Lets contract for new bridge here

The State Highway Depart-ment let contracts last week for a new bridge over Grand River, on M-91, in the City of Lowell to Brown Brothers of Lansing for \$352,158.

Completion date for the bridge is May, 1968. Cross & White were the sub-contractors for drainage and grading, and Grand Rapids Asphalt for pav-

Also let was a contract with the Grand Trunk Western Railroad for the construction of a grade crossing and incidental work on M-91 at a cost of

The new bridge will be two lanes, with a sidewalk, and will be built just east of the present structure, which will be used until the new bridge is completed. Right-of-way for the new bridge is being furnished by the city on the north side, and by the Kent County Road Commission on the south side. The new bridge will eliminate the sharp turn onto the present

Work on the new bridge is expected to get underway by the first of the year.

New area telephone directorserving 16 communities in Grand Rapids area will be alivered to all subscribers beginning Friday, December 16.

Robert I. Thole, manager for the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, also reminded area phone users that the dial "1" distance calls will go into ef-fect at 12:91 a. m. Saturday, December 17. Starting on Saturphone users in the area will need only to dial first instead of "112" to reach the nationwide long distance dialing network.

Thole said some 270,000 directories will be delivered in Grand Rapids and the following 15 other communities: Ada, Al-to, Byron Center, Caledonia, Dorr, Dutton, Grandville, Grattan, Hudsonville, Jamestown, Lowell, Marne, Moline, Rock-

ford and Sparta.

Thole called attention to the new format for emergency numbers on the inside front cover of the directory. It features emblems-such as a flame for fire, a shield for police, a star for sheriff and state police-associated with the emergency numbers.

Thole urged parents to point out this page to their children to familiarize them with the symbolic emergency numbers. He further asked parents to remind children that they can always dial "0" for help. The new directories include

Grand Rapids postal ZIP codes on a full-page map as well as the telephone number for ZIP code information for other ar-
