Four injured as car rams parked vehicle

Four Lowell people were in-jured at 2:30 a, m, Saturday when their car crashed into a parked car at 100 Main Street. Most severely injured was Fred Blaser, 17, of Five Mile Load, Lowell, who suffered head and internal injuries.

Also injured was the driver, Midolph Gould, 19, of 601 Hunt Street, Lowell, Larry Snyder, 20, of Route 1, Lowell, and Lois Kauffman, 18, of Route 2, Alto. All were taken by ambulance to Blodgett Memorial Hospital, where Blaser was listed as critical, but improving on Tuesday, and Miss Kauffman was reported to remain in fair condition. Gould and Snyder were treated

and released Lowell Police authorities said that an investigation showed that the vehicle had just turned onto Main Street from Lafayette Street, and was headed west. Gould apparently lost control of the car, and rammed into the rear of a parked car owned by Mrs. Mary Kennedy of Shephard Drive, Lowell.

A local group, interested in building a 60 bed nursing home here, have asked the Ledger to help determine how many patients from the Lowell area are presently living in nursing or convalescent homes.

A statement setting forth the anticipated sources of patients must be furnished the Federal Housing Administration and the State Health Department before any further consideration can be given the plan.

It is one thing to assume that this area could support such a facility and quite another thing to convince the State Health De partment that the plan should

be given approval. This is a difficult survey to make," a spokesman for the group said, "because, without the full cooperation of area residents there is no way to furnish proof of the anticipated pa-
