Approve school vote, 382-239

The voters in the Lowell Area School District voted Monday to build a four room addition on the Alto Elementary School by a vote of 382 to 239.

The yes vote carried in both precincts. In Alto the vote was 196 yes; 76 no, and one spoiled. In Lowell the vote was 276 yes; 163 no, and four spoiled.

A total of 626 voters turned out for the election out of a possible 3,307 registered voters. This is an 18.9 percent turnout of the possible voters.

The \$140,000 bond issue will be sold as soon as possible and the construction of the addition

should start around April. The new addition should be completed by August so that it may be used next fall.

Again the voters of the Lowell Area School District have proved their great interest in the education of young people by approving this bond issue.

The Board of Education is gratified by the interest shown by the people of this district, and members of the Board pledge anew to do everything in their power to make the Lowell Area Schools one of the best systems in the State of Michigan.

90 families benefit from Moose drive

The 1966 "Operation Santa Claus Drive," conducted by the Lowell Moose Civic Affairs Committee was brought to a close this week, when LaVerne Baker, committee chairman, made a final accounting of donations and distributions.

In his report, Baker revealed that over 90 families in the Lowell area received assistance from the 15-year-old project; giving them one of the merriest Christmases possible.

Donations to the annual drive, by local residents, boosted the project's distribution to a record volume, allowing each family to receive a Christmas package loaded with toys, candy, clothing, etc.

Since Santa Claus made his annual delivery of the packages on December 23, the Moose Civic Affairs Committee has received an abundance of mail congratulating them on their fine promotion, and cards of thanks from the recipients of the project.

One such letter, which points to all the wonderful aspects of the program, was received from Monsignor Joseph C. Walen, chairman of the Kent County Board of Social Services, who aided the local committee in this annual endeavor.

In his letter, Mr. Walen wrote "the holiday season was a happier, more meaningful occasion for many of the less fortunate citizens of our community because of the thoughtfulness and generosity of many groups and organizations such as your own."

"There obviously is no need to explain to you how limited are the Kent County Department of Social Services' means when it comes to providing anything beyond the bare necessities for those whom we serve. You have shown that you understand this in the most effective way—through your contribution."

"Since those who benefitted directly from your gift cannot personally thank you, we are taking this opportunity to thank you in their behalf. And to thank you ourselves also, for what you have done makes our work more effective as well as more rewarding."

Thurtell and the third passenger, Frank Blazo, 18, of Route 2, Lowell, were treated for minor cuts and bruises.

John Arehart former village official dies

John A. Arehart, 83, former village president, from 1933 to 1944, died Monday morning, January 16, at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids, after a short illness.

Funeral services were held for Mr. Arehart Wednesday morning at St. Mary's Church in Lowell. Interment was made in St. Mary's Cemetery.

Besides his service on the village council, he was a director of the City State Bank; manager and officer of the Lowell Specialty Company, which sold to the present Root-Lowell Manufacturing Company in 1928.

He later was manager and officer in the Universal Manufacturing firm of Saranac, which he formed along with several other men from this community.

Mr. Arehart is survived by his wife, Mabel; two sons, Geo. of Lowell and William of Mishawaka, Indiana; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Messer of Ionia; four grandchildren; and one brother, Herbert of Great Falls, Montana.

Semester exams start Thursday

Semester examinations will begin Thursday morning for all students in the Lowell Area Schools, first through twelfth grades.

As in previous years, all students will take exams Thursday & Friday mornings. There will be no school on Thursday and Friday afternoons during which time teachers will correct and grade the examinations. On each of the two days, school will be dismissed at 12:05 p. m. and buses will leave at 12:15.

There will be no school at all on Monday, January 23, to enable teachers to record the semester grades and mark the cards. School will reconvene on Tuesday, January 24, for the beginning of the second semester.

The end of semester schedule for kindergartners is different from that of the other grades. All morning the kindergartners will attend school Thursday morning only and be returned home on the 12:15 buses. They will not return to school again until Tuesday, January 24.

All afternoon kindergartners will skip their afternoon session on Thursday, January 19, and, instead, will attend school Friday morning, January 20, from 8:45 until 11:00 a. m. They will not return again until the first day of the second semester, January 24, at their regular afternoon time.

Health educator speaks before Rotary Club

The Rotary Club of Lowell met Wednesday, January 11, at the American Legion Hall, for their weekly luncheon and special program.

Jack Kennedy, program chairman, introduced the guest speaker, Miss Sidney Messner, Health Educator for the Kent County Health Department.

Miss Messner has a major in health education from Central Michigan University and before coming to Kent County did some health education work in Midland County.

She was delightfully informal and once she passed the part of her program which dealt with the functions of the Kent County Health Department, sparked a great deal of interest in her talk.

Miss Messner felt rather strongly that the schools should spend a great deal more effort and time in the fields of sex education, alcoholism education and venereal disease education.

There has apparently been a marked increase in venereal disease among young people in Kent County, some of it being found in children as young as nine and ten years old. Miss Messner stated that "they don't get it from door knobs."

Superintendent of Schools, James Pace, stated that the subject of increased sex education at the elementary level is under consideration and that the Michigan State Health Department will release guidelines on this matter some time in February of this year.

Besides being employed by the Health Department, Miss Messner is on the ski patrol at Cannonburg.

Dr. Robert Kyser will present a program at the next Rotary Club luncheon, Wednesday on "Dental Health" and Paul Dederich will present an interesting program on "Pistols 'N' Petticoats," at the following meeting.

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Mothers' March of Dimes drive starts Thursday

The annual Lowell March of Dimes Mothers' March will get underway this Thursday, January 19, climaxed March of Dimes Month.

Mrs. C. Oren Balcom, Lowell area chairman for the 1967 Lowell March of Dimes, announced a goal of \$102,000 has been set for Kent County, with the Mothers' March striving for \$57,000 of this amount.

Assisting Mrs. Balcom are captains Mrs. Frank Stephens, Mrs. Martin Johnson, Mrs. Elmer Graham, Mrs. Paul Dintaman, and Mrs. Donald MacNaughton.

The Mothers' March is scheduled to run the week of January 19 through January 26.

Contributions last year to the Kent County March of Dimes provided 100 percent support for the birth defects evaluation clinic at Mary Free Bed Hospital, now beginning its second year of operation; patient aid for polio patients stricken before the Salk Vaccine; for some birth defects patients; support for the birth defects treatment and research centers at the University of Michigan; and \$27,000 for basic research in the prevention of birth defects.



Speed reduction signs will be installed next week on M-21 coming into Lowell from the west, Police Chief Avery Block revealed this week.

Dispute over names on plaque leads to complete removal

Lowell's new Waste Water Treatment Plant went into official operation this week following the formal dedication Wednesday morning. The plant was built by Erhart Construction Co. for \$327,400, with engineering and other expenses bringing the total price to approximately \$360,000. Construction started last spring and was completed ahead of schedule. The building houses treatment facilities for the waste solids that enter the system. There is pumping equipment and a complete laboratory for checking the operation of the plant.



Sour note mars dedication...

The only sour note in the dedication of the Waste Water Treatment Plant on Wednesday was caused by the plaque pictured above. The plaque was ordered removed and destroyed by the City Council in their meeting on Monday night. The plaque failed to carry the name of former councilman, Charles R. Doyle, who served on the council that contracted for the plant. He asked, through his attorney, that the plaque be removed and one carrying his name be erected. The council voted to destroy this plaque but not to install a new one.

The City Council voted on Monday night to remove and destroy the plaque placed on the new Waste Water Treatment Plant being put into operation this week, south of Recreation Park.

The plaque which carried all the names of the present, but not that of the council that OK'd the sketch for the plaque last April.

Missing from the plaque was the name of Charles R. Doyle, who was defeated for re-election last April and in his place on the plaque was the name of Virginia Myers, who defeated him.

The City Clerk read a letter from Mr. Doyle's attorney, Gerald Henry, which gave the city thirty days to remove the present plaque and put up one which would carry the name of Charles Doyle.

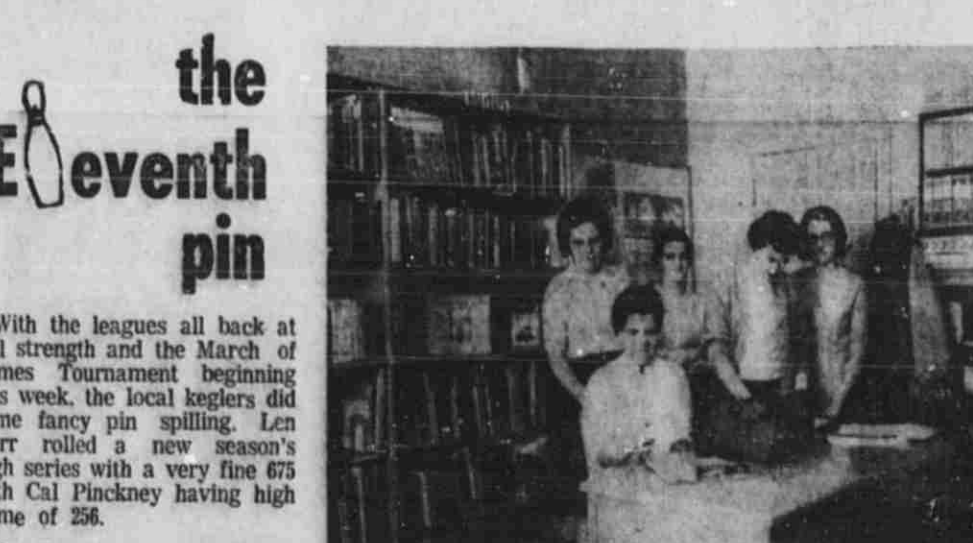

This will allow him to teach in any of the grades in Michigan Public Schools, kindergarten through the eighth grade. A Junior high school certificate may be earned by EIP students also. This certificate permits him to teach in grades kindergarten through ninth.

One of the benefits that Mrs. Tameris has pointed out to Mrs. Palmer is that EIP provides one and one-half years of carefully guided classroom experience. It also provides a solid foundation in general education and the liberal arts, and special depth of understanding in the behavioral sciences.

The Elementary Intern Program has been in operation since 1959 and several hundred students have graduated in this program. EIP is in operation in ten community colleges and forty-eight Michigan school districts, cooperating with Michigan State University.

The ten EIP centers located in Michigan are as follows: Alpena, Bay City, Battle Creek, Grand Rapids, Highland Park, Detroit, Lansing, Livonia, Macomb, Pontiac, and Port Huron. EIP is an outstanding teacher education program. Professional education courses are organized into compact and related offerings so that the teachers have guided experiences with pupils at the same time they are learning how to teach. Local school districts provide class observations and demonstration experiences.

During the fourth year, the student has his own classroom which he supervises and guides. He is supervised and guided by an Intern Consultant; each Consultant devotes full time to five intern teachers.

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Filing your income tax

Everyone over 65 years old, whether single or married, who is a citizen or resident of the United States and has gross income of \$600 or more during the year must file a federal income tax return.

If you are 65 or older on the last day of your tax year, no return is required unless gross income was \$1,200 or more. If your income is under the above figures, you should file a return to obtain any refund due you of income tax withheld from salaries or wages.

Businessmen, farmers, and other self-employed persons must file a return if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

If in doubt about the filing requirements, telephone your local Internal Revenue Service Office.

Two income tax returns—Form 1040A and Form 1040—are provided for the filing of federal individual income tax returns.

The taxpayers whose incomes were less than \$10,000 and who had no more than \$300 of income from dividends, interest and other sources and suggest using Form 1040A.

A joint return on Form 1040A may be filed by a husband and wife if their combined income was less than \$10,000 and other requirements were met.

Form 1040 must be used to claim status as "Head of Household" or "Surviving Spouse"; (2) claim a credit for dependent income; (3) claim an exclusion for " Sick Pay"; (4) claim credit for estimated tax payments paid during the year; (5) claim travel, transportation, moving or other expenses; (6) claim exemptions for dependents based on multiple support agreements; (7) itemize deductions; (8) pay self-employment tax; or (9) claim credit for taxes paid on gasoline and lubricating oil not used on highways.

The instructions which accompany the form you are required to file give all the "Do's and Don'ts" on its preparation. Read the instructions if you still have a question, telephone your local Internal Revenue Service Office.

When and Where To File Form 1040. You are required by law to file your 1966 income tax return not later than April 15, 1967.

Michigan taxpayers should mail returns showing refunds, directly to the Service Center at Cincinnati, Ohio. This address is 222 East Center Parkway, Cincinnati, Ohio, 45268. This will help speed the processing and refunding procedure involved by eliminating one handling operation.

Taxpayers who owe tax should continue to mail their returns to District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Detroit, Michigan. Checks or money orders in payment of the tax should be made payable to "Internal Revenue Service."

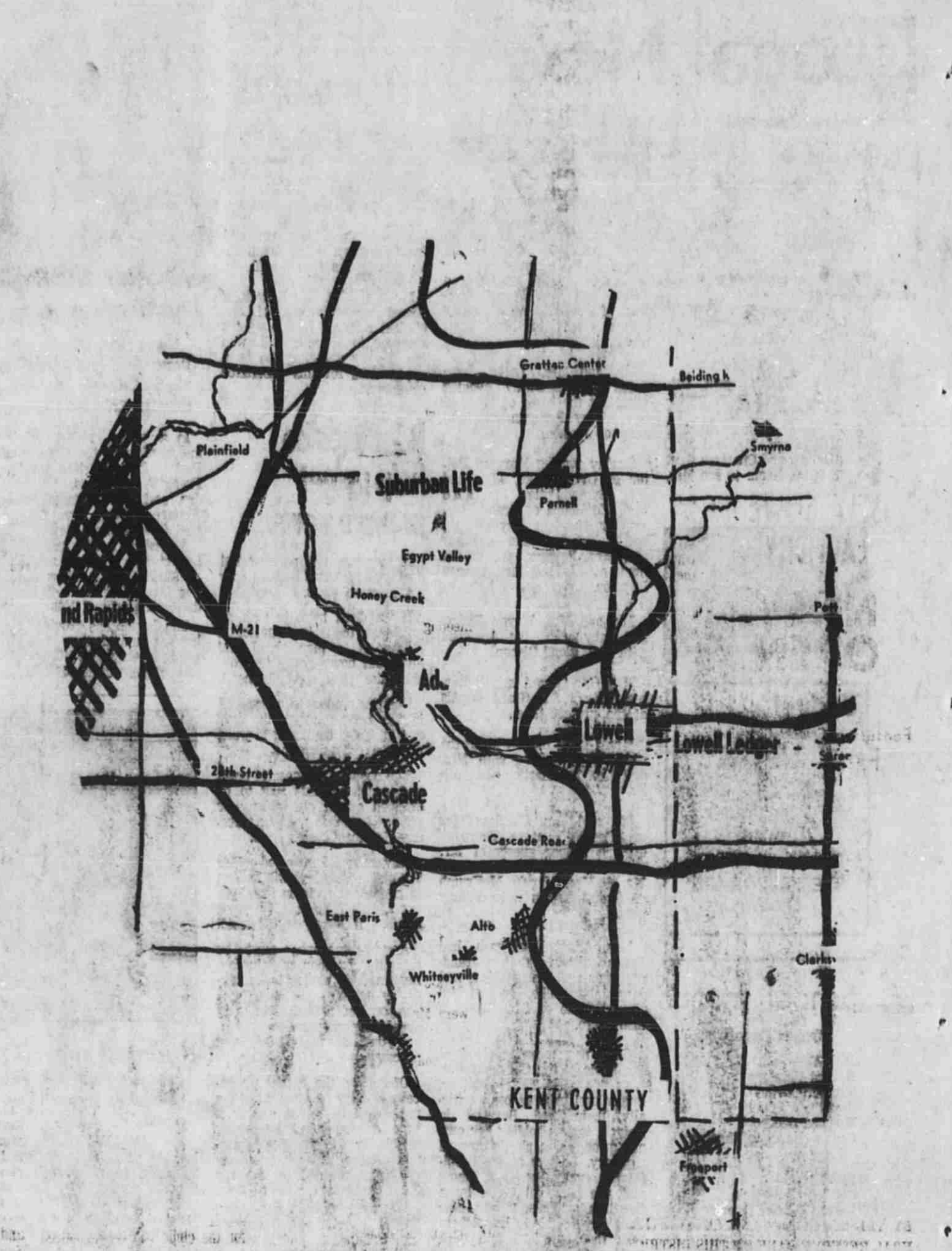

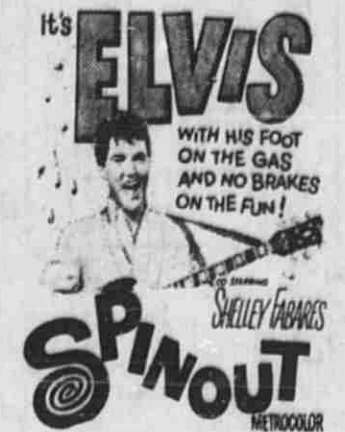
