## Planning Commission seeks urban renewal

At a meeting of the Lowell Planning Commission on Monday, approval was given to make a preliminary feasibility study and to apply for federal urban renewal funds for the city.

Plans discussed called for clearing the south side of Main Street, between Lafayette Street and Monroe, back to the railroad tracks; an area of about 4 acres.

Planning Consultant Walter Bagby, told the Planning Commission that there was at least a four to six year delay in getting the work underway, if funds were sought through urban renewal. The federal government would pay three-quarters of the cost of clearing an area that was found to be qualified under urban renewal.

Property in this 4 acre site is owned by R. G. Chrouh, N. E. Borgerson, the Moose Lodge, the Odd Fellows Lodge, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Flugler,

Lowell Granite Co., and the King Milling Co.

No estimate of the cost of acquiring the land and clearing it has been made at this time. The preliminary study that will be given to the Planning Commission at their June 13 meeting will give them an idea as to what amount of money is involved.

**Eberhard Forces Action**  
The request of Dok Realty Company to rezone a 7 acre area site on West Main Street for an expanded Eberhard Store has forced the Planning Commission to move to find additional commercial property to expand the business district.

Land cleared in the urban renewal area would be sold to any business that wants to build. But unless part of this area is cleared under some other plan it would be several years before this shopping plaza or center would be ready for development.

## Mrs. Effie Cox, correspondent, dies; rites held

Mrs. Effie Cox, McCords area news correspondent for the Lowell Ledger and Suburban Life, passed away Sunday, May 22, at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids, following a heart attack two weeks ago.

Widow of the late John Cox of Quiggle Avenue, Cascade Township, Mrs. Cox was 76 years old; born October 25, 1889.

The Rev. Raymond Gaylord, pastor of the Cascade Christian Church, officiated at the funeral which took place at the Roth Funeral Home.

Mrs. Cox is survived by one son, Robert of Grand Rapids; six grandchildren; several nieces and nephews; and a host of friends.

Following services, interment was made in Cascade Cemetery.

## James T. Jones passes Friday in Gladstone

James T. Jones, aged 81, passed away Friday morning, May 20, at St. Francis Hospital in Gladstone, Michigan, of a heart condition. He was a well-known former Lowell resident. Born in Lowell, November 28, 1885, he was educated in the public schools of Lowell and the Ferris Institute. He left Lowell in 1905 to work for the Marble Arms Company of Gladstone, in the upper peninsula, from which he retired several years ago.

Mr. Jones served as mayor of Gladstone, was a member of the board of education, was active in the Boy Scout organization, and director of Child's Welfare Club.

He was past master of Gladstone Lodge 396, F&M, a member and past president of the Gladstone Rotary Club, Gladstone Country Club and the Escanaba Country Club, and vice-president of the First National Bank.

Known as one of Delta County community's top leaders, the newly erected school in Gladstone was named the James T. Jones Elementary School, recently, in his honor.

He is survived by his wife, Olive; one daughter, Beverly Radford of Lombard, Illinois; three grandchildren; two brothers, Lewis and Charles of Lowell; one sister, Mrs. John Clark of Corona, California; and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held Monday in Gladstone, with burial being made there also. In lieu of flowers, the family requested that the money be donated to the Boy Scout organization, in his memory.

## Jim Williams among students to be honored

James R. Williams, formerly of Lowell, will be among the 330 students honored here May 24 at Michigan Technological University's Fourteenth Annual Honors Convocation.

Dr. William J. Sparks, national president of the American Chemical Society and scientific advisor to the Esso Research and Engineering Co., Linden, New Jersey, will deliver the Convocation address. Doctor Sparks, who holds the highest technical position in the Standard Oil Co. (N. J.) organization, will receive an honorary Doctor of Science degree from Michigan Tech.

Students to be honored will include the two highest ranking individuals in each class, members of the Dean's List for the 1964-65 academic year, those receiving class honors (upper 5 percent of their classes with at least a 3.3 grade point average), new members of honorary and professional fraternities and societies and recipients of fellowships and scholarships.

Williams, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Williams, will be honored for his membership in Tau Beta Pi honorary fraternity. He is a senior applied physics major at Michigan Tech.

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## Memorial Day parade and services set

Lowell's annual Memorial Day service to honor the servicemen of all wars, who died for their country, will be held Monday morning, beginning with a parade at 9:30.

The parade will leave Richards Park at 9:30 and march to Oakwood Cemetery, where the Rev. Father Benedict Marclonious, of St. Mary's Church, will be the main speaker.

Enroute to the cemetery, the parade will halt at the west bridge over the Flat River, where members of the Blue Star Mothers will cast a floral tribute on the water, and a firing squad will salute the men who died at sea.

The Memorial services, under the co-sponsorship of the V.F.W. Post 8303 and the American Legion Post 152, is open to participation for all servicemen, their families and the residents of Lowell and the surrounding communities.

The ceremonies at the cemetery will commence with the Invocation by the Rev. Charles Davis, of the Lowell Congregational Church. Presentations of flowers by members of the V.F.W. Auxiliary, the American Legion Auxiliary and the Women's Relief Corps, will then be made.

Following Father Ben's main address, the bands of Lowell high school will play the "Star Spangled Banner," ended with three volleys by the firing squad.

The traditional taps and echo will dismiss the assembly from the cemetery.

Roger Biert, marshal of this year's parade, urges all persons to participate in the parade and all groups, etc., to be at Richards Park prior to 9:30 for assembling and preparations.

Leading horses from the Midwest are expected in the reining, calf cutting and halter classes. Moonbeam Snip, owned by L. E. Tassel and winner of the 1965 Quarter Horse Halter Championship in Michigan is expected to compete at the show again this year.

# that was a low blow


