Sp4 William R. Wright has been awarded the Bronze Star medal with "V" device. The award was made for heroism in connection with military operations on December 5, 1965, in the Republic of Viet Nam.

The report states that Sp4 W. R. Wright distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous action as a medical aidman to a unit on a search and destroy operation in the vicinity of An Nha Mst. Republic of Viet Nam. Although painfully wounded in the leg and head and bleeding profusely, he refused treatment and continued to aid his fellow comrades. Ignoring the intensive hostile fire, he moved among the wounded until his medical supplies were exhaust-

By his heroic action Sp4 Wright saved the lives of many of his comrades. His display of aggressiveness, devotion to duty and personal bravery were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United






