Beech Street group is protesting proposed water main extension

An unofficial hearing on the need for a water main extension on Beech Street north of Foreman was a major portion of the council meeting on Monday night. There were four citizens present at the meeting, three of whom were opposed to the water main extension past their property.

This same extension was so vigorously protested last year that the council declined to make the improvement. The problem seems to be that in order to serve a new real estate development the water main must be constructed a full city block past homes already served by city water or citizens satisfied to use their

own wells. The discussion lasted for over an hour and the date for the official hearing was set, to be held on July 5th when the cost of the project to the property owners would be revealed.

the Planning Commission. The council also approved a trial of a new poly-phosphate treatment of the water supply to get rid of the rust in the mains. A new type chemical has been offered to the city on a 90-day trial basis that guaranteed to do the job. Under the plan the chemical will be put in the water supply on a greatly accelerated basis for 90 days and weekly flushing of

the mains will be scheduled. City Manager Olson told the council that the application for an additional 10 percent in addition to the \$132,000 already approved for the new sewer treatment plant has been granted. This will give the city an

additional \$13,000.

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




