Bids were received on construction of additions to Lowell high school and Alto Area Elementary School on Monday at the regular school board meeting. Both bids were higher than the architect's estimates, but the Alto School addition was ov-

er 25 percent higher. There was only one bid on construction of the high school addition. The architect Donnally Palmer will study the bids, but they may both be rejected, & a new bidding held at a later

School Board President, Wessell pointed out that failure of citizens of the district to approve the \$750,000 bond issue in June of 1965, when it was first brought up and turned down by 16 votes, has cost school district at least \$100,-If the voters had approved

the bond issue in June instead the following January, the schools would now be near completion and ready to use this It appears now that bids for

the new elementary school con-

struction will not be taken un-til this fall and the school will not be ready for use until perhaps January of 1968.

#### More Construction

President Wessell also revealed that members of the district should realize that in only a few years, the junior high will have to be replaced and more construction money will be need-

Under present costs, a new junior high school would cost more than the present high school, which was over a million dollars.

The board at the last meet ing approved the contract of Ed Rankin to teach math and science in the high school this fall. He is a former member of the school board and has been a representative of a school book publishing company.

The Board of Education said on Monday that they have two candidates for the school superintendent's position under consideration. They expect to name the new school administrator



This negative decision should be reversed by the City Council if the Planning Commission fails to correct its short-sighted stand.

Failure of the Planning Commission to recognize the obvious benefits to be derived from a shopping center in terms of new business, more jobs and substantially increased tax revenue and cash flow to assist in our city's progress is difficult to

It would appear that someone is placing his private motivations ahead of the general interest of the community. Such a position can hardly be construed other than a gross conflict of interest contrived for selfish purpose.

Such a situation cannot be countenanced by the responsible officials of this municipality, who, rather than sit and stultify, are dedicated to a program of progress

The stakes in this issue are too significant to permit a blind and stubborn minority to reject a development which will contribute to bountifully to our community at large.

We are committed to the encouragement of progress because it will enhance Lowell and its citizens. In simple terms, this is our cause.





"Cadillac Cowboys" was a satire which poked fun at our nouveau riche and our archaic institutions

"The Eagle and the Iron Cross" tells of two young Germans who escape from the Pa-pago Peaks POW camp and set out to be cowboys. They be-come disillusiond with the real West, which differs from their preconceptions, and the story ends, according to its author, on a note of ironic tragedy. Glendon Swarthout, Scottsdale,

Arizona, spent untold hours re-searching the history of POW camps in America and interviewing former inmates during the three years that went into the book. Swarthout was surprised to learn that there were more than 100 POW camps in the United States, three in Arizona alone

Most POWs in Arizona were veterans of the African Corps who were captured in one desert and imprisoned in another. Swarthout noted that an entire generation of German youngsters in the 1920's & 30's was brought up on Karl May & Zane Grey. No wonder their favorite films in pre-Nazi Germany were those featuring Hoot Gibson, Tim McCoy, Buck Jones and Tom Mix.
