K-12 annexations crowds Lowell schools this fall

Superintendent James Pace was given approval by the Board of Education on Monday night to arrange to accept students from Talbot and Moseley School districts, who were joined to the Lowell District in the K-12 vote in June.

The students will be brought into the schools in Lowell, and the former school buildings will be used for storage by the Lowell Area Schools.

About 50 students attend the two, one-room country schools. They will be divided between the several classes of each grade in the Lowell Schools.

Superintendent Pace pointed out that Talbot has never operated a kindergarten and residents of the district, who wish, do not have to send their children to Lowell kindergarten classes.

Schools Fight K-12

The two rural schools who are fighting the K-12 reorganization approved by the voters this Spring are Mapes and Alton, with about 48 children in grades kindergarten through eighth.

No decision on their court case to set aside the election will probably be made before mid year, so no plans are being made to find room for these students in the school system.

Alton has indicated to the Kent County School Commissioner that they would like to send their students to Lowell on a tuition basis.

Lowell's board has a long standing policy of not accepting tuition students from closed districts.

Until the new additions are made to the high school and

Alto Elementary and the new Bushnell Elementary school is completed next fall the school will be extremely crowded.

Presently Lowell is planning to use space in the Lowell Methodist Church, The Lowell Congregational Church, and perhaps one room not being used in St. Mary's School.

In Alto approval is being sought to use the facilities at the Alto Baptist Church.

Plans for the new Bushnell Elementary School were approved on Monday night by the Lowell Area School Board.

Bids are expected to be taken on this, and the additions to the high school and the Alto Area Elementary School, late in September.

The new elementary school will be constructed on the south end of the high school site, with access on Elizabeth Street. The building will contain 10 teaching stations, an all purpose room, and a library.

Also in this building will be the offices of the superintendent, a general office, and two private offices to be incorporated into the school.

Employ Secretaries

Six new secretaries have been hired by Lowell Area Schools, to work in the offices, for the coming year.

Mrs. Colleen Swan will be Dirk Venema's secretary in the elementary school. Mrs. Arthur Blough will be half time guidance secretary in the high school.

Miss Gerri Briggs will become Junior High Principal John Gabor's secretary. The junior

high will also have a half time guidance secretary, Mrs. Carol Raymor.

To take over the work of Mrs. Boot in the superintendent's office, Mrs. Olive Courser has been employed on a full time basis.

Mrs. Louise Dilly will work as a half time secretary in the Elementary Title I Federal program.

Former Teacher Returns

Mrs. Olive (Clark) Eitelbus, a former kindergarten teacher, who left the community several years ago, has signed a contract to return as a kindergarten teacher in Alto.

The kindergarten classes, are scheduled to be held in the Alto Baptist Church.

Superintendent James Pace told the board that he will employ Mrs. Pat Ellis of Grand Rapids to fill the last vacancy on the teaching staff. She will have a section of the fifth grade.

The Board also approved installing a gas conversion burner in the Alto School.

Bids were received for a new pickup truck for the maintenance department of the school system. Low bidder was Royce Story on a GMC 1/2-ton pickup at \$1,574.42.

The Board discussed employing a business manager or assistant principal to assist with the administration of the school system.

It was pointed out that this would allow the superintendent more time as an educational leader instead of being burdened with the paper work and purchasing details.



Bowne Township's oldest resident celebrates 95th birthday

Bowne Township's oldest resident, Mrs. Ella Aldrich, of 6038 Conway Street, Alto, celebrated her 95th birthday last week.

Born in New London, Missouri, August 17, 1871, Ella Dunn was married at the age of 29, to Marvin M. Aldrich, who preceded her in death in 1927.

A true perfectionist and artist with a needle, Mrs. Aldrich is shown with a skirt she made 75 years ago. Her artistic ability with a needle brought her many prizes and famed recognition, and she has been classed as a lady of art in this profession.

Mrs. Aldrich has made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Mary Nye, in Alto, for the past thirty years, where she has been confined to a wheel chair most of the time. She also has a son, Lee, and three grandchildren, who reside in California.

The School Board of Ada Christian School has been increased to ten members to correspond to recent growth in student registration. Newly elected to the board for three year terms are: Jay Van Andel; Carl Huizenga; Robert G. Stewart; Donald Pruis. Officers elected for the 1966-67 school year are: president, Jay Van Andel; vice president, Adrian Penninga; secretary, Carl Huizenga; and general fund treasurer, John E. Linton.

Ada Christian school expects a registration of between 180 and 200 students this fall, for kindergarten through the ninth grade. Parents wishing to enroll students must do so before school begins on Wednesday, September 7. The school term will be the same as that of schools in the Forest Hill district, and a 1/2 day (morning) kindergarten will be held this year.

Ada Christian School is located in the village of Ada. It is owned and operated by an association whose membership is predominantly parents of the children attending the school.

Most of the students reside in Ada, Cascade, or Lowell areas. Parent-operated Christian schools compose a substantial part of the primary and secondary school facilities of Kent and Ottawa counties. These schools are built and operated without public funds, their support coming from tuition and contributions by parents and individuals, and gifts from churches. Combined annual budgets of Christian Schools in the Kent County area are over 3 1/2 million dollars per year.

Michigan highway speeds up 1.5 mph

The State Highway Commission reports that cars traveling on Michigan's rural state highways during the day time in April averaged 60.3 miles an hour.

This represented an increase of 1.5 miles an hour when compared to April of 1965.

The Commission's April speed study showed that passenger cars traveling on rural freeways averaged 64.7 miles an hour, one mile an hour faster than in April of 1965.

The nighttime average passenger car speed was 58.7 miles per hour in April, three-tenths of a mile slower than during the 1965 April speed study.

We then left Germany and camped on the beach at Vejerstrand on the North Sea for the remainder of the week. We visited Ribe, the oldest town in Denmark. There we climbed the 214 steps to the top of the church tower from which we could see for many, many miles. It was a fabulous sight.

This is my last week here and it is a busy one. I am attending school with Mette. Tomorrow the King, Queen and Princess Benedikte are coming to Rudkøbing and the whole town is excited. Sunday, August 21, I will be leaving this fabulous, friendly and beautiful country with mixed emotions of happiness and sadness. Living here as one of these people has been a fabulous experience and the warmth which they have shown me is impossible to convey in mere words. It has been truly a great summer and I want to thank everyone who made it possible.

The State Highway Commission's 1966 Official Mileage Log of Michigan's state highways, just off the presses, shows that US-23, which extends from the Michigan-Indiana state line south of Niles to the Mackinac Bridge is 361.8 miles long. For many years, it has been the state's longest highway.

US-23 is still the state's shortest highway. It extends four miles from the 16-10 to the Glen Haven in Leelanau County.

Letter to editor

Now hear this!

At the risk of appearing to be a maudlin sentimentalist, or at best a flag-waving politician, let's consider just how much every American has today which is his, I think, as a direct result not only of the stimulation arising from having breathed so long the free air of private enterprise; we have also had the right of self-determination going for us.

The closest nation to us in comparative size and potential is Russia. Their leadership mistakenly feels and candidly admits it must reduce America's social gains before it can substantially raise their own. Could it be an important lack over there is the complete lack of freedom's air?

No one today seriously considers any longer that there exists a military threat of any consequence to our nation. Many do believe, however, that Russian hopes of world dominance are predicated on our economic ruin and this may be true. But, again, social leveling is not at all their immediate goal. More important to Communists right now, I think, is the extent that we as Americans have to say about our economy and our government. How much or how little voice men have is the central point; lose our freedom and the rest easily goes.

Please don't mistake what I am saying. Today, of course, we are a strong, great nation which leads the world in wealth and in an abundance of almost everything else. It has been said that for Russia to make us equal to themselves today would mean the following reversals for us:

1. Abandon three-fifths of our steel capacity.
2. Abandon two-thirds of our petroleum capacity.
3. Scrap two out of every three of our hydroelectric plants.
4. Forget over 90 percent of our natural gas.
5. Eliminate 95 percent of our electric motor output.
6. Rip up 14 of every 15 miles of our paved highways.
7. Destroy two of every 3 miles of our railroads.
8. Sink eight of every nine of our ocean-going ships.
9. Junk nineteen of every twenty of our cars and trucks.
10. Slash all pay checks by three-fourths.
11. Transfer 60,000,000 Americans back to the farms.
12. Destroy 40,000,000 TV sets.
13. Rip out nine of every ten telephones.
14. Tear down seven of every ten houses that now stand.

This could never happen overnight nor in a few short years and perhaps never would occur, but we all remember what history did to the Greco-Roman empire. The loss of private rights of possession, all the freedoms, in fact, could quite easily come about rather quickly through our negligence if the exercise of those rights is forgotten. Who of us would want to be a part of any program, innocently enough, which contributes to the weakening of the

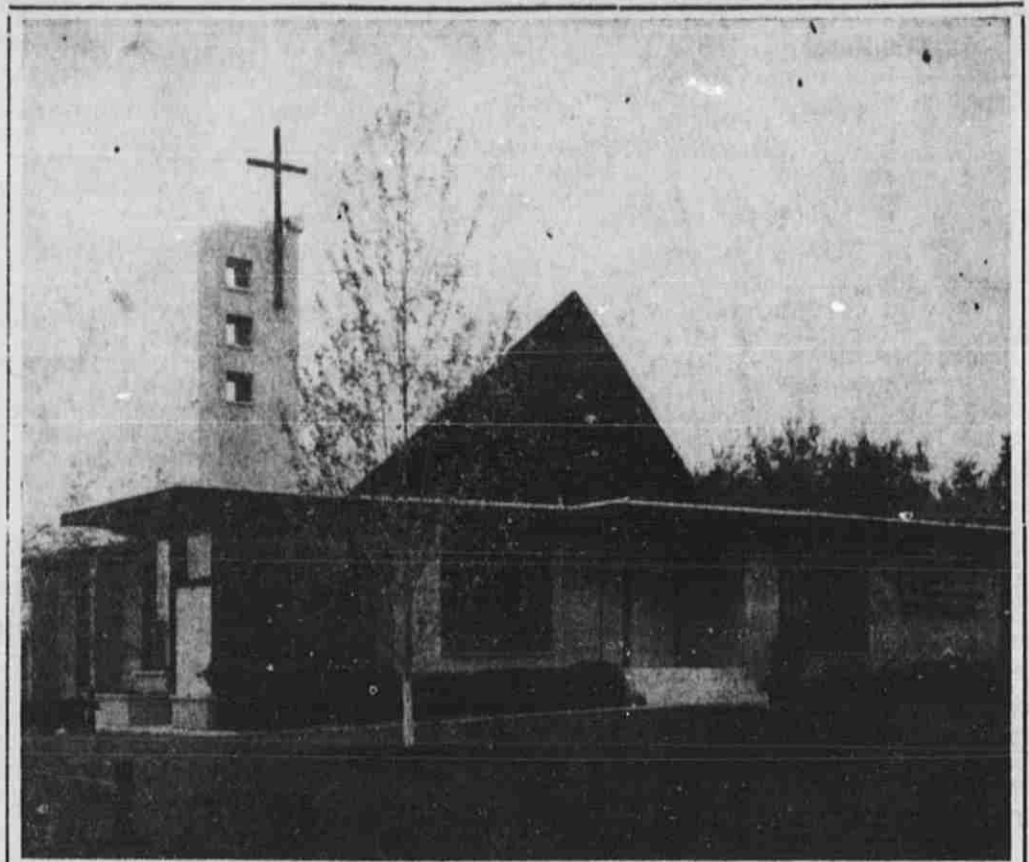
American way through a lack of interest, or still worse, thru a failure to exercise those rights which guarantee our voice in government?
