Salary

The 1966-67 teachers' salary schedule has been accepted by both the teacher's bargaining organization and the Lowell Area

School, Board of Education. Most important element in the new salary increases is in the rewards to the experienced members of the staff.

After six years in the Lowell school system, the teachers will receive an annual increment of \$265 for the next six years,

Beginning teachers will \$500 more than in 1965, but the older teachers, in many cases, will be earning \$1,000 more in

To acquaint the citizens of the community with the scope of the process of paying degree teachers, in the local system, we are printing the sal-ary schedule portion of the new teaching contract.

Planning for senior citizen housing unit

Plans are being developed for a million dollar senior citizen's housing project in the city, by thirty Lowell area organizations, who have set up an executive committee to formulate plans. Each of the sponsoring organizations have been asked to make a small contribution to show their good faith.

The executive committee named, has eight members—C. H. Runciman, Ray Rittenger, Phil Schneider, Wesley Roth, the Rev. Charles Davis, Norton Avery, King Doyle and Dr. Don-ald Gerard.

The committee is meeting weekly with representatives of ACTION, who are surveying the needs of the community.

See Need

The preliminary studies of the needs of the community revealed that a 50 to 60 unit for senior citizens could serve the Lowell area. The committee is searching for a 2 to 3 acre site close to the downtown area to build a one story housing unit.

The community survey has also shown the need for low-cost housing in the community. The representatives from ACTION, see a future program of about 50 units which would be available under a goverment housing construction policy. Total cost of this unit would also be about a million dollars.

Money for the projects is being sought from various federal programs, which ACTION has access. Application for the funds will be made as soon as community studies are complete and sites for the two units are

Trim Passion Vine

In one corner of the greenhouse, there is a Passion Vine, that has grown through the pot and into the ground. Recently it had to be trimmed because it had scrawled over too large an area, but it sets off handsomely the bronze red Hawaiian I'i potted beside it.

The Passion vine is covered with buds, which will flower soon, and Mrs. Godfrey hopes it will produce fruit; the tasty passion fruit of the tropics. The Passion vine was so named, because the showy flowers have a resemblance to the wounds and the crown of thorns of

There is also a lemon tree, which sadly enough hasn't produced lemons yet, tropical hi-biscus growing tall and rhodo-dendrons ready to blossom. In one corner, stands a Star Pine, a sturdy little pine tree, whose technical name is Norfolk Is-land Pine, it is growing beauti-

fully, but must remain in the greenhouse as the species isn't hardy in this climate.

Vie For Attention

The peppermint-scented gera-niums with their furry leaves vie for attention with the trailing geranium with the variegated ivy-shaped leaves in pink

There is an orchid cactus sitting high on a shelf that is covered with blossoms, bright red, shaped somewhat like that of the Christmas Cactus, but these flowers on the tips of the thorny plant are nearly as large as grapefruit, and they

As Mrs. Godfrey moves thru the greenhouse, gently touching flat of tiny seedling coleus adjusting the shade over the tender Asters or twining an ivy vine out of the pathway, it is obvious that she would rather tend these growing things than

do any other work in the world. There is nothing like a greenhouse, full of a world of plants, in her opinion, especially on a frosty January morning when the rest of the world outside is frozen and dormant.



BLOUSES

With the approval of the Michigan Public Service Commission, Consumers Power Company will refund to its gas customers during the next few weeks a pro rata share of refunds recently received by Consumers Power from its suppliers of natural gas. Refunds are to be made in the form of credits on customer bills mailed after April 4, 1966.

To be eligible for a refund, the customer must have received gas service from Consumers Power Company during October November and December, 1965 and must have been a customer of the Company on March 25, 1966. The amount of individual refunds will be based on each customer's gas usage during the last three months of 1965. Customers using gas to heat their homes during that period will receive refunds averaging \$1.50; non space heating customers will receive refunds averaging 30 cents.

* Customers who moved since December may not receive the refund automatically in the form of a credit on their next bill, because of their change of address. To obtain their refund, these customers should apply to their nearest Consumers Power Company office no later than July 1, 1966. The Company urges these customers to contact Consumers Power Company as soon as possible



The average "convenience-food meal" for four persons costs 23 cents more than a home-prepared meal. But the preparation time is only 32 minutes, compared with 119 minutes for the home-fixed meal.


