Through UNICEF every penny you give will provide a ngster with six glasses of milk. Five pennies will buy enough penicillin to make two sick children well.


All money collected Monday night will be forwarded to the UNICEF headquarters for this area in Grand Rapids.

Of the 117 contributing countries, only 10 are communist governed. Of the 118 countries which benefit from UNI-CEF programs, only four are communist governed.

In 1965, the communist governed countries contributed \$1,-346,153, to UNICEF. In the same year, the mothers and children of communist governed countries only received \$477,610, in UNI-CEF program benefits to their

UNICEF is definitely not communist controlled or dominated. It is an international organization designed to help care for the needs of sick and hungry children around the world.

Retired Lowell farmer to be honored on 87th birthday

Ernest Althaus will be cutting his 87th birthday cake Sunday, October 30, at the First Methodist Church of Lowell, from 3 to 5 p. m., when his children will hold an open house in his honor. All of his friends and neighbors in the community are invited, No formal invitations are being issued.

Ernest Althaus, who is celebrating his 87th birthday this week, was born on a farm in Canton of Bern, Switzerland, October 26, 1879. He is from a family of eleven children; five brothers and five sisters. All of the family except the oldest boy and girl came to America

Mr. Althaus was ten when he arrived on the steamer "Champagne" in New York and then took the train to Lowell, settling on a farm in Vergennes Township, now a part of the McPherson farms.

He attended the McPherson school, located near the farm; working and attending school several months each year until he was sixteen. His main ambition, he tells, was learning to read and write English, and this he accomplished to an outstanding degree for his limited time in school.

He also speaks German with perfect dialect and an expansive vocabulary. The family also speaks the unwritten Swiss dialect. In the home, the chil-

dren were required to speak English At the age of 14, he worked

out in various farms during the busy harvest seasons of the year, and attended school in between. At 22, he joined his father in farming, on shares, on a farm a few miles north of Lowell, along the Flat River. Ernest tried city life only briefly when he went to work on a milk route at the age of 25, but soon decided to go back to farming which he loved. In 1907 he rented and later purchased the Hodges' farm, a few miles northwest of Lowell on



One of the most original and unique homes in the area is the home of Ruth and Dan Vos, E. ZFulton Road, Ada, A great deal of planning and love has gone into the construction of this unusual home that the Vos's

The house sets on property that was onced used as a dumping place for the large rocks that had to be removed when M-21 was first constructed over 50 years ago. At the time the Vos's decided to build, they had no idea that the land was in reality a rock pile. However, this didn't stop them and they used the rocks to great advantage in the construction and

the landscaping.

As you enter the home, you ascend steps made of railroad ties and gravel, lined with loveflowers, as in the parkway. Upon entering the foyer, you immediately notice the unusual beams of Tammarack and old cedar barn siding for paneling, combined with wallpaper. The siding and beams were from an old barn that Mrs. Vos's brother was going to burn near Moline. She asked him to give her two days to take out what she wanted. Also in the foyer is a most unusual mirror made from a horse collar. Perched high in the ceiling is a huge hornets nest that Dan and Ruth found in the woods. Dan assured his wife that it was empty of hornets, but after hanging it and becoming warm they discovered that it was well inhabitated. It was a difficult task removing it with swarming horn-ets, but it was taken down, "de-

horneted" and rehung. Ascending carpeted steps you enter the very definitely "family kitchen." It has all the modern conveniences with early American charm. The stove is built up on bricks and is of the old farm kitchen type, complete with chimney, but it too is com-pletely modern in efficiency. The fireplace is the focal point of the kitchen, the mantel is made of a beam taken from the old barn, and the year 1861 is in the center, made by the original owner, with a square hand wrought nail. There are family heirlooms hanging from the mantel, even a metal purse that once was all beaded that belonged to Mrs. Vos's grandmother, who carried it to church with her collection and pep-

dug to get fill dirt for the house. The fireplace is truly a conver-sation piece, and is truly a la-bor of love, Most of the stones are from

Michigan, with a very unusual cornerstone, almost white, with a round hole in it, that was found at the Ada dump. Many friends have contributed to the fireplace by picking up stones in their various travels Alabama, Colorado, Arizona, California, Canada, and many of the eastern states, there is even petrified wood. One kind man driving by on his way to work, no-ticed all the stones, he stopped to tell the Vos's that he had some large split stones that they were welcomed to, so these make up the raised hearth.

The decor is very restful, with green carpeting and pieces of gold furniture, which make it a most inviting room. The room overlooks a deck, and the window treatment is most unusual, due to Mrs. Vos's many wond-

erful ideas.
