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School construction progress report

Although the winter was severe and spring floods have hampered construction at the new Bushnell School, Contractors promise to complete all projects in time for school opening this Fall.

The additions at the High School are scheduled to be completed June 1, 1967. Senior high School Additions include a new shop, a drafting room, science room, three classrooms, janitors closet and an addition to the back lobby. The additions are enclosed and finish materials are being applied.

Bushnell Elementary School will soon be completely roofed. The new ten classroom school will also contain a multi-purpose room, serving kitchen, stage, library, storage, service and utility areas, school offices and Superintendent's offices. This is the new building that can be seen at the southeast corner of the high school site. The facing material being applied to the upper portions of the building is aluminum-faced plywood, a new commercial panel material similar to plywood backed aluminum house siding.

According to Architects, McMillen-Palmer, in addition to the Architects and their Engineers inspecting the construction regularly, it is also checked by inspectors for Lowell, the State Fire Marshal, State Plumbing Board, State Electrical Board, State Boiler Inspector, and Kent County Health Department. The School Board received notice this week that the Fire Marshal has completed his preliminary inspection at the high school and approved construction to date.

Bushnell will be inspected by the Fire Marshal later.

Superintendent James Pace and a Board Member attend progress meetings with the contractors, Architects and Engineers. Board members and the Superintendent also make many individual visits to the sites.

Attwood Corporation looks to eight hundred employees by 1972

Attwood Corporation which came to Lowell in 1960 and was purchased by Steelcase Inc., of Grand Rapids three years ago is looking to employing 800 by 1972. Merwin Hogerheide, Personnel Manager, told Lowell Rotary Club last week.

Presently there are 400 employees but if the labor market holds up, the corporation will double in the next five years, Hogerheide said. Since moving to Lowell in 1960 with 55,000 square feet of floor space, the plant has doubled. This projected growth of the company calls for continued expansion of the plant over the next five years.

Three townships sign fire protection contracts

Fire protection contracts have been signed between three townships and the City of Belding for the coming year. Keene Township agreed last week to pay \$700 a year for protection from Belding; they also receive fire protection from Saranac and Lowell.

Ousco Township contracted to pay \$6,500 a year for fire protection and Orleans Township \$3,500; the rate is based on the number of calls and the proximity to Belding. Last year the three townships paid a total of \$4,200 but when Belding notified them that they would no longer give protection at this rate they agreed to pay the \$10,700 set by the city.

This was the second fire this week. Last year there were 31 grass fires.

Marie Rowland, 45, and Orto Stewart, 65, both of Grand Rapids were arrested by Lowell Police Saturday afternoon for being drunk and disorderly on a public street. They paid fine and costs of \$29.30 each in Justice Rittenger's court.

They were found hanging out of their car on South Division Street, but were not driving at the time the officer spotted them.

Lowell firemen have been gotten out of bed two nights in a row for a flame alarm and a grass fire about as big as your hat. Monday morning at 12:30 a. m. someone called a false alarm and sent them to the Charles Csalkovits residence on Alden Nash. Tuesday morning at 3 a. m. the firemen were called out to a grass fire on the C & O tracks near Pratt Lake, by a sheriff's officer.

Chief Baker said the grass fire was limited to a very small area and easily extinguished.

The car wash business turned out to be so good that Roth L. P. Gas are doubling the size of their car wash on West Main Street.

School asks 7 mill operating tax

The Lowell Board of Education voted on Monday night to follow the recommendation of the superintendent and call for a vote June 12 to increase the operating levy from three to seven mills for the coming 3 years.

Superintendent James Pace presented his budget for the 67-68 school year which calls for an increase of \$180,787 over the 66-67 budget. The seven mills would raise a total of \$127,000, Pace told the board and he expected to get the other extra money needed from additional state aid.

As was expected the biggest increase in the budget were salaries which are up \$200,000 over the previous year.

Buy School Buses

The board authorized purchases of \$36,873 for five new school buses to be delivered after July 1st. The board purchased two Chevrolet 66 passenger buses at \$7,820.53 each and two International at \$7,953.76 each. They also ordered a 20 passenger International bus at a cost of \$5,325.34.

Pace presented the time table for the completion of the new school buildings under construction. The high school addition will be put in use on June 1; Alto Elementary will be complete on August 1 and the Bushnell Elementary is scheduled for completion on August 8. There has been a delay in

approval for the sale of the bonds for the Alto Elementary school addition, but the contractor is going ahead anticipating early sale of the bonds.

Discuss Assistant Principals

The school board met in a private session at the conclusion of the regular meeting to discuss the application of nine teachers presently in the system for the three assistant principal jobs planned for next year.

Applications for the high school assistant principal are: Bob Perry, Jack Kempker, and Gordon Gould. Junior High Assistant Principal: David Jones, Arthur Bieri, and Roger Buck. Elementary school assistant principal: Ila Swanson, Arthur Kern and Frances Hoag. No indication of action by the board on the appointment was revealed on Tuesday.

Purchase Musical Instruments

The board voted to take \$1,183 from the high school building and site fund and buy instruments for the music department. Ordered were a set of Tubular Chimes; Piccolo, Xylophone and Timpani.

Work was authorized on Cherry Creek to clean out the brush and clean out the channel. The Creek has been backing up over the school property and forming a pond in front of the new Bushnell Elementary school now under construction.

Wessell and Kiel announce retirement from school board

Two members of the Lowell Area School Board, Ty Wessell, who is president of the board, and Edward Kiel, the president pro-tem, announced at the meeting on Monday night that they would not seek re-election to the board. The voters of the district will be electing two members of the board at the June 12 annual school election.

Both Kiel and Wessell were elected to the board in 1960 and have served for the past seven years.

Bill Jones, former city mayor and civic leader revealed on Tuesday that he would be a candidate for a seat on the school board. Other candidates have until Saturday, May 13, at 4 p. m., to file petitions to

have their name placed on the June 12 ballot. Petitions are available at the school office; at least 23 signatures are required on the petition.

Other members of the board are David Coons, Dr. Robert Reagan, Dale Shade, Harold Metternick and Dr. Donald Gerard.

Vote on Board Pay

A resolution was passed calling for a vote by the members of the district at the June 12 election to give each member of the board an annual salary of \$100. This would replace the present pay of \$200 to the secretary and \$100 to the treasurer and nothing for the other five members of the board.

Robert B. Moore pays fines on two counts

A Keene township man pleaded guilty to two violations Wednesday before W. P. Brogan, justice of the peace, and paid \$15 fine and \$5 costs on each count.

Phil Kahl, deputy sheriff, said the offenses were committed by Robert B. Moore, 38, of 8457 Rickert Road, in the presence of himself and Deputies Carl Fox and Dorset Davis.

The man was charged with having defective equipment on his vehicle and for failure to stop when signaled by a police vehicle.

Kahl said the three deputies were patrolling on Rickert Road the night of March 29 when they spotted an automobile driving without tail lights. Kahl said the police car had its siren and signal lights on and tried to stop the car driven by Moore.

Deputies said Moore eventually pulled into his private driveway and informed the officers they had no authority on his private property.

Moore was told he had been followed more than half a mile by a recognizable police car with siren going and signal lights flashing.

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

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
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Sale of Cook Cemetery land provides funds for new fire station and township offices

Pictured here is the architect's sketch of the new two-level addition to the Cascade Township fire station and offices for the township. The 12x30 foot addition will provide space for the fire department use and township office and meeting room on the lower level. The addition will also provide a better voting precinct quarters. The building will front on Orange Street.

Construction of the addition to the fire station was approved at the annual township meeting on April 1. The township board revealed to the citizens at the annual meeting that the construction estimated at \$22,000 would be financed from the proceeds from the sale of the Cook Cemetery property on 28th St. The three-acre cemetery property was sold on bids to the Gulf Oil Company for \$29,677.

All of the remaining proceeds from this sale after the moving of the graves to the Cascade Cemetery was put into a building and site fund. The present Township Hall, constructed in 1898, has been use since that time. The structure has been renovated and will continue to function as a community center for general meetings of Cascade electors and citizens.
