#### Plane crash near Cascade kills pilot

R. Edsel Jones of Grand Rapids was killed early Friday morning when his single engine year-old Piper Comanche crashed just off Cascade Road near the intersection of Timpson. Picture at the top shows many from this area searching along the 250-ft. long path where the plane crashed for personal effects of the pilot. His watch, wallet and personal papers were found along several hundred feet of the field. His body was thrown about 150 feet beyond the plane wreckage pictured below. Early morning snow storm hid the wreckage of the plane which crashed in an open field just 100 yards beyond the home of Charles E. Anderson and that of Harvey Merklinger. No one heard the crash and it was nearly noon on Friday before the wreckage was discovered.
