Approximately 95 deer were reported being processed at the Meat Processing Plant in Alto on Tuesday; a slight increase over last year's kill.

According to the authorities at the meat plant, the size and racks of the bucks are much nicer and more uniform this season, Only four does have been brought in to date.

The State Highway Depart-ment revealed this week that they will take bids on a new bridge over the Grand River on M-91 in Lowell on December 7. The new bridge, which has been in the planning stage for two years, is estimated to cost \$410,000 and the completion date has been set at May 31, 1968. Part of the deal to have a new bridge built just east of the present structure is the abandonment of M-91 by the State Highway Department after the bridge and the repairs to the highway are completed.

Next year the highway department will spend \$70,000 repairing M-91 out to the freeway. The present bridge over the Grand River is being repaired almost every week to keep it open for traffic. It is our under-standing that this bridge will be used while the new structure is being built.

Using various reference materials, Lind's article is aimed provide staggering number inputs for d-c checking of integrated-circuit arrays, an advanced logic system was developed that can flash through test schedules at 5,000 permutations per second.
