121 seniors will receive diplomas in commencement ceremonies tonight

A total of 121 seniors will officially close their intermediate school careers when Lowell High school presents its 1966 commencement exercises tonight, Thursday, June 9.

Diplomas will be presented to 121 students by Tyrus Wessell, president of the Board of Education, in the ceremonies which will be held in the high school gymnasium at eight o'clock.

Pastor Henry Buikema will offer the invocation and benediction, Greg Hoag will deliver the salutatory address and Lynn Kay Wittenbach will present the valedictory.

Dr. Leroy Augenstein, Professor and Chairman of Biophysics at Michigan State University, will be the commencement speaker. A deliverer of about 120 public lectures and sermons each year on various aspects of science, Dr. Augenstein has selected as his topic "User or Producer."

Scholarship winners in the Class of 1966 will be announced by Carl J. Hagen, principal. Dave Clark, jr., will make the presentations of the American Legion and Auxiliary awards.

The high school band, under the direction of Orval Jessup, will play "Pomp and Circumstance," "Music For A Ceremony," and the recessional.

The senior class this year has selected navy and ivory for its colors and the blue carnation as the class flower. The class's motto is "It matters not what you are thought to be, but what you are."

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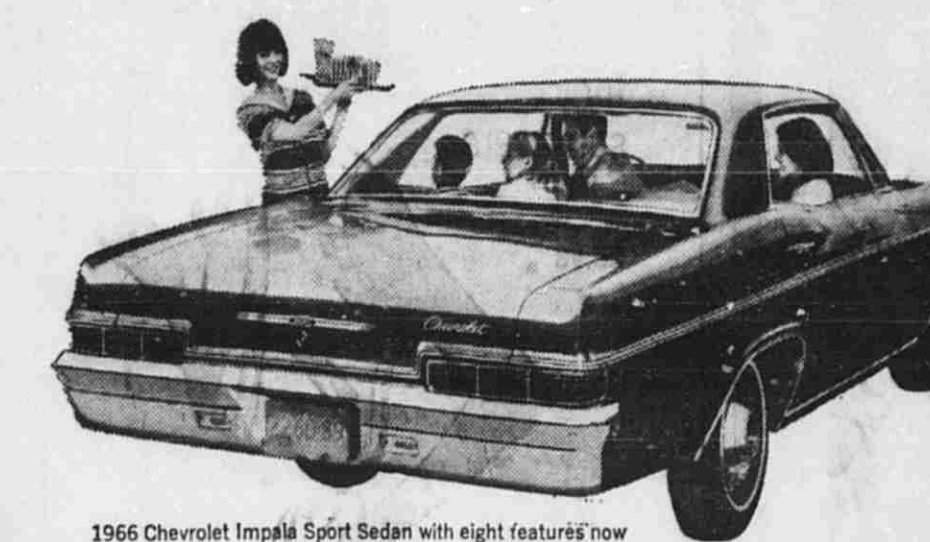

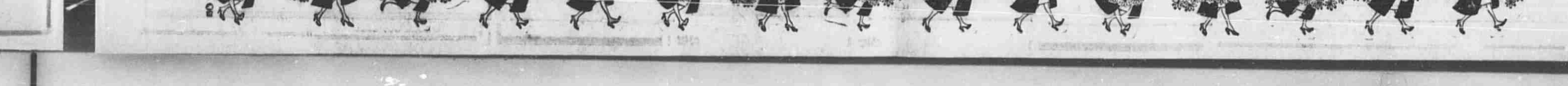
