Final requests and fees are now being accepted for the Summer Topical Fluoride program to be held in Alto Area. This program is being sponsored by the Alto Mothers Club in cooperation with the Kent on the staging, rehearsals and County Health Department and the Michigan Department of

The topical application of sodium fluoride to newly erupted teeth will reduce new tooth decay by 40 percent in groups of children. In addition to these benefits the program offers a valuable educational experience with no discomfort involved, and dental health education is

given the child by the clinic personnel The entire procedure consists of four visits to the topical fluoride clinic which will be held in the Alto Elementary

school. At the first visit the teeth are cleansed and the first application is given. An application of sodium fluoride consists of the teeth being isolated with cotton rolls; then the teeth are dried with compressed air and a 2 percent solution of sodium fluoride is applied to the teeth. 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
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
