# mail box vandals are apprehended

Three Lowell area teenagers entertained a curtailed Christ-mas holiday, following an act of vandalism they committed on December 16, in which they des-

December 16, in which they destroyed eight mail boxes.

In an agreement with the Kent County Sheriff's Department the parents of the vandals have agreed that the 16-year-old youths will make the proper restitution.

The youths were arrested last Wednesday by the Kent Coun-ty Sheriff's Department and postal inspectors for blowing up the mail boxes with cherry

# Is Federal Offense

Mail boxes are protected by Federal law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment, Lowell Postmaster Charles Doyle warned to-

Postmaster noted that 25.000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the past year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested in the year up to June 30 for damaging or destroying mail receptacles

Postmaster Doyle quoted from the law: "Whoever wilfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letter box or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or wilfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisonment not more than three

This applies to all mail recep-tacles and the mail in them, even though the boxes are purchased by citizens and are their personal property, Postmaster Doyle emphasized,

# Takes Out Humor

"Pranksters - and especially children who do not know any better - should be made to realize the seriousness of their " the Postmaster said. "A \$1,000 fine or a term in jail is enough to take the hum-or out of the prank."

In Michigan, a justice sentenced two 18-year-olds to 10 days in jail, including two on a diel of baby food. The diet specification, explained the judge, was because the youths "acted like babies." They were also fined \$25 each plus \$15 costs.

In New York state. five youths were fined \$25 each pius restitution or restoration, plus no driving for an indefinite period, plus an 8 p. m. curfew, plus a written analysis by each of a magazine article entitled. Judge Gets Tough on Hoodlums."

Two Iowa youths who damaged 39 mailboxes were required to personally apologize to each boxholder in addition to making repairs or providing a new box.



stration is automatically continued for another two-year But state law requires clerks in December, to go through their registration books and send a "notice of suspension of

TOTAL With these facts and figures before them, your Board of Education had to make some very basic decisions on what buildings were to be built with the available funds and what to do about the other buildings that could not be built because of a lack of funds. The members of the Board agreed unanimously that the Bushnell Flementary School had to have first priority, and that narrowed the choice down to build either the Alto addition or the high school

It took several hours of actual meeting time and several days of serious thinking about all the various problems involved in both the Alto area and the high school before any final decision could be made. If the high school addition were not built, the students would be allowed at school only when they had classes, and certain courses would have to be dropped from the curriculum because of lack

If the Alto addition were not built, the people in Alto would feel dissatisfied because they voted to add rooms to the school in Alto and there was a great desire on the part of all parties concerned to place the

kindergarten back in the school, instead of temporary quarters. After a great deal of discussion and soul searching, and on the recommendation of the school administrators, the Board decided to build the high school addition. This decision was made on the basis that the entire district would benefit from the addition, and offering a gram was essential to every student in the system. The money situation then had to be clarified on the projects to be built and these figures agreed to: Bushnell cost High school addition 215,250



The new crossing is a part of a Department of Highways relocation project.







In a report in "Michigan Farm Economics." Dr. John R. Brake said, "Interest rates to 7% percent on short term and real estate credit. In addition, down payment require-ments will be larger than last



# 2,000 perish every year in home fires

More than 2,000 children die every year in home fires. Yet, most of them could walk swiftly away from death if they were given the most elemen-

tary fire instructions.

A parent would be horrified to discover his child's school did not hold fire drills. But a child is 200 more times likely to be trapped in fire at home than at school.

Here are some pointers for setting up your own fire drills at home:

Map out, with the children helping, two separate escape routes, from each room—a main route and in case that it blocked an alternate, Main exits usually are doors and stairways. Alternates usually are windows.

A portable ladder provides an excellent escape from upper windows. These range from an inexpensive rope ladder to those of light weight aluminum. A sturdy trellis outside a window may be ladder enough for an may be ladder enough for an

The most important lifesaving command to impress upon children: Escape immediately. Don't let them try to put out the fire of pause to gather up possessions. Minutes, even up possessions. Minutes, even seconds, are crucial. Fires can spread unbelievably fast. And set a specific place outside to gather promptly for a quick head count.

head count.

If the window is jammed or frozen shut during a fire, children may not think of the obvious: break the window. Show them how to smash the pane with a loose shoe, and then run the shoe around the inside of the frame to clean off jagged edges before climbing out.

Impress upon the children the deadliness of smoke. The majority of fire victims are asphyxiated by smoke long before the flames touch them. Warn the children against braving smoke-filled halls, or flinging open a door and letting the smoke pour in. Wet handkerchiefs over the mouth do not filter out poisonous gases in smoke

Once you work out your fam-ily fire drill, make a note on the kitchen calendar to repeat the drill at regular intervals. Some households feel once a month isn't too often.

Adults also die in home fires, and these same basic rules apply to all ages and both sexes. Practice drills will help much to reduce the natural panic that grips most folks when they realize abruptly that their house is


