Consumers to make refund to customers

Consumers Power Company's natural gas customers this week began getting a share of the refunds, recently received by Consumers Power from its natural gas suppliers,

The Company in passing on the customer's share of the refunds in the form of a credit on their next bill. Gas space heating customers will receive credits averaging about \$1.50.
Gas customers who do not use space heating service will receive credits averaging about 30 cents.

The refund is going to customers who took gas service from the Company during October. November and December of 1965, and who still were customers of the Company on Mar.

Those who changed their ad-dress after December will have to apply to Consumers Power directly, before July 1, if they want their refund.

The refund credit is going to some 697,000 customers as a result of lower wholesale gas rates than those originally collected by the suppliers. The to-tal amount returnable to customers of the Company was set at \$1,326,122 by the Michigan Public Service Commission in March 1966


