Ask city zoning changes to permit six additional apartment units

Douglas Dok, representing Lopresented to the City Council Monday evening a proposed 15 lot addition to Valley Vista Plat and asked for zoning changes to allow six more four-family

Lowell Development have two buildings, with eight units built or under construction, and Mr. Dok told the Council that their surveys revealed that the community can support a total of 32 units, over the next few

The Council set a hearing on the zoning change for February and sent the plat plan to the Planning Commis examination.

ing north on M-91 in my 11/2 ton Dodge 6 truck which was loaded with pipe and water drum and turned left at the light on M-21. I saw a police cruiser about a block to my right when I turned and kept watch of him in my rear view mirror, After I turned right (north) on Lincoln Lake Road passed a radar car stationed .2 of a mile from the corner

of M-21. The police cruiser stopped me just beyond. When I turned at the light I realized the cruiser was behind me and watched my speedometer which did not go above 28 miles per hour in a 25 mile zone. When the cruiser stopped me, I thought to myself, "Is he going to stop me for 30 miles an hour in a 25 zone?" He then said he clocked me at 50 miles per hour. This cruiser was quite a ways behind me when he turned on to Lincoln

Lake Road. The cruiser patrolman also said the radar clocked me at 50. They said maybe my speed-ometer was wrong so I had them check me out again and radar and speedometer check-

ed O. K. I checked out my 11/2 ton 6-Cylinder truck on the way home when it was empty as I turned on Cascade Road after turning off M-91. In .2 of a mile with the accelerator to the floor I couldn't quite get it up to 50 miles per hour. They said that they checked me before I got to the radar at 50 miles per hour and that was 2 of a mile from the corner. How then, in light of my test on Cascade Road, could that truck with a full load possibly have been going that fast?

Besides, when I was watching that cruiser from the traffic light to this spot and saw him turn the corner in the distance, I would have been mighty stupid to have that accelerator to the floor. I happened to be watching the speedometer to keep it down to 25 and it was never over 28. Isn't it possible the radar

as an underhanded operation picked up the speed of the po-lice cruiser catching up to me? The patrolman following didn't

possibly have that much time to check my speed at 50. I have often read in articles in Reader's Digest and other publications of this type of un-derhanded operation but never thought I would run into it in this same area in which I live. Does Lowell have to resort to this to get money in the till?
