# Global drive on smallpox

Public health experts received a sharp reminder recently of the real dimensions of the problem involved in "eradicating" any disease. Among the once wide-spread scourges that have been substantially done away with in some Western nations, smallpox is an outstanding example. Yet just a few months ago a sudden outbreak of the disease in an English locality sent scores of people to sick beds and cost nearly 4 million dollars in an emergency vaccination campaign,

The trouble is, of course, that a contagious disease can't be truly eradiacated anywhere unless it is eradicated everywhere. This is truer than ever in a portation. The epidemic of smallpox in England is thought to have been caused by the arrival of a traveler from Africa or South America. One diseased person: that was all it

Despite such difficulties, the World Health Origanization has decided to launch a smallpox eradication program through which it hopes literally to wipe the disease from the face of the earth within ten years. To accomplish this, every person in the world who is at any risk of contracting the disease -and that means most people -will have to be vaccinated. Vaccination programs will be conducted nation by nation.

Because immunity gained by vaccination is far less than lifetime (medical estimates vary from three to ten years), while populations will be vaccinated within three-year periods to make sure that everybody is immunized and nobody is a threat to his fellow men. This should eliminate the need for mass revaccinations.

If the plan succeeds, it will be the first complete elimination of any disease on a global scale. Who thinks it can be done. The organization certain done. The organization certainly deserves univeral cooperation in its efforts.

## Million teens have taken driver ed in 10 years

A record 160,000 teenagers will be taking driver education courses in Michigan this year. More than a million Michigan boys and girls will have completed driver education courses since 1956 when the Driver Education Law took effect.

The law requires a teen-ager to complete a driver education course in order to be licensed before they reach the age of 18.

## Michigan school buses will log 80 million miles during 1966-67

School buses will log an estimated 80 million miles in Michigan during the 1966-67 school

Nearly 8,200 buses will be used to transport 720,000 public and non-public school students to and from schools throughout the state at an estimated cost of \$33 million, the State Department of Education report-

"The number of children riding school buses has been increasing each year," State Superintendent of Public Instruction Ira Polley said. "High school enrollments, enlargement of school districts, and provisions for transportation of nonpublic school students have been responsible for the increase." Last year, an average of 670,-000 students were transported



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

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

2. Check the roof of the house. If you notice a sag it probably means partial collapse, which in turn means great expense for restoration.

3. Take a long, hard look at the plumbing. To find out if it's adequate go to the top floor and open all taps. If a strong flow clear water appears, the

plumbing is good.
4. If the chimney is lightly-walled & of single-brick, thickness, you have a hazard on your nands.

These are but a few of the problems you might encounter buying an antiquated house. Best advise before you buy an older house that looks like a bargain: spend a part of your estimated savings to engage some experts. Have them go over the property with you and figure what it might cost to make the place what it should be. You might then decide to buy a new house!
