Showboat books Louis Armstrong for 1967 production, July 24-29

dent William S. Doyle announc- time he has made 1,500 records, ed this week that Louis Armstrong "king of New Orleans jazz musicians," has been booked to headline the 1967 show, July 24 through 29.

Armstrong, who organized his own orchestra in 1925, will appear on the Showboat stage with a typical New Orleans style combo, along with other acts yet to be selected by the Showboat Board of Directors.

Born in New Orleans, Louisiana, on July 4, 1900, Armstrong started his professional career with Kid Ory's band in 1917. He climbed the ladder to fame as a trumpet player, and was playing in New York in 1924. His first recording of "You Rascal You," was his first big

Lowell Showboat, Inc., presi- hit recording, and since that one of the latest being "Hello Dolly," which swept the na-

tion as a top disc.

Armstrong's distinctive-styling on stage, and his music ability has turned his New Orlean's music into collector's treasures. and fire-side listening.

The famed trumpet man has been signed for the Showboat through the Reginald Voorheis Booking Agency of Chicago, Illinois, and is subject to the standard cancellation clause, up to 30 days prior to the opening

The other acts rounding out the 1967 show are being reviewed, and will be booked within the next few weeks, Doyle con-

Oldest bridge days numbered

The days of the oldest bridge on Michigan's state highway system are numbered.

The State Highway Commission reported today that con-struction has started on a new bridge to carry M-91 over the Grand River south of the Kent County community of Lowell.

It will replace an 83-year-old iron truss span which will be dismantled when the new \$352,-158 bridge is completed later

Highway Department records show the iron bridge was built in 1884 by the King Bridge Company. It became part of the state highway system in 1927 when M-91 was established to provide a link between Lowell

and old US-16 The old bridge, built to horse and buggy specifications, was financed with funds from the 1850 Swampland Road Act, an early federal-state effort to finance roadbuilding in the later

half of the 19th century. Under the Swampland Road Act, federal land in Michigan was turned over to the state

to be sold and the proceeds to be used for construction of roads, bridges and dams. The new bridge, which is be-

ing built by Brown Brothers, Inc., of Lansing, is located just east of the old span. State Highway Director Howard E. Hill announced the appointment of Roy C. Long of St. Joseph as project engineer

Building permits reveal over 11/4 million construction in '66

In a report issued this week an increase of \$966,101, by Lowell's Building Inspector and City Manager Bernard Olson, figures revealed that nearly a million dollars more in construction anf remodeling permits were issued in 1966 than

About half of the increase, noted in the report, came from the permit issued to Lowell Area Schools for the construction of the Bushnell Elementary School, and an addition to the high school, which totaled \$637,-

The second largest application for a permit, during 1966, came for construction at the site of the Attwood Corporation on North Monroe Street. Building permits for the city totaled \$1,287,390 in 1966, as compared to \$321,289 in 1965;

Residential construction permits totaling \$336,290 were issured by the city during the year for: 14 new homes, \$202,-000; two apartment buildings, \$72,000; garages, \$13,150; and additions and repairs, \$49,140.

Two new commercial building permits were let, valued at \$70,800. Permits in this department for addition and repairs totaled \$6,300 for the year. Three industrial permits, for

additions to present buildings, were issued by the Building Inspector, and totaled \$237,000. In summing up the year, Olson reported that a total of 71 permits for construction and remodeling within the city's radius were given out in 1966; and increase of 16 over 1965.

Speed control zone on M-21

A speed control zone on M-21 at the west edge of the Kent County community of Lowell has been extended for a distance of about 1.5 miles, the State Highway Commission reported today.

The speed control zone has been extended from Lowell's old city limits at West Avenue to a point three-tenths of a mile west of the present city limits at Alden-Nash Avenue. Thirteen accidents, including

four that were fatal, have occurred in the vicinity of Alden-Nash Avenue since last April. Officials of the Highway Department and State Police met recently with Lowell officials to discuss extension of the speed

The following speed limits will be placed in effect: -35 MPH from Amity Street west to Vista Valley Drive, a new subdivision entry.

—45 MPH from Vista Valley

a mile west of Alden-Nash Ave. The new speed limits will re-place the existing statewide 65-55 MPH speed limit. The present speed limits be-tween Amity Street and the





These persons, however do not have to qualify as your dependents in order for you to claim head of household. Your parents do not have to live with you, but they must qualify as your dependents. All other relatives must live with you and also qualify as your dependents.

Where the relative is required to be a dependent, such status may not arise from a multiple support agreement. The dependent must receive over half of his support from you.

household would include such costs as rent, mortgage interest (not principal), taxes, insurance on the premises, upkeep and repair, utilities, domestic help, and food consumed in the home.
