North Bell District asks to join Lowell instead of Saranac

Bell School District in Boson Township, Ionia County, led by Lyle Condon, president of the School District, are asking to join the Lowell Area Schools system, instead of Saranac,

The North Bell District was voted into the Saranac District in the K-12 election held last month

Condon told the school board that 12 students in their district already go to Lowell, while only one goes to Saranac. The district has closer ties with Lowell than with Saranac. North Bell operates a seven grade school with 17 pupils, and has a state equalized valuation of over \$379,000.

The district seeks to be admitted to the Lowell District on the same terms as others voted in by K-12 elections, which gives a three year mor-atorium on payment of bonded indebtedness in the school they



School election Monday; classrooms are needed

On Monday, January 16, 1967, the voters of the Lowell Area School District will vote on a \$140,000 bond issue that will be "sed to erect, furnish and equip an addition to the Alto Elementary School.

To vote in the election, you must be a citizen of the United States and twenty-one years of age or older; a resident of Michigan for at least 6 months and of the school district at least thirty days prior to the election; have property assess-ed for taxes within the school district or be the husband or wife of such a person; and be a registered elector. Two Precincts

There are two voting pre-ciacts in the school district. Voters on Cascade Road (Old 16) and south of it will vote in Precinct Two located in the Alto School. Those voters living north of Cascade Road will vote in Precinct One located in the

Runciman Elementary School, located at the corner of High and Monroe Streets in Lowell. Qualified voters from the former Moseley, Talbot, Alton and Mapes districts are included in this election, and the tax increase would apply to property in those areas if the issue is passed

The polls will be open from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. Every qualified voter is urged to vote.

Classrooms Needed This year the Lowell Area

Schools has 1,164 students in grades kindergarten through 5, in forty-one sections. Twenty of the forty-one sections have 30 or more students in them. The goal of the Board of Education is to have an average of twentyfive students in each section, with a maximum of twentyeight in a classroom. To accomplish this aim, a minimum of forty-two classrooms is needed

The addition of four more hiring the additional teachers

classrooms at the Alto Elementary School would give the system a total of forty-two classrooms for the elementary students. If the teachers are to achieve the opportunity to do the best job of teaching possible, it is necessary to give them smaller groups of students, to teach. The addition of these

Post Office to add more ZIP to parcel post

The Post Office Department will add more ZIP to parcel post service when new rates go into effect on January 15, Low-

The extra ZIP will come thru the use of ZIP Codes to determine zone rates. The first three digits of the ZIP Code number will reveal the zone and will thus speed rate determination. This replaces a system whereby a directory often had to be consulted for the zone of
