel generating unit which was paid for from earnings and insurance money received after a fire at the hydro plant. Improvements have been made yearly in the lines and the cost of the tie-in with Wolverine Cooperative and the new substation this tie-in required was paid for from earnings and money received from sale of

The Light & Power is operated by a board appointed by the city council. Present members of the board are King Doyle, Dr. Orval McKay and M. Jack Fonger.



Man's fall was due to the disobedience of one; his restoration comes through the obedience of one. How is that possible? It is possible or impossible depending on the position which such a man is holding. The daily acts of us, ordinary citizens, are not likely to affect the course of history. But an act of the president or prime minister may affect the country, not because the president is different from any any other man, but because of the position which he holds.

There is no position quite as unique as that of the father of the human race. Therefore the disobedience of father Adam had an influence far beyond any other act of any of his children-not because he was different from any of his children, but because of the position which he held as their father.

The greatest thing which ever happen-ed to us, since Adam, is the coming of Jesus Christ into the world. He was given to us as "second Adam." And therefore, because of that position, His acts have an influence as wide as the human race: His death is our death, His resurrection is our resurrection, by His obedience the sinners are made righteous.

We can belong to either of two men. like so many branches of two trees. All men are either "in Adam" or "in Christ." The first are known by their disobedience, the latter glory in the obedience




