Mr. Radford retired October 31, 1960, after completing 38 years and 13 days in the postal service. He transferred to Lowell on September 16, 1943, as rural route carrier on Route 3.

He entered the postal service at Middleville, Michigan, as rural letter carrier on February 17, 1917, with a route of 301/4 miles. On April 1, 1918, he transferred to Route 6, Hastngs, with a route of 24% miles long. In November he resigned from this route to take over

Mr. and Mrs. Radford and their daughter, Helen, moved from Hastings to Grand Rapids on July 1, 1926, where Charles re-entered the postal service as City Carrier; he then transferred to Lowell,



Anyway, they bought it, sold as much of it as they could at the auction, brought the rest home with them. They proceeded to advertise the lot in the hope of getting their invest-ment back, at least, dealers appeared to look over the collection and to buy and they advised the two of them make buving tours around the countryside, and lo and behold they were in business

Chris and Leona worked tobether for a little while, but gradually Mrs. Gallagher dropped out and Mrs. Borgerson worked alone, although as she says Norm has always helped

She gradually branched out, putting ads in the local papers in many communities around Michigan, as well as the Ledger, staying in the town sometimes for several days waiting for replies to her ad, or employing someone to take the names and addresses for her and then checking back on them, later.

"Then", she says, "came

that Canada was a wonderful place to buy, so she made many buying trips over there.

She also went with Norm on his business trips outside the state buying in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Indiana, etc., when gas rationing was in effect it was about the only way you could get very far from home.

### Senior Citizens' tax forms now available in Lowell Township

Forms for Senior Citizens seeking tax exemption, under recently enacted legislation are now available at the home of the Lowell Township Supervisor Ray W. Rittenger.

The new law, effective in 1966, allows some tax relief for property owners 65 years or older. Persons must be 65 before December 31, 1965.

Those seeking tax relief under the revised law, must present proof of age and ownership of property. In Lowell Township the up-

per limit of assessment which appears on your tax notice is approximately \$4,534. This can vary some by June, 1966.

The gross income must be under \$5,000 for husband and wife, if jointly with children or others, their income is also in-

# **New FM station** to open soon

A new FM radio station 7 miles north of Lowell near the intersection of Lincoln Lake Lake Avenue and 5 Mile Road will be starting regular broadcasting soon. The station affiliated with WION of Ionia and operated by Monroe MacPherson is now testing their equipment and plan to be on the air in the next few days.

WYON-FM will broadcast 5 a. m. to 12 midnight daily on a frequency of 101.3 with power of 50,000 watts. The station is housed in a new building with a 420 ft. tower, this building will contain the broadcast equipment, turn-tables and tape machines. The studios in Ionia will be connected by a micro-wave system to the station. The station is expected to cover an area within 75 miles of the station. The station, built at an es-

timated cost of \$60,00, will have an operating staff of four; all live broadcasts are expected to originate in Ionia.
