Council members on Monday night that two wells at the Waste Water Treatment Plant have failed to provide the quality or quantity of water needed. The manager reported that in his opinion the best solution was to extend the city water main to the plant at an exti-mated cost of \$7,000.



Lowell Twp. zoning hearing draws crowd

A good crowd turned out Mon-day evening for the hearing on a possible Lowell Township Zoning ordinance. A great deal of interest is being shown in getting a zoning ordinance on the books

Several changes were made at the hearing in minor pro-visions in the proposed ordinance. One was on the penalties for failure to comply; jail terms and time for complying with ordinance provision were liberalized. Another provision was revised to permit farmers to construct roadside stands on their own property and sell their own produce without per-mission of the township board.

The ordinance with its revisions will be sent to the Kent County Board of Supervisors for their approval. Then it must be passed by the town-ship board. Citizens may bring the ordinance up to a vote by filing petitions with the Town-

We have placed ourselves in the unenviable position of becoming the "white man from the rich foreign country" who is involved in "killing Asians." No matter how pure our motives may be, we are inevitably seen by many Asians as in-truders in Asian affairs.

However, it is pointless to merely look back and wonder if things might have been better if we had followed a different path. We are in Viet Nam, for better or for worse. We must accept that fact and attempt to work for a true solution to our involvements there and seek a lasting solution to the threat of war, chaos, and misery that hangs over the entire world. The "simple solution" of pull-

ing out all the stops and letting them have it with everything we've got from napalm to nuclear energy is a tempting one for many, and yet I wonder whether it is really a true so-lution to our world's problems?

It is becoming increasingly apparent that with the destructive power available in modern weapons, war is a compounder of problems rather than a solution to problems. In a number of tragic instances we seem to find ourselves up against a brick wall and we have no alternative but to resort to limited force. This, I would judge, is the attitude of our leaders and most Americans regarding the situation in Viet Nam.

However, military action ought to be seen as primarily a last ditch "holding effort," regretfully employed, while simultaneously the nation is mobiliz-ing every dollar and capacity for influence in support of a world system of order and gov-ernment capable of arbitrating and settling disputes among nainterested is welcome to attend, but must make a reservation by calling either TW 7strong world peace-keeping organization that we are willing to invest in unilateral military actions like Viet Nam. In spi of some attacks upon the UN, and our own reluctance to let it be the arbiter of our international disputes, it still appears to be the best hope for

settling world problems in a framework of order and reason. The days of our "wild west" when every individual could carry his own "peacemaker" on his hip are gone ... and thank God that they are. We soon learned on the western frontier that it was better to surrender the right to carry one's own "shootin' iron" and to entrust the settlement of disputes to a system of courts and police rather than having to endure the chaos of anarchy and

vigilante-style justice. When will we realize the cost of every nation's attempting to be an absolute law unto itself? Will we learn in time to avoid

W. W. III? Finally, I feel compelled to question whether modern warfare can be a "live option" for those who would profess to be attempting to follow Jesus Christ and His way for mankind. Regardless of whether modern war may seem "practical" or "expedient" from a secular standpoint, can we as Christians (if this is our avowed stance) give willing assent the destruction and horror war and at the same time be true to the one who said:

"But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you be sons of your Father is in heaven." Matt. 5:44-



Dan A. Wingeier, 63, died un-expectedly Saturday evening when he was stricken by a heart attack. He died in Butterworth Hospital. Services were held on Tuesday afternoon at the First Methodist Church with the Rev. Robert Webber officiating. Interment was made in Oakwood Cemetery.

D. A. Wingeier had been a banker in the community for nearly a half century. He began work in the Lowell State Bank and was Executive Vice President and a director of the State Savings Bank, its suc-cessor, when he died.







Animal Tracks



Because the majority of wild animals are most active during twilight hours or at night, they are not seen more often and their tracks usually are the only evidence of their being in any given area. Their tracks help people to "know" wildlife-the location of their homes, their foods, their enemies, their habits---without ever seeing these animals. Tracks of many animals are similar in appearance; for instance, the tracks of dogs, foxes, coyotes, and wolves. It helps in identifying such tracks to know which of these animals frequent the area in which the tracks are found. A good time to check for animal tracks is right after a light fall of wet snow. Tracks shown here are more perfect than those usually found under natural conditions in the wild. -- Mich. Dept. of Conservation







More space for parks, recreation and wild life

Grants are available for local State or Federal entities of government under what is known as the Greenspan Program to purchase agricultural land and convert it permanently from production for the preservation of open space, natural beauty, the development of wildlife or recreational facilities, or the prevention of air or water pollution.

lution.

Mr. Frank Light, Chairman of the Michigan ASC State Committee, announces any eligible entity of government that has purchased land since January 28, 1966 or intends to purchase land which has been in agricultural production is eligible to receive grants up to the amount that the land would otherwise earn an agricultural producer not to exceed 50 percent of its original cost. Many towns and communities throughout the State are presently developing communities throughout the State are presently developing such plans. Sanitary land fills are an eligible use of land purchased under Greenspan grants. Mr. Light further points out that school districts that are building new school sites or expanding their present sites are eligible for grants when establishing outdoor biology and botany laboratories.

There are presently 2 Greenspan grants in effect in Michigan. One developed by a school
district and another by the
Michigan Department of Conservation, both of which provide open space for recreational
use. Other communities are
considering establishing an airport, golf courses and sanitary

grants, additional cost-shares grants, additional cost-shares are available to establish and carry out the needed conserva-

tion practices on the land.
