Superintendent, Nisbet, resigns

Lowell Area School's Superintendent Stephen Nisbet announced this week his resignation as superintendent of schools effective June 30. He told the Board of Education of his decision to leave the administration department of education, and return to the teaching end of the profession.

Mr. Nisbet has offered to work closely with a new superintendent, the board will have to hire to replace him, to make the transition as smooth as possible. He may remain in the community and is considering an offer by the Board of another position in the school system, outside of the administration department.

Nisbet in talking to the Ledger on Monday said that he has been considering this move for some time, and his decision was based on his desire to have more time with his family, and leave the many problems that an administrator faces at this time. He said he likes Lowell and has enjoyed his 19 years in the community.

Served Six Years

Mr. Nisbet took over the duties of superintendent on July 1, 1960, after the retirement of Walter W. Gumsier. Under his administration the school system has about doubled, and a new high school and elementary school in Alto has been constructed. Presently the school system has a \$750,000 program expansion under way; the bonds

for this work will be sold as soon as the state authorizes issuing the bonds.

Nisbet was born in Fremont and completed his high school education there, where his father was superintendent of schools. He attended Alma College and came to Lowell to teach social science and coach the cross-country team in the fall of 1947. He received his masters degree in administration from the University of Michigan.

He was given the position of principal of the high school in 1951 and became superintendent in 1960. In the community, he has held nearly every office in the First Congregational Church including that as Superintendent of the Sunday School. He is a charter member of the Lions Club, which he has also headed. Mr. Nisbet was instrumental in organizing the Lowell Branch of the YMCA and served as president of the local board of managers.

He is now serving on the Lowell Planning Commission and has been involved in most all community activities including Showboat, of which he is now secretary of the board of directors. He was an endman on the Showboat program for many years.

As an administrator and educator he has been President of Kent County M.E.A.; President of Region 9, Chairman of 9-13 M.E.A. Convention; and a member of the Advisory Committee for Special Education.

Increased labor costs to boost city's budget during 1966-67 year

A general wage increase is expected to boost the new city budget, approved Monday night, by the Council, from \$161,500 last year, to \$183,620 during the coming year.

A public hearing on the budget will be held on Thursday, May 26, in the City Hall.

Increased wages have come in every department. City Manager, Bernard Olsons salary will be raised from \$8,250 to \$9,000.

The City clerk-treasurer, Mrs. Shepard, will be boosted from \$5,220 to \$5,720, a year. The Police Chief Avery Block will be increased from \$5,691 to \$6,250, and Fire Chief Frank Baker will be raised from \$500 a year, to \$1,200.

Members of both the fire and police departments will be given an increase, along with the workers in the street and sanitation departments.

Maintain 10 Mill Rate

The new budget calls for the same 10 mill tax rate for the coming year; increased revenues are expected from sales tax and additions to the tax

An Editorial! . . .

Are we against progress?

The decision of the Lowell City Planning Commission to refuse to permit commercial retail development on West Main Street has been characterized by many in the community as being a roadblock to progress.

I am sure in my own mind that the majority of the planning commission in making their decision last Thursday not to allow L. V. Eberhard to build an 18,000 square foot supermarket and other associated retail business places on seven acres along West Main Street was one they felt in the best interest of the city. Still it

could be construed by many citizens as a move to prevent business competition in the community.

In my opinion nothing should stand in the way of allowing Eberhard to build a shopping center of this magnitude. Lowell needs more business traffic and a large shopping center would certainly be a big assist to keep Lowell in the forefront as a shopping center.

The decision of the planning commission was well intended, but should not give Eberhard the feeling that the city does

not want growth. If the location on West Main Street is not right for orderly city growth then a substitute location must be found that is acceptable to Eberhard. It is the duty of the planning commission, the council, and the city manager to take immediate steps to offer alternative sites and if necessary city help in securing them. A new shopping center is just as important as a new industry to the community and we should make all the effort necessary to encourage growth in the business community.

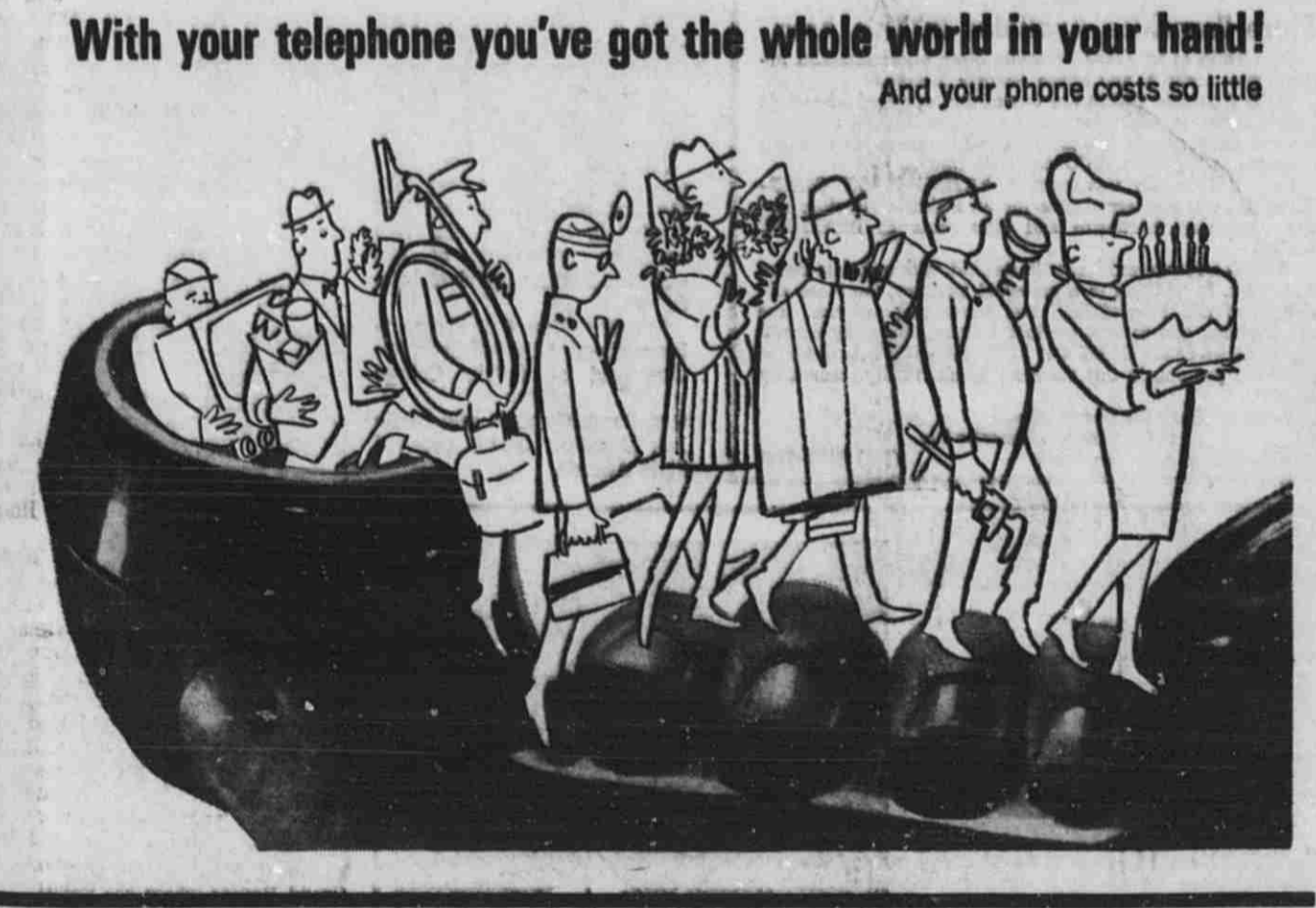

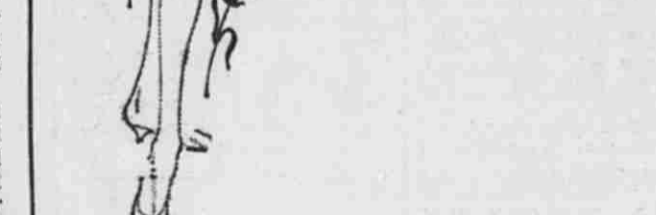
