

Just what does a Soil and Water Conservation plan include? First of all, land use decisions agreed upon by the owner and shown on an aerial photo plan map. Soil types, slopes and erosion which has occurred over the years are shown on a separate soil and capability aerial map, Each soil type is colored to show to which of the eight land classes any one soil type belongs Class I through Class IV soils are suited for cultivation and other uses. Class V through Class VIII soils are limited in use and are generally suited permanent type vegetation. The measurements on the aerial photo maps represent approximately 8 inches to the mile. The long range conservation

plan agreed upon by the land owner represents an orderly yearly improvement of soil and water resources needed on any one land unit. Conservation practices needed

are included in the soil and water conservation plan. There is no direct charge for this technical land use service assistance. Kents' S.C.S. personnel assists all land owners in the North East and North West Soil

Conservation Districts which include Kent County. The S.C.S. office is located at 3321 Plain-field, NE, Grand Rapids. The telephone is 361-5345. Land owners who have re-
