Curt Fonger, a 6 ft. 6 inch sophomore, played a fine game defensively along with veterans Mike Olson and Pete Osborne. On the free throw line Lowell hit 63 percent making 12 of 19.

Planning Commission OKs W. Main zoning changes

At the meeting Monday night of the City Planning Commission approval was given for the enlargement of the West Main Street commercial area.

Following the vote of the citizens to allow some 7 acres to be made C-3, which opens it to all types of commercial development, the Planning Commission agreed that a further extension be made.

According to the preliminary approval of the Planning Commission a C-1 Limited Highway District was set up for this area. This district is intended to meet the service needs of the motoring public, and the needs of business operations requiring large land areas and highway access.

Permitted would be: auto or trailer sales and repair service shops; farm implement sales

and service; eating and drinking establishments; indoor amusement or entertainment establishments; outdoor or drive-in theatres; motels; automotive supply and services, but not including filling stations; fuel or wholesale distributors; and other similar types of business.

Junk yards or industrial uses are specifically prohibited. All commercial lots are limited to a minimum of 1.84 acres with at least 175 feet of frontage on the highway. Other requirements would not permit driveways to be closer than 150 feet.

Area Defined

The Planning Commission defined the area proposed for this C-1 Limited Highway District to two areas. The first to be across from the new C3 area approved by the voters.

The other section would extend on the south side of the highway from Alden Nash Avenue on the west to a point 300 feet east of the Michigan Bottled Gas property. This would allow McQueen Motors, who have an option to buy 300 feet of frontage from Mrs. Leo Denny, to build a new Chrysler-Plymouth Sales and Service Garage.

On the north side of the highway all of the frontage was approved for change opposite the south frontage except for the DeMull Junk Yard property, which would remain AA Residential and Agricultural.

The recommendation of the Planning Commission will be forwarded to the City Council, who are expected to approve the plan at their next meeting on December 5.

Plan Senior Government Day

Preparations are being completed this week for Lowell's participation in Senior Government Day at Grand Rapids Junior College.

Lowell's total group of fifty participants has been divided into ten smaller groups which will discuss the varied topics of juvenile problems, taxation, law enforcement, education, civil rights, courts, elections, political parties, local governments, and legislation.

Six area schools are taking part in this program to be held on December 1, and each has one or two specific areas of government of which it is the leader and must also arrange for qualified speakers to appear.

Lowell's section topic is that of legislation, especially pertaining to the State Senate and the House of Representatives. Speaking on this subject will be Martin Booth, Minority Leader of the State House of Representatives, Stanley Powell, a member of the State House of Representatives, and Bernard Olson, Lowell's City Manager.

These men will form a panel which five students from each of the schools may question and then report their discussions back to an assembly of all of the combined groups. Each of the groups will have a secretary to record these discussions and also a discussion leader from its respective school; handling Lowell's section will be senior Bill McPherson.

It is hoped that not only will an active interest and additional understanding of government be acquired, but students can also have an excellent opportunity to meet numerous students from the other schools taking part in Senior Government Day.

Holsteins set new records

Milk and butterfat production levels established by Registered Holstein cows in this area have been reported by Holstein-Friesian Association of America. The individual lactations were tested under official supervision.

Vicinity cows listed in the Holstein report are: Peipkow Creston Snowy 485-8555, a seven-year-old, produced 16,330 lbs. of milk and 714 lbs. of butterfat in 350 days. Janeland Dandy Dewdrop Burke 5332939, a four-year-old, had 15,420 lbs. of milk and 646 lbs. of butterfat in 330 days.

Janeland Boris Lucky Strike 5329020, a four-year-old, had 15,000 lbs. of milk and 538 lbs. of butterfat in 305 days.

These new production figures may be compared to the estimated annual output of 7,880 lbs. of milk and 285 lbs. of butterfat by the average U. S. dairy cow, notes the national Holstein Association.

Michigan State University supervised the sampling, weighing and testing operations in cooperation with the Holstein organization's herd and breed improvement programs.

The complaint has been finally halted by action of the Water Resources Commission.

The water above the Lowell Municipal Light & Power dam, which is just above White's Bridge, is known to be one of the best places in Michigan for Northern pike. It often surpasses Canadian pike fishing.

Francis Frost and the Water Resources Commission have been working with the Gibson Refrigerator Company and the Detroit Gasket Company who have spent many thousands of dollars for oil separators and equipment to keep phosphates out of the river.

Pike that tasted like gasoline or oil were first reported to the Water Resources Commission in May of 1965 by Mr. and Mrs. John D. Fravel, who have been working with Mr. Frost on the project since that time.

Only 18 mailing days are left before Christmas

Postmaster Charles Doyle reminded Lowell residents today that there are only eighteen mailing days before Christmas.

"While that may seem like a long time to most people, it is frighteningly short to those of us in the Postal Service," he said. "Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has predicted that well over eight billion pieces of mail must be delivered between now and Christmas Eve, a new record."

"We are asking everyone to start thinking about their Christmas shopping and mailing now. If all the holiday mail were to hit the postal system at one time, it is obvious that we'd have difficulty delivering every piece on time."

The Lowell post office expects to handle a quarter of a million pieces of mail during the holiday rush, the Postmaster said. Mailing early and spreading the mail flow out along the entire pre-Christmas season is the key to better mail service at this time of the year.

Last year the public cooperation was "tremendous," according to Mr. Doyle. Virtually every piece of holiday mail was delivered before Christmas Day. This year with increased volume because of the continuing strength of the economy we are hoping to see that fine cooperative spirit again.

Postmaster Doyle offered the following mailing tips.

Use ZIP Codes on all mail. "If there are some ZIP Codes that you still need for your mailing list come to the Post Office and we will look them up in the ZIP Code directory or give us a call." ZIP Codes are more important than ever this year.

Prepare your gift list right away. The earlier you do your shopping, the better chance you have to get exactly what you want while the stores are still full of merchandise. That way, you can mail earlier too.

Be sure to have enough boxes, tape, string and wrapping paper on hand.

Wrap your packages well. Include sufficient padding. Remember, that your parcel may be shipped in a mail sack with a set of the encyclopedia riding on top.

Include a card or piece of paper inside the package with your name and address and that of the person you are sending the parcel to in case the wrapping should be loose and come off. That way, you can be assured your gift will not wind up in the dead parcel office. Also, insert a list of the package's contents.

Address your gifts and greetings clearly so that the postal workers will have no difficulty in reading the destination. Use first-class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved.

Flasher proposed at M-21, Ada Dr.

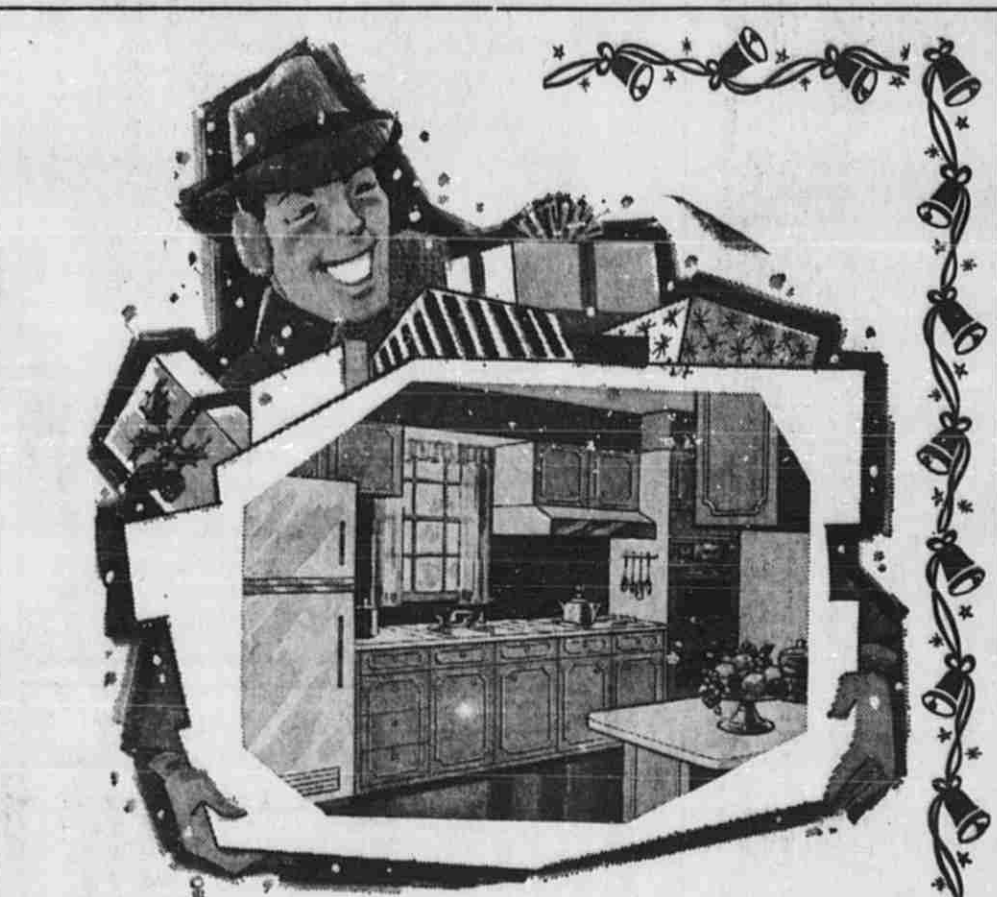

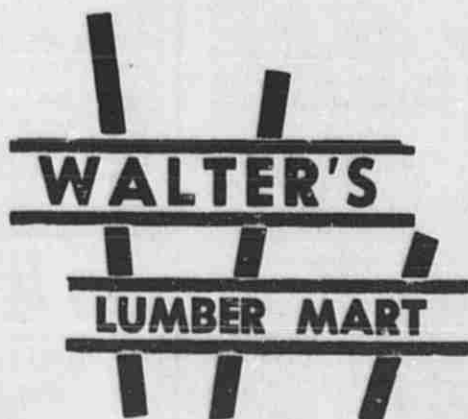
