School board faces problems from increased student load The problems of the Lowell Board of Education were the main topic of discussion at the meeting of the board on Mon-

Overload of students, caused by the court's decision just a lew days before school opening. thew an additional 50 students into the system. Before having to absorb both Mapes and Alton district's children, the school had already been faced with over crowding.

This additional load of students, thrust on the local school by the court, is giving the administration a real headache. School enrollment on Monday,

September 12, with 234 kindergarteners coming in for the first time, brought the total to 2,432, Superintendent Pace told the board at Monday's meeting.

Enrollment by Grades

In the elementary grades, the nrollment on the opening day of school included-Kindergar-234; first grade, 187; secgrade, 216; third grade, 190; fourth grade, 186; and fifth grade, 173. This makes a total of 1,186 in the elementary

In the junior high system there are 176 students in the sixth grade; 201 in the seventh grade; 188 in the eighth grade; and 12 in the special education

for the junior high is 577.

The high school has 176 pupils enrolled in the ninth grade; 210 in the 10th grade; 140 in the 11th grade; and 143 in the 12th grade, for a total class enrollment of 669

Enrollment last year was 2,203 students in the Lowell Area School system, Last week's enrollment boosted the total by 229 students; & more enrollments are expected to take place within the next several weeks.

Transportation Problems

Transportation of the increased student load from the rural areas has overloaded the school buses and the Board authorized immediate bids be sought on two new vehicles.

Superintendent Pace revealed to the Board that the buses have 121 overloaded in the north routes and 44 on the south routes. On Monday, there were 1,453 students transported into the school system. As fast as possible, the new buses will be secured, and the crowded condition will be re-

Indian Guides Program

The aim of the YMCA Indian Guide program is to foster the companionship of Father with his Son. It sets up a regular time when fathers and sons meet in groups called tribes to do things together. This gives the boy a male image to follow early in life.

Indian Guides Values

Indian Guides started in 1925 when Harold Keltner, Executive Secretary of St. Louis YM-CA, brought a full-blooded Objibway Indian, named Joe Friday, from Canada to be a member of his staff. Mr. Keltner noticed that Joe Friday was extremely popular at all father and son gatherings. This gave Mr. Keltner the idea that their mutual interest in the Indian might provide a common basis around which a practical pro-gram for father and son could be built. The program's purpose was to close the widening gap between fathers and sons. Boys are primarily being rais-

ed by women. Mom feeds them. dresses them, are litterally with them all day. Females teach them for the most part of their young school lives. Boys generally have little contact with male leadership or even their fathers until they are nine or ten years old. As Joe Friday so aptly put it, "White men build cities, Red men build sons." The Indian father took over his son at an early age and taught him to hunt, fish and protect his village.

State Stone of Michigan

Rock hounds know each of these handsome little nuggets collectively as the "Petoskey stone," the popular name coined because this fossilized specimen is commonly found in the Petoskey area. Picked last year as Michigan's official state stone, its claim to fame is in its distinct appearance, the way it may be carved with simple tools into attractive jewelry, and the fact that it is commonly found in this state, Origin of this prized stone is traced back to Devonian seas that covered Michigan's Lower Peninsula about 350 million years ago. Petoskey stones found here today consist of massive, elose-packed colonies of corals which were formed in varying sizes during the Devonian geologic age. Thanks to glaciers which later scraped bedrock surfaces across the Great Lakes area, Petoskey stones are found in many places—on beaches and in road cuts ditches, gravel pits, gullies and sand blows all over the state, particularly in the northern Lower Peninsula.—Mich. Dept. of Conserver.
