Six-day parcel post delivery

The President today directed Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien to take steps to increase window service where needed in some 15,000 Post Offices, and to resume six-day-aweek Parcel Post Delivery in 6 091 cities "A good, stable, dependable

Postal System is vital to the well-being of the Nation's economy", President Johnson said, in granting the Postmaster General authority to seek service improvement funds from Congress. "I want you to explore all the techniques available to modernize our Postal Service and make certain that they are being used to provide the American people with the best Postal System in the world at the lowest possible cost to the taxpayer." The Postmaster General said that the service improvements will be made as soon as the Congress provides the funds-hopefully within the next months

Under the Postmaster General's proposal, six-day Parcel Post Delivery would be restored in 6,091 cities where delivery routes served by foot carriers are now receiving Parcel Post Delivery only five days a week. One delivery day is skipped each week in the cities, though on routes served by mounted carriers, six-day Parcel Delivery has been maintained.

Post Office Window Hours and Parcel Post Delivery Service were cut back by the Post Office Department as an economy measure in May, 1964. Postmaster Charles Dovle an-

nounced this week that the Lowell Post office would make parcel post deliveries on Tuesdays, boosting their delivery to six days a week, in conjunction with this program.

Council divided over contractor to build sewage treatment plant

The Lowell City Council split 3-2 on awarding the contract to build a sewage treatment plant last Wednesday at a spec-

Richard Schlernitzauer, Phillip Schneider and Charles Doyle voted awarding the contract to John F Sadler of Milford for a bid of \$327,775, and Mayor Arnold Wittenbach and Herbert Reynolds voted to give the contract to the low bidder Erhardt Construction Company of Grand Rapids, on a bid of \$327,400. The Milford firm won the contractor would not hire loca! help. Mr. Erhardt stated he could

tract award on the 3-2 vote. Several Lowell citizens, who belong to the AFL Carpenter's Union, claimed they will be able to work at home if the Sadler Company was given the job. Some of these men are presently working for Sadler, who is constructing a similar plant in Ionia

Engineer Recommends-

The clerk read a letter from Williams & Works' Engineer Mr. Kenneth Anderson in which he confirmed Mr. Sadler's qualifications to fulfill contract requirements. He pointed out irregularities in Mr. Sadler's bid: failure to sign the contract, failure to list completion date and list of sub-contractors, all of which could be waived by Council. He also cited the need to justify to the Public Health Department an award to other than the low qualified bidder and stressed the importance of making awards to low bidders when they are qualified. He reiterated his recommendation of accepting the low bid of Erhardt Company. Councilman R. Schlernitzauer

asked regarding the seriousness of refusing the low bid, as far as the Federal grant was concerned. Manager Olson replied that if other than the low bid is accepted, reasons justifying the award must go forward to the Federal office and if they disallowed it, we would be back where we started in the beginning, Councilman Schlernitzauer stated he personally did not feel it was a serious thing not to accept the low bid, & that no one came to urge acceptance of the low bid, but the people have requested that the City accept the second-low bid, that the other bidders were union contractors. The Manager said it would be a breach of faith not to have set forth in the pre-qualifications the need to be a union contractor, if now it is **Erhardt Questions**

Mr. Erhardt asked for a summary of the reasons for rejection of his bid and Mr. Olson stated it was primarily a matter of union representatives and local tradesmen who are members of the various locals expressing their desire that the contract be awarded to the second low bidder by reason of his being a union contractor and would hire local help, with the implication that a non-union con-

not understand a union man making statements for a contractor. He stated he himself is a union contractor, not affiliated with the AFL but with the CLA which is a bonafide labor organization certified by the State Labor people. He stated he bid the job in good faith at open invitation, there is no, difference in the rate he would be paying than AFL workers would receive, that members of the CLA choose that union by choice over the AFL. He further stated that his firm ordinarily sub-lets some of the work, the major portion, & this time has an AFL subcontractor named in his bid. He hires carpenters, laborers, steel workers and they are paid the rate determined by the Federal Government. He repeated that he had bid in good faith, was substantially below the estimated cost, was substantially below the two bids submitted a year ago by AFL contractors.

Mr. Erhardt stated that his company had done other sew-age treatment plant work, was recommended by the engineer as qualified financially and physically to do the work and he wanted to do it.

He repeated that no group of people had a right to come to the Council and make statements for another contractor when they would have nothing to do with whom he hired. He hires people on a merit basis, capable, willing to work and qualified. He stated he has documentary proof as to the quality of workers they use and as CLA workers compare with AFL. He said he had no quarrel with Mr. Sadler but even if his bid were \$1.00 lower he would fight to get the bid. In all fairness, he repeated, his company is qualified, his bid is complete. in every detail; Mr. Sadler's bid is in a form that ordinarily would have been discarded

tors and it was not signed. To allow another bidder to change complete date, or to add a completion date or list sub-contractors after the bid was received, is no more fair than to call in a bidder and ask him if he wants to do the job. He repeated that he wanted to do the job and could see that the real issue was that "we don't hire ople who are card carrying

Legal council for Erhardt Company added he would recommend discarding Erhardt's bid if it "were in the best interests of the community, by disregarding the low bid the City could be placed in jeopardy with the Public Health Service and other agencies, that his bid is in order and his competitor's was not; of all the local people that can be lined up, local tradesmen, are working so no one would be losing work. He added that Mr. Sadler was from the Detroit area & some of his workers would be from much further way; Erhardt's would be from the Grand Rapids-Lowell area and therefore, would be more in the "best interests of the community."

Mr. Erhardt added that they were not opposed to hiring lo cal people, that they could hire and have hired card bearing AFL men, had several on the payroll at the present time. & that if the job went to Mr. Sadler he might not necessarily have more local labor; if the union cannot furnish it to him, he has complete freedom to hire in the area he prefers.

Sadler Quiet

Mr. Sadler was called on, but stated he had nothing to say. Manager Olson wished to make it know for the record, how-ever, that Mr. Sadler came to him the day after the Council meeting, let it be known that he had no idea union representatives planned to be present at the Council meeting and that he wanted Council to know that he was not interfering.

A local citizen and tradesmen stated that the skilled men around here were working but if there was a union job in town they would be working locally and not driving into Grand Rapids or other areas, that the union always places them in the closest job.

since it listed no sub-contrac- the city manager for his recommendation. Manager Olson stated he would like to go on record as recommending that the engineer's recommendation be accepted, for five reasons:

amount, is still \$375.00. Councilman Doyle stated that he had been approached by five people of the City who have asked him to support Sadler's bid because they are AFL and would have a chance to work on it. No one else had come to ask him to support the low bid-

Mayor for Low Bid

Mayor Wittenbach expressed his opinion that Erhardt's bid was low, he had met specifications in all respects and Mr. Sadler's bid was lacking in some requirements, the Erhardt Company was qualified according to our engineers and in his opinion the Erhardt Company should be awarded the contract.

Councilman Schneider asked Mr. Sadler what experience his company had in the construction of sewage treatment plants. Mr. Sadler replied that he had constructed nine such plants and specializes in their construction. He does not do other general contract work.

He than asked Mr. Erhardt how many plants his company had constructed. Mr. Erhardt answered that his company had built one plant similar to that proposed for Lowell and had worked in major revisions of several other plants. He stated he had personal experience with other contractors, in construction of several other plants.

Reynolds Speaks

Councilman Reynolds stated that he felt strongly that awarding this contract to other than the low bidder would jeopardize the bidding procedure and discourage bidders in the future. He also stated that he felt the recommendation of the engineers retained by the City and that of the City Manager should
