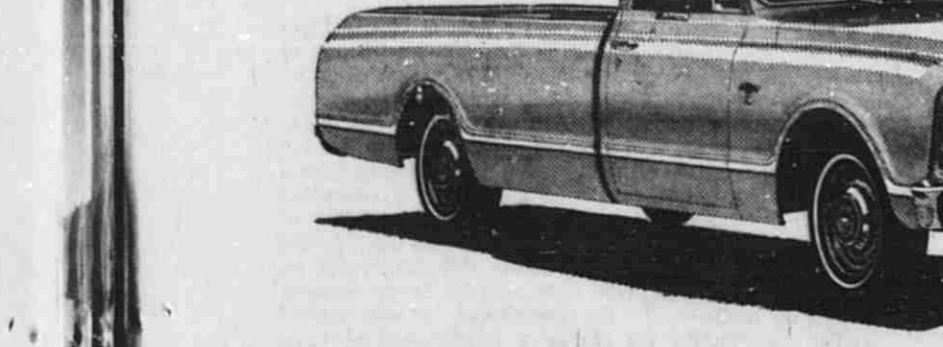

In 1866, a group of people who had been holding Christian worship services in the Logan School House, moved to the Bowne Center, met in the Bowne Center School and began making plans for the building of a church in that community.

The Bowne Center Methodist Church was built that year, mostly by the labor of members and friends. It was completed and dedicated in 1868, and a parsonage was built in 1871, with the debt of \$2,500 being paid by 1874.

A new church bell had been put up and a new steeple was dug. In 1882 the church was remodeled with the installation of new colored glass windows, new pews, and three large chairs, which are still used in the modern-day facilities.

The Ladies' Aid Society, which had been meeting at the homes of various members, greatly enjoyed their new hall, which was finished in October of 1900, at a cost of \$900. The cost of the chicken suppers served in the hall, by the ladies' aid, were twenty-five cents a plate.

The ladies' society meets the 1st Wednesday of every month, and at one time served a hot dinner to the area school children on that day. Since the erection of the ladies' aid hall many reunions, receptions and other community activities have taken place in these well-kept facilities.

Furnace Installed

During the year 1912, a new furnace was installed in the church at a cost of \$100 and the construction on parking sheds adjacent to the church were started. Arthur Clarke, Frances Puritt and Hannah Lott were among those who came to the worship services in horse and buggy fashion and used the sheds, part of which were sold in 1935 for \$35. The sale price was applied towards the cost of wiring the church for electric lights.

A steel roof was put on the church in 1919, and in 1920, the Rev. Alfred Thompson was the last minister to occupy the Bowne Center parsonage, which was sold on August 10, 1942, for \$300.

Alto Parish Organized

The Alto Parish was organized in 1921, containing churches of Snow, Whiteville, South Lowell, Alto, and Bowne Center, and existed for a number of years.

The first military funeral, at the Bowne Center Church, was held in 1929 for Duncan Ross, with burial being made in the Bowne Center Cemetery, located across the street from the church.

The 70th anniversary of the church was observed by the parishioners in 1939.

In 1947, a redecorating job was undertaken by the parishioners in preparation of their 78th anniversary observance to be held in February. New wood put on the walls and a new altar was installed. Gifts to the church including stands, communion table and a new clock added greatly to the beautification. A sum of \$100 was also spent for the repair of the steeple.

The young adults of the church purchased a carpet for the sum of \$1,170 and presented it to the church on February 27, 1949, in observance of the church's 80th anniversary. Bishop Reed and the district superintendent Stone made the presentation.

Many of the older members of the congregation will remember John Nash who gave of his talents as singer and leader for many years, in conducting the choral arrangements for the Sunday services.

Other Improvements

While Rev. Howard McDonald was pastor in 1953, the Bowne Center Church helped in the building of a new kitchen in the Alto parsonage, and in 1954 a completely new kitchen was built in the WSCS Hall at Bowne Center and a church library was started.

In 1959, the most expensive remodeling project of Bowne Center Church was begun, with the church being raised and a new basement put down as its foundation. This additional room supplied new Sunday school classrooms, and rest room facilities. A new front was also designed and erected on the building. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

A rededication service was held on June 26, 1966, at which the Rev. William Beyers of the music for the occasion

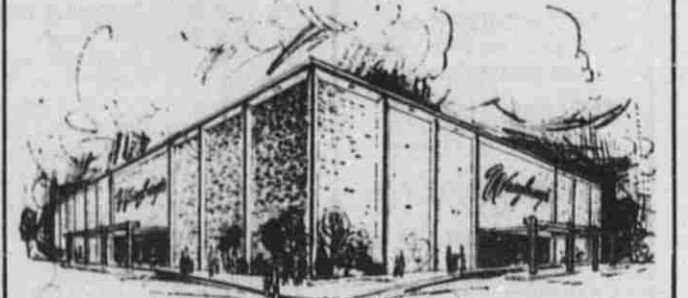

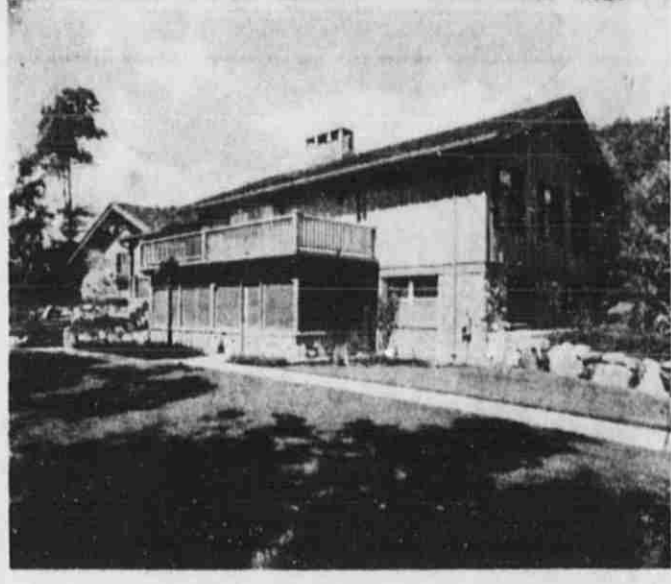

Mr. & Mrs. Dan Vos open new home to SL writer

One of the most original and unique homes in the area is the home of Ruth and Dan Vos, E. ZFulton Road, Ada. A great deal of planning and love has gone into the construction of this unusual home that the Vos' designed.

The house sets on property that was once used as a dumping place for the large rocks that had to be removed when M-21 was first constructed over 50 years ago. At the time the Vos' decided to build, they had no idea that the land was in reality a rock pile. However, this didn't stop them and they used the rocks to great advantage in the construction and the landscaping.

As you enter the home, you ascend steps made of railroad ties and gravel, lined with lovely flowers, as in the parkway. Upon entering the foyer, you immediately notice the unusual beams of Tamarack and old cedar barn siding for paneling, combined with wallpaper. The siding and beams were from an old barn that Mrs. Vos's brother was going to burn near Moline. She asked him to give her two days to take out what she wanted. Also in the foyer is a most unusual mirror made from a horse collar. Perched high in the ceiling is a huge hornets nest that Dan and Ruth found in the woods. Dan assured his wife that it was empty of hornets, but after hanging it and becoming warm they discovered that it was well inhabited. It was a difficult task removing it with swarming hornets, but it was taken down, "dehorneted" and rehung.

Ascending carpeted steps you enter the very definitely "family kitchen." It has all the modern conveniences with early American charm. The stove is built up on bricks and is of the old farm kitchen type, complete with chimney, but it too is completely modern in efficiency. The fireplace is the focal point of the kitchen, the mantel is made of a beam taken from the old barn, and the year 1861 is in the center, made by the original owner, with a square hand wrought nail. There are family heirlooms hanging from the mantel, even a metal purse that once was all beaded that belonged to Mrs. Vos's grandmother, who carried it to church with her collection and peppermints.

A clock that was a wedding gift to her parents sets on the mantel and an old musket over the mantel. A most unusual cherry rocker looks so inviting to sit in by the warmth of the fireplace. The top is all hand carved and a lion looks out at you as if it might growl at any time.

The living room overlooks a deck with colorful deck furniture and a channel that leads to the Grand River, the channel was dug to get fill dirt for the house. The fireplace is truly a conversation piece, and is truly a labor of love.

Most of the stones are from Michigan, with a very unusual cornerstone, almost white, with a round hole in it, that was found at the Ada dump. Many friends have contributed to the fireplace by picking up stones in their various travels Alabama, Colorado, Arizona, California, Canada, and many of the eastern states, there is even petrified wood. One kind man driving by on his way to work, noticed all the stones, he stopped to tell the Vos's that he had some large split stones that they were welcomed to, so these make up the raised hearth.

The decor is very restful, with green carpeting and pieces of gold furniture, which make it a most inviting room. The room overlooks a deck, and the window treatment is most unusual, due to Mrs. Vos's many wonderful ideas.

She used large wrought iron hinges, had holes drill into them and brass links to hold the drapes, they are so when the glass curtains are drawn, they partially cover them, or they can be swung out onto the wall. Over the piano and organ hang old family oval frames and have had the same gold material that is in the furniture for a back ground, and then delicate antique roses to replace the old family portraits.

Upon entering the master bedroom, you eye immediately goes to the lovely old bed, that is over 150 years old, with panels of "Teddy Bear" design, and matching pieces with brown marble tops. This bedroom suite is one of the first ones made by the Old Berkey & Gay Furniture Company of Grand Rapids, and is truly a collector's item. Another favored piece is an old secretary that belonged to Mrs. Vos's parents, she has painted it white and used gold antiquing.

The walls are in soft blue with lovely old fashion print rug, with an off-white background & delicate blue roses, in blocked off squares. Off the bedroom is a carpeted dressing room, in several shades of blue, and bar-type swinging doors.

The guest room also has a lovely old bedroom suite that has white marble tops and is even older than the one in the master bedroom.

The lower level, is a combination family and conference room. This is Dan's domain, with Mrs. Vos's loving touches. She designed the light fixtures for the ceiling and wall. They are made of black wrought iron with candle stick type lights. The large center one is a huge circle with link chains dropping it from the ceiling.

In one corner is a flowing fountain, built up of more stones.

es. The stone fireplace ties in with the fountain. There is a complete kitchen, drafting room and office for Mr. Vos. Off the lower level is a screened in porch, with two hanging light fixtures made from old Model T wheel frames.

Although this is a new home it has all the charm and warmth of an older home. As you enter you feel that it is not a show place, but a real home that was built with a great deal of love and thought. You feel comfortable and truly at home having just visited there.

Influenza is caused by tiny germs

It is surprising to me how many folks think disease is something that "just happens" to them, regardless of what they do. For example, a lot of people accept the threat of influenza each fall and winter season as a matter of pure chance.

It is especially recommended for persons suffering from chronic disease of the heart, circulatory system, lungs and metabolic systems. Folks in older age groups, patients living in nursing homes and pregnant women should also be vaccinated.

But there are some other preventive steps which can help too—like getting plenty of rest, eating regular well-balanced meals, moderate exercise, avoiding fatigue and crowds. These can keep up your resistance to infection.

If you have cold symptoms, and also develop weakness, headache, and muscular pains, phone your doctor and take his advice.
