'Lights on' Variety show set for May 5 for cancer

The annual "lights on" house to house Cancer Crusade in the City of Lowell and Kent County will be held Thursday evening, April 28.

Over 8,500 volunteers, working on behalf of the Kent County Unit of the American Cancer Society, will call on Kent County residents asking them to "give more to save more" lives from cancer. The army of volunteers will also distribute literature on cancer prevention.

Lowell's crusade will be sponsored by the Business and Professional Women's Club, under the direction of Mrs. James Topp, president of the organization.

A total of \$59,060 was raised during the house to house campaign last year. County chairman, William Hoffines, expects the total to exceed this year. The goal of the month long crusade has been pegged at \$120,500. Volunteer workers raised \$1,500 in the City of Lowell last year.

Mrs. Alice K. (Alex) Rozek, aged 56, 9360—28th Street, Lowell, passed away unexpectedly Saturday, April 23, in the Osteopathic Hospital in Grand Rapids.

Mrs. Rozek suffered a severe stroke, sometime Thursday evening, while at work at Root-Loell Manufacturing Company in Lowell.

Her family, alarmed because she failed to return home at the regular time, found her unconscious on the floor of the plant, about 3 a. m. Friday.

Mrs. Rozek was a life-long member of the Snow Methodist Church; and had worked in the Lowell area for several years.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, April 26, at Roth Funeral Home in Lowell. The Reverend Ira Noordhoff officiated, and interment was made in Cascade Cemetery.

Surviving besides her husband, Alex, is a brother, Lloyd Bertran, 9353—28th Street, Ada; one sister, Mrs. Mary Pesoyan of Grand Rapids; and several nieces and nephews.

Sp4 Wm. Wright wins Bronze Star

Sp4 William R. Wright has been awarded the Bronze Star medal with "V" device. The award was made for heroism in connection with military operations on December 5, 1965, in the Republic of Viet Nam.

The report states that Sp4 W. R. Wright distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous action as a medical aidman to a unit on a search and destroy operation in the vicinity of Ap Nha Mt. Republic of Viet Nam.

Although painfully wounded in the leg and head and bleeding profusely, he refused treatment and continued to aid his fellow comrades. Ignoring the intensive hostile fire, he moved among the wounded until his medical supplies were exhausted.

By his heroic action Sp4 Wright saved the lives of many of his comrades. His display of aggressiveness, devotion to duty and personal bravery were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

The award was given by direction of the President.

Reveal plans for shopping center

At the meeting of the Lowell City Planning Commission Monday evening, Douglas Dok, who is developing the Valley Vista Plat on West Main Street, requested zoning changes to permit L. V. Eberhard to build a 10,000 square foot super market, with 100 parking spaces, and approve a proposed shopping center.

The area, asked to be made available for this shopping center project, would consist of seven acres, just west of Calvary Christian Church on West Main Street.

Plans for the Eberhard super market call for construction, some 700 feet west of the church, with an entrance off Main Street, on the new street being completed in that area.

Immediate plans call for erection of a super market building, 150 x 120, followed by other retail establishments, as the shopping center grows.

Planning Commission members have yet to make their decision on how big an area can be zoned as neighborhood C-1 commercial, at this location.

According to the zoning map and the original planning, only about three acres was set up in this location for neighborhood stores.

The Planning Commission plans to meet Thursday afternoon, at 4 p. m., to render their decision on this proposal.

Mr. Dok told the Planning Commission that Eberhard does not plan to abandon his present East Main Street location, that he rents from William Christensen. At this location is his ice cream company, that turns out most of the ice cream sold in Big E and Eberhard super markets.

Also located in this building is the self-serve laundry. Where the present grocery store is, the vacancy will be used for another type of business.

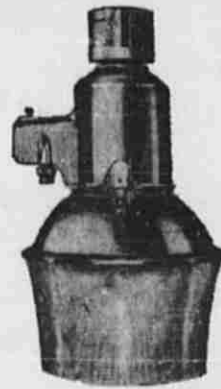
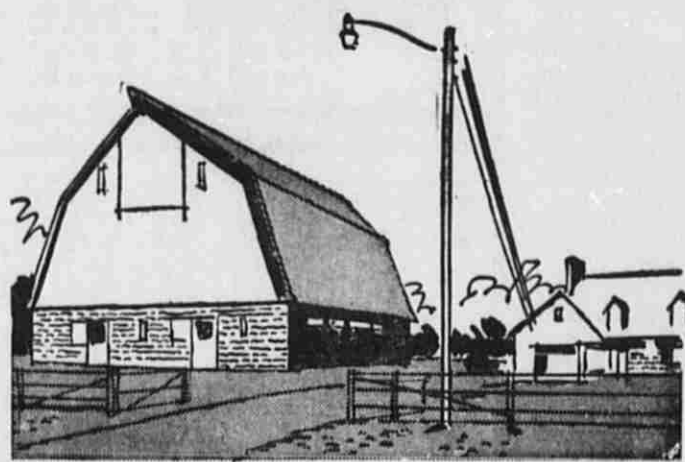

Janeland Boris Lucky Strike 5329020, a three-year-old, had 15,170 lbs. of milk and 609 lbs. of butterfat in 299 days; and Janeland Beth Roburke Var 5332938, a three-year-old, had 15,210 lbs. of milk and 564 lbs. of butterfat in 305 days.

All are owned by James B. Cook, jr., of Route 1, Lowell. Reformatory Pioneer Papuan 5085152, a four-year-old, produced 19,530 lbs. of milk and 630 lbs. of butterfat in 365 days; Reformatory Crestvale Russell 5161576, a three-year-old, had 19,550 lbs. of milk and 684 lbs. of butterfat in 305 days. Both are owned by Michigan Reformatory, Ionia.

These new production figures may be compared to the estimated annual output of 7,880 lbs. of milk and 285 lbs. of butterfat by the average U. S. dairy cow, notes the national Holstein Association.

The Michigan State Univer-

sity supervised the sampling, weighing and testing operations in cooperation with the Holstein organization's herd and breed improvement programs.

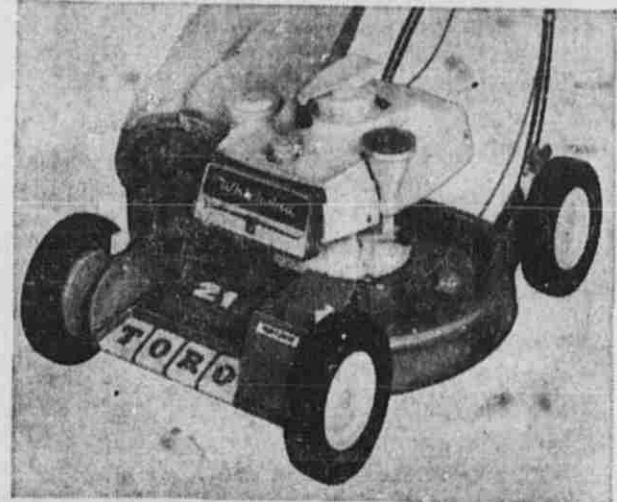
