Since Miss Bushnell's health is not as good as it once was, the luncheon has been kept as simple as possible, which was her expressed wish when consulted about it, but even so, all the faculty will be there to do her honor. Mr. Gumser, formerly Superintendent of the Lowell School System and a long-time associate of hers will present her with an engraved gold watch from her friends and fellow teachers.

Mr. Gumser in presenting Miss Bushnell with the gift had this to say: "Measured by any scales Miss Bushnell looms as a very large teacher, she not only preached but practiced the motto of a luncheon club 'service above self.' The welfare of the children was her chief con-

cern, she was a constant source

and unselfish service." Steven Nisbet, Superintendent of Lowell Area Public Schools "Miss Bushnell has devoted 44 years to teaching boys and girls. For forty-three years she has served the school area of Lowell. From a beginning salary of \$900 to the present, she has furnished, besides reading and writing, books, mittens, coats, shoes, etc., to those chil-

dren in need. Those who have been able to call her their teacher will be ever grateful." Dedication is the only word that can be applied to this splendid woman who has de-

voted so much of her life to the field of education. Do you have any idea how many children have been taught by Miss Bushnell during this period of time? Approximately 1,700 youngsters, which is her conservative estimate, have had the benefit of being in her classroom for a year. This is almost equal to the total population figure of the town of Lowell, and truly she has taught a major portion of the citizens of this town and their children, if not their children's children. Sisters: brothers: uncles: aunts: cousins and mothers and fathers share a common bond of gratitude to this

Can you even imagine the number of noses wiped, boots pulled on and off, tears dried, quarrels settled, love given freely and generously to what even fond mother would admit is a trying age, six going on seven, besides teaching readin', writin' and arithmetic. there. Over her many years of teaching, she has seen many changes in the field of education: modern math being the greatest change in recent years. As she told her First Graders. she had to learn right along with them. Miss Bushnell also feels that first and second graders used to be expected to do much more in school than they do today, and that they all did much more reading than this generation of First Graders

As she reminisces about the children she has had in class over the past 43 years, there is much to smile over and treasure, but hardly anything that could be added to a newspaper story without some embarrassment to either the original characters involved or to their children who may be presently in the school system, but all of her many children, young and old, remember her fondly and if they are older, with special affection, realizing all she had
