## David Fluger home from Viet Nam reveal's army's success in combat

Sgt. David Fluger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Fluger of Lowell, was home from fighting with the 1st Cavalry in Viet Nam to celebrate the New Year with his parents. He left Saigon on December 24 after completing his three year enlistment in the army.



Sgt. Fluger was a machine gunner on jeep patrol on the well known route 19 that runs across Viet Nam. He landed with the 1st Cavalry Air Mobile in September on a beach and had been in constant contact with the enemy for the past 4 months.

In an interview with the Lowell Ledger this week, he reported that in his opinion "the war was going well for the U. S. and the men in his unit were doing a real job in winning the war." In daily contact with VC units in his patrols on route 19, across the small country, he said, "the enemy was smart and tough, but the Americans with fine help from the South Viet Namese were winning."

Fluger revealed that the spirits and morale of the men in his unit were high and they were satisfied with the way the war was being conducted. He also revealed that the casualties to his division were to a large extent from disease and accidents that occurred in combat with green troops. He pointed out that the clever Viet Cong took advantage of the fear the GI's had of mis-directed fire by U. S. artillery and dropped mortar rounds into the American troops to make them think that their own artillery were dropping short of their intended target.

them are dangerous. Men who disobeyed orders were killed when they wandered off and fell to snipers or booby traps that were everywhere.

Viet Namese villages along route 19 had tunnels and underground bunkers in nearly every house. Fluger's patrol unit often tried to force the VC out of their tunnels, but many times the enemy died underground rather than come out and fight.

### Conditions Hard on Men

Living conditions were hard on the men. The mud and rain made finding a dry bed and comfort difficult, Fluger said, "he went through 3 pair of boots and lost 20 pounds in the four months he was there. The food was mostly C rations and many men were sick from malaria and other tropical diseases; clothing and shoes rotted almost while you were wearing them."

"The peace demonstrations by College and other youth in this country were well known to the fighting men in Viet Nam," Fluger said. The reaction of the men was mostly one of contempt for the peace creeps. "Least of all," Sgt. Fluger revealed, "was any desire to have them sent to Viet Nam to join the fighting forces." Most of the GI's in Viet Nam wanted nothing to do with the individual that cared so little for his country that he did not want to fight.

### Glad to be Home

Sgt. Fluger enlisted for 3 years in the army and spent 14 months in Korea where he was engaged in several border fire fights. He was moved into the 1st Cavalry Air Mobile after returning from Korea and went to Viet Nam to serve as the trained corp of the division in Viet Nam. Now many of the men who went back overseas with him are coming home at the completion of their hitch and they are being replaced with recent draftees.

One question asked Fluger about going back to Viet Nam he could quickly answer, "No, four months is plenty."

## Storm sewer system, curbs & gutters given priority for city improvement

Installation of a storm sewer system and improvement of city streets with curbs and gutters and widening were recommended to the Lowell City Council by the Planning Commission Monday night.

Under the city's master plan one of the most important steps to improve the city streets was given top priority by the Planning Commission. Installation of a storm sewer system would remove almost 50 percent of the effluent that will have to be treated in the new sewage treatment plant.

Savings would be very substantial and would allow the city to almost double in size before the treatment plant would be enlarged.

Storm sewers, curbs and gutters would be a valuable asset in improving the appearance of the community. Curbs and gutters cannot be installed until the storm sewer system has been completed.

City Manager Olson told the Council that preliminary estimates reveal that the cost of installing the storm sewers on the west side would be \$110,000 and the related street work would cost \$130,000. This is well within the city's ability to finance and still stay below the

level of bond payments recommended in the master plan.

Under plans being considered for the project, the west side would be done as one project followed in about 2 years by the east side.

Water Level Gauge  
The City Manager revealed that a water level gauge has been installed in the reservoir to assist in conserving water.

A record of the water level will enable the operator to start and stop the pumps according to the need. When the pumps are operated more than necessary, the excess water overflows the reservoir. Engineers' reports pointed out that Lowell's water loss of nearly 25 percent is somewhat more than average.

Further water pumping controls are under consideration for the water plant; estimated cost \$2,000.

## Rigid training set for Golden Glove hopefuls

A rigid program of boxing techniques and calisthenics is being imposed on the boys who show great promise as being candidates for the Golden Gloves tournament in 1966.

Jim Hutson of Route 2, Lowell, manager of the local hopefuls, and a man well trained in this sport, works out nightly with the boys at the Lowell YMCA field house at Recreation Park.

Approximately twelve to fifteen novice and open class competitors are working out at the facilities provided by the Lowell Athletic Club, in cooperation with the local YMCA.

In Second Year  
Terry Blough of Lowell, last year's West Michigan Golden Gloves champion in the novice division, is working out this year, to compete in the open division, in the 160-lb. weight class.

The open division is for boys 20 years or older who have won more than three amateur bouts. Blough in his championship year, won bouts in the quarter finals, the semi-finals and the finals before taking over the reign in his division. In his bid for the state championship, Blough lost on a decision in the title bout.

Also returning for another try in the novice division is Charles Marshall, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Marshall of Lincoln Lake Avenue, Lowell.

Marshall, showing a great improvement over last year when he competed in the 126-division, is one of the boys showing great promise, Hutson revealed.

Wrestlers Turn Boxers  
Turning from wrestling to boxing is Bruce Odell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Adelbert Odell of Route 1, Lowell. During his senior year at Lowell high school, 1964-65, Odell was one of the top wrestlers in the 133-lb. weight class in the Tri-River conference.

Odell, who has just enrolled for the fall term at Ferris State College, is working feverishly to improve his style and according to Hutson is rated as a good prospect for the Golden Gloves title.

Mike Foss, a 1964 graduate of Lowell high school, is another former high school wrestler, who has put on the gloves, and is working hard for a victory in the Golden Gloves.

in wrestling, track and cross-country, and excelled in all his encounters.

The title bouts for the State Championships will be held at the Civic on Saturday evening, February 12.

Hutson revealed Tuesday, that most of the boys who worked out last year, and were hoping to enter their second year of competition, have been drafted or have other commitments which make it impossible for them to train and compete.

With the candidates Hutson has working out, in the novice and open classes, he expects the club will make a good showing when tournament time arrives, the latter part of this month.

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

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



### Asserts policies boost prices

Senator George Murphy (R-Calif.) charged today that the actions of Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz in severely restricting admission to the United States of foreign workers to harvest crops has increased the cost of living and actually eliminated jobs for Americans.

Senator Murphy's statement was issued in reply to a recent defense by Wirtz of his experiment in which he tried to force the substitution of domestic workers for experienced crop harvesters who have normally come to this country seasonally from Mexico and other nearby nations.

"Recent statement of Secretary Wirtz concerning the California farm labor picture serve only to compound the already existing confusion which he has created. In my judgment he has misrepresented the facts and drawn misleading and unwarranted conclusions.

"If Mr. Wirtz's policies had brought employment to more American citizens and a healthier climate to our farming industry as he claims, I would indeed be delighted and join in the praise of his efforts. Unfortunately, this is not the case.

"Mr. Wirtz's recent statements have completely misrepresented what has happened to agriculture this past year. He has purposely overlooked the serious losses of crops suffered by our farmers, the thousands of acres of vegetables never planted, the increase in production costs, the exodus of many farmers seeking new locations in Mexico, and the increase in wholesale and retail prices.

"Mr. Wirtz's fantastic schemes have not provided our farmers with the workers they need for our expanding population with much-needed new jobs. In fact, in his attempt to

Happy summer days are gone, but need not be forgotten. Conjure up memories of sea and salad days with an exotic new crab-and-ice dish. A breeze to prepare, this chilled and sparkling flavor-combination of Chinese vegetables, pineapple juice and mayonnaise is guest-proof, too. It can be kept for hours in the refrigerator and served at your convenience. The recipe may be doubled to serve twelve, if desired.

- Tropical Crab Salad**
- 1 cup uncooked rice (NOT precooked variety)
  - 1 unseasoned pineapple juice
  - 1 pkg. (6-oz.) Frozen Alaska King crab meat, thawed and drained
  - 1 (1-1/2) can sliced Chinese vegetables, drained
  - 1 (5-oz.) can water chestnuts, drained and sliced
  - 1 cup fish diagonally sliced eel
  - 1/4 cup light cream or unseasoned pineapple juice
  - 2 cups real mayonnaise
  - 1/2 cup chopped scallions
  - 2 teaspoons curry powder

Cook rice according to directions on package, substituting unseasoned pineapple juice for water. Toss with crab meat, Chinese vegetables, water chestnuts and eel. Gradually blend cream or pineapple juice into real mayonnaise. Mix in scallions and curry powder. Toss with rice, eel, making well. Chill. Serve on salad greens. (Makes 6 servings.)

### Keeping warm when home heat fails

Power failures can result in some winter emergencies and leave homes without heat. If this should happen, the Rural Defense Office at the Michigan State University suggests these recommendations:

—Maintain the heat that is already in your home. Additional insulation such as shower curtains, plastic table cloths and towels should be placed over windows, doors, and other places where cold may enter.

—Make use of any other available heating methods such as fireplaces, camp stoves or lanterns. Your bed is the warmest place in the house if there are enough blankets available. Sleeping bags are excellent in these emergency situations.

—More people in one room will produce more body heat. Families or neighbors can gather in one room, and all will be warmer.
