In all other matters but this one, a vote of 3 to 2, or a majority vote, is considered to be ef-fective—but this only a sixty percent vote, not quite

To over-rule the Commission requires a four to one vote of the Township Board. Why is the Planning Ordinance "loaded" so that a majority of the Township Board is not enough?

Several other points are not what they seem at first glance. There is astonishing confusion in Articles 10 and 11. These provide the Commission with the powers of deciding what pub-lic buildings, structures, and the like will be built and when; also that they may enter upon any private lands they wish at any time to "make inspections"; also that the Commission is ren-dered free to accept "gifts" pretty much at will-all these points will reall these points will require scrutiny by the public. But the greatest dan-ger to our Township and in fact to our basic rights will come about as follows:
