Move ahead to start school construction

Approval for sale of \$750,000 in bonds to build additions to the Alto Elementary School, & the high school, and construct a new 11 room elementary school on the west side of the city, has been received. The bonds will be sold on Thursday, June 30.

Construction bids on the two additions are being advertised this week, and will be received on Monday, July 11. A contractor is being sought for the two additions, who can complete the projects as soon as possible.

At best, the two additions are not expected to be ready until next February. Bids on the new elementary school will be taken in July.

Short Three Rooms

There is a shortage of three class rooms for the coming year, the Board was told on Monday night.

There will have to be two sessions of kindergarten held outside the school in Lowell, &

a first grade class room is being sought.

In Alto, a location for two sessions of the kindergarten will be needed. Some consideration is being given to using the old Sweet School, until the additions to the Alto Elementary School are finished.

The Board will be using the Congregational Church for the kindergarten and another room is being sought in another church or public building.

Ban Tuition Students

The School Board passed a resolution Monday night that will ban any new tuition students in the Lowell system from another K-12 district. Over crowding in all areas of the school's system makes it impossible to take anyone from outside the school district.

The Board also postponed ordering new bleachers for the home side of the football field. Bids have been received, but the squeeze on funds to operate the system for the coming

year may delay new seating. The price for 1,500 new seats from the Standard Steel Company was \$15,226.

Approval was given to purchase 15 new band uniforms & re-tailor the pants on the present uniforms. A total of \$750 was voted for the band fund.

Principals Appear

The three school principals—Dirk Venema, elementary; Vern Morse, junior high; and Carl Hagen, high school—appeared at the request of the Board, with their needs outlined for the coming year.

All three listed the equipment and personnel changes that they desired. Two teaching assistant principals were listed as a need in the elementary school. In the high school an attendance officer or assistant principal was one of the immediate needs.

Some of their requests were approved for immediate attention. Others will be postponed until the new superintendent arrives.

Register for fishing derby

Entrants, ages six through 12, are being sought for the fifth annual "fishing derby," sponsored by the Lowell Moose Civic Affairs committee.

Registration deadline is Saturday, July 9, and the committee urges all anglers in the Lowell area to register that day only at the Lewis Electric Store, 512 East Main Street.

This year's derby will be held at McEwen Lake, west of Alto on Timponia Avenue on Saturday, July 16, with the Moores' famous chuck wagon arriving on the scene following the judging of the catches.

During the registering, admission cards will be distributed, and any person who does not have a card, will not be permitted to participate. Be sure to register on July 9 and take part in this youth project, which hosted over 110 fishermen last year.

15-year-old boy chased to Ionia

A fifteen-year-old Lowell high school boy, who took his parent's late model convertible on Thursday night, was chased into Ionia by Lowell Police Officer Preston Howe.

The car, reported stolen to Lowell police, was spotted by the local officer going east on West Main Street, early Friday morning. Giving chase, the police attempted to pull along side of the car, driven by the 15-year-old, but he attempted to force the police cruiser off the road.

After several attempts to stop the boy, the police used their radio to call ahead and Ionia police were asked to assist. The boy ran into a power pole in Ionia, but only suffered minor hand cuts.

The boy was held in Ionia until his parents came from Lowell to pick him up at 3:25 a. m.

It appears that his punishment will have to come from his parents.

Lowell firm helps fight Viet Nam insect war with sprayer shipment

Officials from Kent County, Lowell and the Root-Lowell Corporation took part last Friday in departure ceremonies of a new carload of Insecticide Dusters that are headed to Viet Nam. After the freight car had been loaded to capacity and properly designated, Richard Brush, center, president of Root-Lowell discussed the operation of the duster unit with Kent County Board of Supervisors' chairman, John Brewer, left, and Mayor Arnold Wittenbach of Lowell, second from left. General foreman of the Root-Lowell Company, Walter Hall, second from right, holds the duster, while Elmer G. Schaefer, right, vice-president of productions, looks on.

Employees of one of the oldest sprayer and duster manufacturers in the country are proud of their part in bringing about healthier and more comfortable living conditions for troops in Viet Nam.

The manufacturer is the 60-year old Root-Lowell Manufacturing Company of Lowell, which this week shipped a new carload of insecticide dusters to Ogden, Utah. The government will consolidate this shipment with quantities of other essential military materials for quick movement to Viet Nam from this Utah Supply Center.

These crank-operated insecticide dusters, employing a high velocity air fan, were designed expressly to government specification in close cooperation with federal agency personnel. They have been used since the Mid-1940's by U. S. Government malaria and insect control projects all over the world to fight disease and insect pests.

The insect problem in the tropical Viet Nam climate is extremely difficult to solve. Discomfort from swarming and crawling insects as well as the ever present danger of malaria and other health hazards make insect control a basic necessity for efficient troop operations in Viet Nam.

Under the prevailing conditions in the areas where fighting is taking place, the Root-Lowell manually operated duster is much in demand. Many are now used there. Carried by a strap slung over the shoulder, the canister holds a sufficient quantity of insecticide dust to cover many acres of terrain before refilling.

By turning the crank, the powerful blower fan is activated, discharging an insect-killing cloud of dust that blankets the area and settles into the vegetation to remain as a control against harmful or bothersome pests.

22 teachers are leaving

Twenty-two teachers, counselors and administrators will be leaving the Lowell Area Public School System at the end of the school year. Steve Nisbet has resigned as superintendent of the Lowell Area Public School System. Vern Morse, principal of the Junior High School and his wife, Judy Morse, Vocal Music Department, are leaving here to work in Battle Creek. Hans Andrews, head of the counseling department of the high school, has resigned to accept a position at the Junior College in Battle Creek.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Beale, both teachers in the high school will be leaving and Fredric (Fritz) Hokenema and Wayne Sprack, High School English Department, are leaving. Mrs. Gerald Rollins, Home Economics teacher for the Junior High, will join her husband in Florida. Mr. Jessup, long-time head of the Music Department, will now work only with the Junior High Band after the close of the school year. In the elementary grades several teachers are also leaving. Marion Bushnell is retiring after 44 years in the teaching profession and Mrs. Pullen, 2nd grade teacher, will also retire. Connie DeVries, filling for Mrs. Pratt, who was on maternity leave, will not be coming back next year; Mary Brasette, 4th grade, is going back to college. Kathy Downes and Marjorie Fellows will not return next year and Mary McGeath is being married and will be going with her husband, Helen Hart, who taught here this last year, will leave to join her husband who will be attending law school in Toronto. Mr. Bowen, Miss Peterson; Barbara Transe; Norma Kemppainen and Mrs. Sweet will not return to teaching positions in Lowell this fall.

On motion by Shade, supported by Metterack, approval was given to increase summer allotment for credit hours from 20 to 25 dollars per hour. A special meeting was set for May 16, 1966, at 7:30 p. m. Meeting was adjourned at 11:50 p. m. Minutes of the special meeting of the Board of Education held May 16, 1966. The meeting was called to order by President Wessell at 7:30 p. m. with all members present. Also present were the grievance committee from the Lowell Teachers Club, along with about 40 members of the faculty.
