# **Powell speaks** to Rotary Club

State Representative Stanley M. Powell of Ionia was the featured speaker at the regular weekly meeting of the Lowell Rotary Club, held in the American Legion Hall on Wednesday,

July 13. President Orville Jackson called on Rotarian Lee Lamkin to introduce the speaker. He was program chairman for the day. Mr. Lamkin had invited Rep. Powell to review some of the characteristics and developments of special interest in the current session of the Michigan Legislature.

Rep. Powell opened his com-ments by mentioning that half of the members of the Michigan Legislature are serving their first terms as Senators or Rep-presentatives. Because of this heavy turnover, even many of the committee chairmen were inexperienced. Another outstanding characteristic of both the Senate and the House is that the leadership has been trained in union labor philosophies and tactics.

There was increasing emphasis in reaching important decisions in secret party caucus sessions. In too many cases votes were cast for or against bills by number without full understanding of the detailed provisions.

Rep. Powell had served an earlier term in the Michigan House and he also had been a delegate to the State Constitutional Convention in 1961-62. Hence, he was in a position to compare the current sessions with the work of the previous state legislative bodies on which he had served.

He commented that much of the committee work was rather sloppy and that there was an abnormal dependence on proposing and adopting substitutes for bills under consideration, often with scant understanding of all of the implications of the substitute proposals.

Rep. Powell gave the Rotarians a summarized report on the state's general fund budget for the new fiscal year which opened July 1, 1966. Final appropriations totaled \$974,595, 122 which was nearly \$30 million more than Governor Romney's recommendation. This will eat into the state's general fund surplus which was about \$135 million. One of the candidates for governor is urging that any current state general fund surplus should be turned over to the public schools. Rep. Powell commented that he felt that represented a serious degree of fiscal irresponsibility and he would be definitely opposed to that suggestion.

The Rotarians were deeply interested in the talk and asked a number of questions of their speaker, publicly and privately. Rep. Powell serves the new Representative District which includes the city of Lowell, 4 Kent County townships, Bowne, Lowell, Vergennes and Grattan, as well as all of Ionia County and 9 Barry County townships.

He pointed out that the school aid approved for the new fiscal year is over \$48 million higher than for last year

A public hearing on re-zoning some 7 acres on West Main Street, so L. V. Eberhard can build a new super market and develop a shopping center attracted a crowd of about 100 citizens Monday night.

After about an hour of routine business, the council opened the hearing, which ran pretty smooth considering several hot tempers in the audience and an extra hot evening. At least in Lowell everyone is given a chance to be heard and has the respect for his fellow citizens that they also are heard despite their personal feelings.

After two hours the meeting broke up. No vote was taken and no decision was made. The question of re-zoning the land was referred back to the Planning Commission's recommendation. The Planning Commission meets on Wednesday of this week and will no doubt vote on the referred request.

If the Commission's vote on this is the same as they did before, when a request to rezone this land for a lesser commercial use, the vote will be against Eberhard. The matter after the Planning Commission's recommendation will go back to the Council.

The Council could over-ride the recommendation of the Planning Commission, but only according to the ordinance by a 4-1 vote. At the present time appears that the Council does not have sufficient votes to allow the re-zoning.

#### Comments At Hearing

Jack Bouie, Grand Rapids attorney representing Wendell Berman, owner of the land, opened the hearing with a statement of the problem and the position of the land owners. He said that the Lowell Development Corporation had built 30 new homes and have a 4family apartment building under construction.

The development company has followed all the rules set down by the Planning Commission and the Council and are merely asking for approval of a commercial area already

L, V, Eberhard, head of the Big E stores, who wants to build on the West Main Street location, and transfer their present operation from East Main Street, said that he wants to have a new larger store to serve the community better. The present store of about 7,-000 square fee; is doing \$25,-000 a year, about its maximum; the new store he plans would be 18,000 square feet and he anticipates a gross business of over \$40,000 a year.

The investment in the new store would be a half million dollars and he would not build here if he did not think it would be a success and a benefit to the community.

Art Warning voiced his fear of destruction of the downtown business district if a shopping center is built away from the central business district.

Bernard Baer, President of the Lowell Chamber of Commerce, reported on a survey conducted by the chamber. He said that 96 questionnaires were sent out and 53 were returned. He gave a report of a tabulation of the replies that indicated that those who answered favored Eberhard being given permission to build on West Main Street by a large majority.

A General Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, Au-gust 2, for the purpose of placing in nomination by all political parties, candidates for area township offices to be filled in the November 8 general elec-

Township officials named in November will take office April 10, 1967. Selecting township of-ficials by petition ends an era in Michigan government. The old township caucus,

gathered to verbally nominate township officals, is no longer

Also minor parties such as "Citizens," "People's," "Liberty," etc., are no longer per-mitted. Township officials must now declare whether they choose to run as Democrats or Republicans.

The township primary and election will be held in conjunction with the State election, & township officers will now ap-pear on the same ballot on which State and County officers appear, and the ballots will be printed by the county clerk.

Township officers include sup-

ervisors, clerk, treasurer, not more than four constables and not more than four trustees. Members of the board of review are no longer elected, but

are appointed.

The terms of justices of the peace have been extended by the Legislature. The justices of the peace will not run in the primary nor November election, but will continue in office until their office is phased out. New nominating petitions eliminate the notarization of peti-

tions and provide for a circulator's certificate instead. Candidates in the primary had to file petitions equal in number to not less than one percent nor more than four percent of the vote polled by the candidate of his party for Secretary of State in the Township at the last election at which

Township clerks, many now checking petitions for the first time, are required to promptly notify any candidate who is lacking in the required num-

If a parent or guardian does not want his child to be immunized on the basis of religious or other grounds, a signed statement to that effect must

The child may be immunized by a private physician, or the parent can request that the local health department give the eeded protective injections and diagnostic test. The funds, approved by the state legislature, are to be used for this purpose. In a letter to local health departments, the state department of health noted? "The agreement under which this money was provided stipulates it is to be used primarily to assure that every child entering school for the first time this fall is protected against measles. The money will be distributed to the best advantage of its (local health departments) measles susceptible children. It is now the health department's responsibility to control outbreaks of

An official of the state health department said the law will cut down the incidence of measles among school age children and that in a few years, it may result in the relative absence of measles in school age children. The cost of absenteeism, loss of school funds, and home care far outweighs the cost of measles vaccine, it was noted.





AMENDMENTS TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF GRATTAN TOWNSHIP

An Ordinance, pursuant to the Township Rural Zoning Act, being Act 184 of the Public Acts of Michigan for 1943, as amended, to amend the Grattan Township Zoning Ordinance and Zoning Maps.

The Grattan Township Board does hereby ordain that the Zoning Ordinance and Zoning Map of Grattan Township be and is hereby amended as follows:

Amend by enacting a new provision, Article One and One-half, Definitions.

DISTRICTS — ZONING MAP

# **Powell speaks** to Rotary Club

State Representative Stanley M. Powell of Ionia was the featured speaker at the regular weekly meeting of the Lowell Rotary Club, held in the American Legion Hall on Wednesday, July 13.

President Orville Jackson called on Rotarian Lee Lamkin to introduce the speaker. He was program chairman for the day Mr. Lamkin had invited Rep. Powell to review some of the characteristics and developments of special interest in the current session of the Michigan Legislature.

Rep. Powell opened his comments by mentioning that half of the members of the Michigan Legislature are serving their first terms as Senators or Reppresentatives. Because of this heavy turnover, even many of the committee chairmen were inexperienced. Another outstanding characteristic of both the Senate and the House is that the leadership has been trained in union labor philosophies and

There was increasing emphasis in reaching important decisions in secret party caucus sessions. In too many cases, votes were cast for or against bills by number without ful understanding of the detailed provisions.

Rep. Powell had served an earlier term in the Michigan House and he also had been a delegate to the State Constitutional Convention in 1961-62. Hence, he was in a position to compare the current sessions with the work of the previous state legislative bodies on which he had served.

He commented that much of the committee work was rather sloppy and that there was an abnormal dependence on proposing and adopting substitutes bills under consideration, often with scant understanding of all of the implications of the substitute proposals.

Rep. Powell gave the Rotarians a summarized report on the state's general fund budget for the new fiscal year which opened July 1, 1966. Final ap-propriations totaled \$974,595, 122 which was nearly \$30 million more than Governor Romney's recommendation. This will eat into the state's general fund surplus which was about \$135 million. One of the candidates for governor is urging that any current state general fund surplus should be turned over to the public schools. Rep. Powell commented that he felt that represented a serious degree of fiscal irresponsibility and he would be definitely opposed to

The Rotarians were deeply interested in the talk and asked a number of questions of their speaker, publicly and privately. Rep. Powell serves the new Representative District which includes the city of Lowell, 4 Kent County townships, Bowne, Lowell, Vergennes and Grattan, as well as all of Ionia County and 9 Barry County

# Shopping center hearing brings out 100 citizens

A public hearing on re-zoning some 7 acres on West Main Street, so L. V. Eberhard can build a new super market and develop a shopping center at-tracted a crowd of about 100

citizens Monday night.

After about an hour of routine business, the council opened the hearing, which ran pretty smooth considering several hot tempers in the audience and an extra hot evening. At least in Lowell everyone is given a chance to be heard and has the respect for his fellow citizens that they also are heard despite their personal feelings.

After two hours the meeting broke up. No vote was taken and no decision was made. The question of re-zoning the land was referred back to the Planning Commission's recommendation. The Planning Commission meets on Wednesday of this week and will no doubt vote on the referred request.

If the Commission's vote on this is the same as they did before, when a request to rezone this land for a lesser commercial use, the vote will be against Eberhard. The matter after the Planning Commission's recommendation will go back to

the Council. The Council could over-ride the recommendation of the Planning Commission, but only according to the ordinance by 4-1 vote. At the present time it appears that the Council does not have sufficient votes to allow the re-zoning.

#### Comments At Hearing

Jack Bouie, Grand Rapids attorney representing Wendell Berman, owner of the land, opened the hearing with a statement of the problem and the position of the land owners. He said that the Lowell Development Corporation had built 30 new homes and have a 4family apartment building under construction.

The development company has followed all the rules set down by the Planning Commis-sion and the Council and are merely asking for approval of commercial area already

L. V. Eberhard, head of the Big E stores, who wants to build on the West Main Street location, and transfer their present operation from East Main Street, said that he wants to have a new larger store to serve the community better. The present store of about 7,square feet is doing \$25,-000 a year, about its maximum; new store he plans would 18,000 square feet and he anticipates a gross business over \$40,000 a year.

The investment in the new store would be a half million dollars and he would not build here if he did not think it would be a success and a benefit to the community.

Art Warning voiced his fear of destruction of the downtown business district if a shopping center is built away from the central business district.

Bernard Baer, President of the Lowell Chamber of Commerce, reported on a survey conducted by the chamber. He said that 96 questionnaires were sent out and 53 were returned. gave a report of a tabulation of the replies that indicated that those who answered favored Eberhard being given per-mission to build on West Main Street by a large majority.
